Economics is a dynamic social science, forming part of the study of individuals and societies. The study of economics is essentially about the concept of scarcity and the problem of resource allocation.

Although economics involves the formulation of theory, it is not a purely theoretical subject: economic theories can be applied to real-world examples. Neither is economics a discrete subject, since economics incorporates elements of history, geography, psychology, sociology, political studies, and many other related fields of study.

This course is designed to introduce economic concepts and theories and develop the skills of economic reasoning and analysis. The course spans two years and will cover units including microeconomics, macroeconomics, international trade, and economic development.

Tests & Quizzes

- Students are given quizzes throughout the year. Quizzes generally focus on recently learned information from homework and topics discussed in class. Quizzes can take various forms: multiple choice, fill in the blank, short answer, etc.
- Students are given several tests during each semester. Tests will be designed to simulate actual IB Economics Exams in style and will be scored using IB scoring guidelines. **Tests are cumulative for the entire two years of the course.**
- A modified version of the Shanghai American School IB curve will be used on IB style assessments. This version better reflects the way the IBO scores IB Economics.
- Students may use the Social Studies Department Retake Ticket to earn additional opportunities to demonstrate their learning.

Homework

- **Homework provides students the opportunity to make mistakes without penalty, and then learn from the mistakes.**
- Homework assignments are not included in the semester grade, but are a vital component of the course.
- The opportunity to use the Second Chance Room will be given to students who would benefit from additional study time.
- If absent, it is the **student's** responsibility to check first check the class wiki for missing assignments, and then ask the teacher for clarification as needed.
