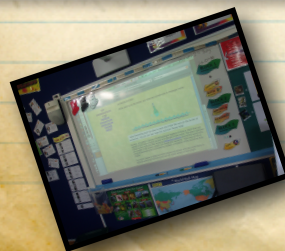
News from Paki.

Our Pukeko Echo Television project is going ahead in leaps and bounds with Term 3 seeing more of our Y4 and 5 students learning about movie making and tv production. These new students will work alongside our experienced film crews, complete their training and gain their film crew license. This will give them the knowledge and skills to become key contributors to Pukeko Echo. Their training covers the whole process of movie production ranging from planning segments and developing storyboards/ writing scripts, to shots, lighting, editing and presenting. And this doesn't include everything.

HOW DOES THIS FIT INTO LEARNING?

Being part of the film crew means that all aspects of the Key Competencies are covered. Students extend their skills in relating to others, participating, contributing and managing self. Their thinking skills are expanded and honed as they seek solutions for the challenges linked to creating Pukeko Echo.

While most learning areas are covered, an inquiry based model is used to develop content for the show, all aspects of literacy are included. For example storyboarding and script writing involves written language skills, presenting is about oral language, filming and editing covers visual language. Media literacies spread across the process.



The most important part is around having a real reason for learning. There is an authentic audience for the students' work which lifts the level of engagement and motivation ensuring the students' achievement is raised as well. It is important to remember that the opportunity to share students' learning via Pukeko Echo is open to all our students. Your child's teacher can tell about PET.
