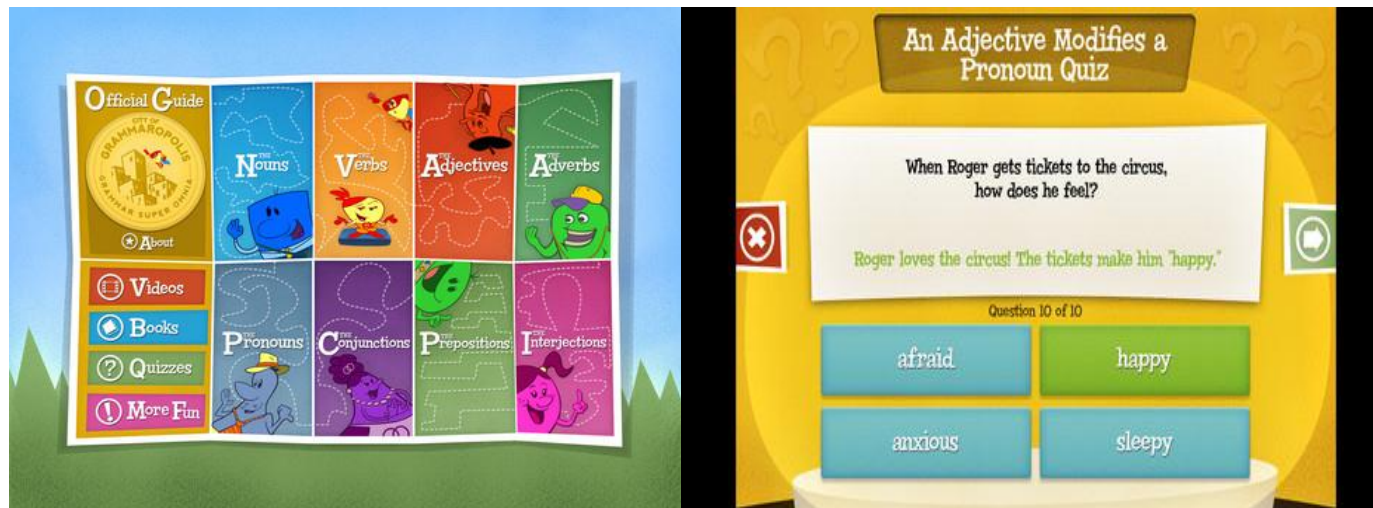


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iPad App



This app by Grammaropolis is both **(A) Appropriate for the grade level you have been assigned to** and **(C) a teacher resource app**. For my Assistantship I, I was placed in Tonya Hensel's 5th grade class at Westside Elementary School. It is an app that explains different grammatical terms and when they are appropriate to use. The Nouns section is the free part of the app unless you pay for the full version. It tells you that a noun is a person, place, thing, or idea. It explains the meaning of proper, common, collective, and abstract nouns. It has two 10 point quizzes where students must select the appropriate type of noun in the sentence and also identify the noun in the sentence. It also features a few video clips describing what nouns are. Each section of the app defines what it is (ex. Verbs), has related quizzes, and short video clips. I would allow students to use this app in the beginning of the school year to review the different types of grammars and in reading/language arts during center time so that they remember the different types of words there are and when it is appropriate to use them.
