What do you get?

Grants between \$25,000 and \$400,000.

Who is this for?

Places on Australia's National Heritage List.

Overview

Australian Heritage Grants funds projects that support places on Australia's National Heritage List through:

- improved recognition
- access conservation
- preservation, and
- community engagement.

Eligibility

To be eligible you must:

- be the site owner of the listed place, or

- be the site manager of the listed place and provide the current management arrangements or a current letter of support from the site owner, or
- have the written support of the site owner and/or site manager of the listed place where you are not the site owner or site manager
- have an Australian business number (ABN), unless you are not entitled to an ABN (see information about ABN entitlement on the [ATO website](#)).

You must also be one of the following entities:

- an Australian State/Territory government agency or body
- an Australian local government agency or body
- Commonwealth corporate entity
- an entity incorporated in Australia (this includes Indigenous land management organisations registered under the Office of the Registrar of Indigenous Corporations)
- a registered Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander land council
- a partnership
- an individual.

If you are applying as an individual you must be 18 years or older.

You should read the grant opportunity guidelines – attached to this Bulletin, and sample grant agreement before you apply.
