## CITY WALKING TOURS

Scan the symbol below to access a detailed online walking tour and over 70 different sites around the city with engineering significance.

Choose your favourite sites from the list overleaf, or follow one of the suggested tour routes.

### CITY WEST WALK (6km, moderate)

Meet the engineers who built Western Australia and discover Perth's first water supplies and modern transport marvels.

Starting at Point Zero, follow the green route in an anti-clockwise direction to finish at Elizabeth Quay.

### CITY CENTRAL WALK (5km, easy)

Discover Perth's earliest engineering works, including the first electricity, trains, trams, and learn how today's engineers work to safely preserve our city's heritage.

Starting at Point Zero, follow the orange route in a clockwise direction to finish at Elizabeth Quay.

### CITY EAST EXTENSION (8km, easy)

If you fancy a longer walk or a bike ride you can explore Perth engineers' love-hate relationship with the Swan River and discover how engineering and sport form a match made in heaven!

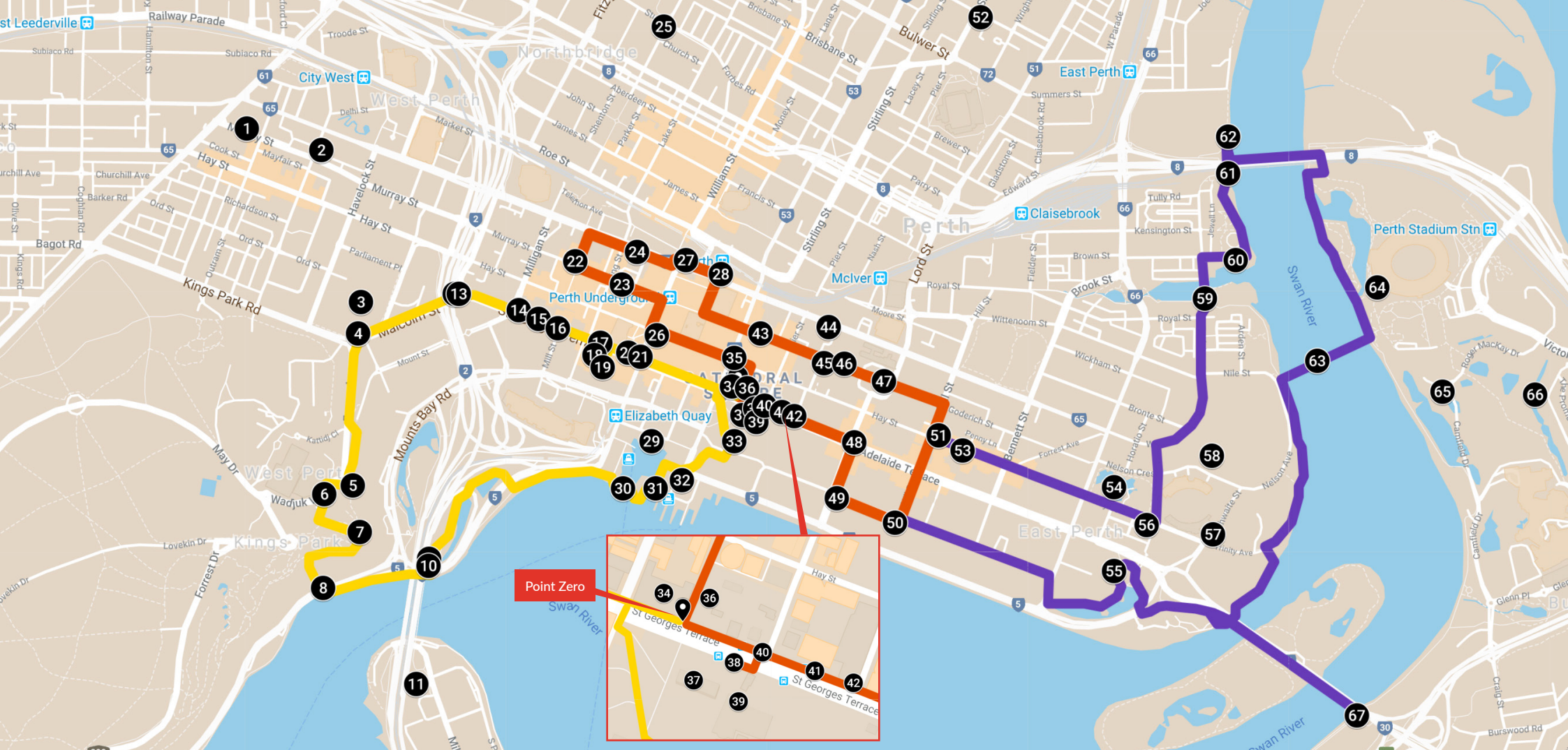
