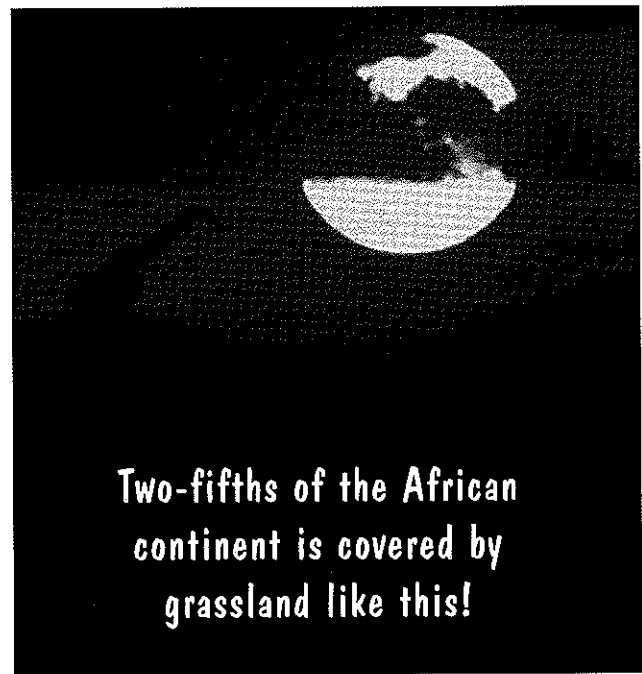


24. African Savannas

Approximately twenty percent of Africa is covered by vast grasslands called savannas. A savanna is a fairly dry environment with very fewer trees. Africans use the savannas for farming crops and raising cattle. The savannas are also home to most of the largest african animals. Native animals share the unlimited vegetation by feeding at different levels. Tall animals eat the tree leaves. Shorter animals eat shrubs and grass. The native animals also leave the new shoots to sprout again. Cattle raising has damaged the grasslands becuz the cattle eat all of the grass and the new shoots. Now, some of these land is being set aside as national parks to preserve Africas' grasslands and protect its unique animul population.



These grasslands, called savannas, provide a habitat for most of Africa's largest animals, such as the giraffe and the elephant. The native animals share the grass and scarce vegetation.
