- ❖ Your poems must include examples and/or definitions of the words you choose.
- ❖ Each of your 3 poems must include AT LEAST 8-9 lines (4 stanzas for a couplet, 3 stanzas for a triplet or haiku, and 2 stanzas for a quatrain)
- ❖ You need to turn in ONE final copy of each of the 2 poems. (Each member of the group should write the final copy of one of the poems.)
- ❖ You must present your poems to the class, either by reading them or singing them.
