




From the Dashboard 

1. Click “Create New Assignment” button.
2. Title your assignment and click “Create” button.
3. Choose the “Grade Level” and “Set of Standards” to use from drop-down menus.
4. Scroll through and select a standard from the list.
5. Choose to either “Create” your own question or “Select” to pick from a library of questions. **If you “Select” pre-made questions, read to check their accuracy and level rigor.**

Using “Select” a Question

- a. For questions under “Select”, click  to view full question and  to go back to question list.
- b. Add a question by clicking . Remove it by clicking .
- c. Continue selecting standards and questions until your assignment is complete and click .

Using “Create” a Question

- a. For questions you “Create”, click the tab to select from the question groups of “Classic Question Types”, “Math Tech Enhanced”, or “ELA Tech Enhanced”.
- b. Select the type that best fits your question.
- c. Add text, images, or math expressions to your question.
- d. Click  then **Preview** to see the question as your students will.
- e. When finished, click  until  is visible. Click it.
- f. Click  and type the Description and choose to either “Publish and Use Later” or “Right Now” to assign to a class. Assessments that are “Published and Used Later” can be found in your “My Assessments” library .
- g. Choose who it is shared with – “Private”, “Share with CMCSS”, “Share with Clarksville”, or “Everyone on Edulastic” & Publish or Assign.






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Assign to Students

To assign an assessment...

1. Choose either “Assessment Library”  or “My Assignments”  to view available assessments.
2. Choose a grade level from the drop-down menus to see assessments for each.
3. Click on the assessment and then the  **Assign** button.
4. Type a class’s name into the “Assign To” box, change any due date information, add a “Short Name” for the class.
5. Click “Assign”.

Get Reports

View through the Dashboard



The dashboard lets you see reports on specific assessments. Several widgets display the data. One shows a bar graph with correct, partially correct, and incorrect answers by each question on the test. Another shows the class’s overall performance on each standard in the assessment. A third contains thumbnail views of each student’s performance and can be clicked on to see details.

View through the Reports Tab



In the Reports Tab, Mastery Reports are available. Mastery reports show scores as they relate to mastery level of specific standards that were tested, not the individual assessments that tested them.

1. Select the Grade level and Subject for the standards from drop-down menus.
2. View the students’ levels of mastery by number of standards mastered, overall score, or overall percentage.
