

OTHER and **ANOTHER** can be adjectives, and like all adjectives in English, they don't vary in number (=there is no plural).

- We use **ANOTHER** with singular nouns: *Can I have another glass of water, please?*
- We use **OTHER** with plural nouns: *Other people think the opposite.*
- We use **OTHER** with uncountable nouns: *This book has other information.*

As adjectives, **OTHER** and **ANOTHER** can be specific or definite or unspecific or indefinite.

- *I want another colour* (indefinite, unspecific. I don't care what colour you give me, I just want one that is different from the one I am using now)
- *I want other colours* (indefinite, unspecific. This time, plural. I don't care what colours you give me, I just want two (or three, or four...) that are not the one I am using now).
- *I want the other colour* (definite, specific. For example, the colour that someone else is using, or the colour that is on the table).
- *I want the other colours* (definite, specific. This time, plural. For example, the colours that someone else is using, or the colours that are on the table).

THE OTHER, THE OTHERS

OTHER can be a pronoun too. It is accompanied by **THE** and it can be plural or singular:

- *I have two brothers. One of them lives in Canada. The other lives in Japan.*
- *I have three brothers. One of them lives in Canada. The others live in Japan.*

ANOTHER

ANOTHER can be a pronoun too. (Careful, it is never accompanied by **THE**!)

- *Do you want more coffee?*
- *Yes, please. I'll have another.* (=another cup of coffee).

FIXED EXPRESSIONS

- *We see each other every day.*
- *I promise we'll go to Disneyland some other time.*
- *My parents are divorced and I live with my mom but I see my dad every other day.*
- *No, it's not that way. It's the other way round!*
- Etc.
