Course Description:

SLS 1501 is designed to retain first-year students and help them make a successful transition to the university by developing academic, social, and personal skills that contribute to academic success.

The course curriculum will encourage students to establish supportive relationships with peers, faculty, and staff. The information taught in this class will help students become part of the academic community, and provide them with essential information about the academic demands of the university's policies, procedures and resources.

Course Objectives:

- ✓ Provide information pertinent to procedures and practices of the University of Central Florida
- ✓ Develop an awareness of the resources and services available throughout the University
- ✓ Familiarize the new student with the academic requirements of the University
- ✓ Assist the new University student to reach their full academic goals and transition to college
- ✓ Facilitate and develop a culture that fosters the intellectual and ethical growth of the first year student

Course Goals:

To enable and encourage you to:

1. Maximize your opportunity for a successful university experience
2. Develop confidence and strengthen your purpose for attending college
3. Build a supportive community of individuals who will assist you in your transition to college
4. Develop the skills, knowledge, and competencies to become independent and active college level learners

Methods of Instruction:

- Teaching methods will include but are not limited to lecture, group discussion, guest speakers, and outside class assignments.
- You are the best teacher for others. Class discussion will include interactive exchanges of ideas, thoughts, and opinions. Each student is encouraged to be an active participant in each class.

Expectations, Etiquette, and Policies:

3 Main Expectations:

1. **Arrive to class on time.** A punctual reminder and rule of thumb-Early is on time, on time is late and late is unacceptable.
2. **100% effort** towards the completion of all homework and assignments. Another good rule to live by, effort is often judged by organization, comprehensiveness, and having a sense of pride in one's work ethic.
3. **Honesty.** Last good rule to live by, being honest in communicating thoughts and having a willingness to admit mistakes, increases the likelihood of developing a great working relationship that can only lead to positive results.

Classroom Etiquette:

- It is expected that you arrive on time and stay until class is over. It is disruptive to your classmates and your instructor if you arrive after class has begun.
- All assignments are due at the beginning of each class period on the assigned date.
- Readings are assigned for certain days of class and should be read **PRIOR** to your arrival to the classroom. You should be prepared to discuss your thoughts, reactions, and answer any questions presented by the instructor.
- Appropriate clothing attire is required when attending this class.
- There should be no eating during class, it's distracting and can make others hungry.
- Turn off all electronic devices before entering the classroom. Phone calls and texting should be done outside of class time. Disruptive devices will be confiscated until the end of the class. In addition, laptops may not be used in class.

Attendance Policy:

- Class attendance is **mandatory**. Please notify the instructor prior to class if you must be absent. The instructor will determine if an absence is excused.

Class Work:

- Class assignments will be assigned at the end of each class. You are responsible for any missed classroom lectures and/or assignments.
- **ALL** assignments are due at the beginning of class and assignments will not be accepted after the completion of each class or via e-mail. If an assignment is requested in an email format it must be submitted prior to class time on the date assigned.

Guest Speakers:

- Students will take notes when guest speakers lecture. Content from the guest speakers' presentations will be used on the midterm and final.

Makeup Policy:

- Due to the nature of this course, there are no opportunities to make up an exam, quiz, or the final exam.
- Please speak with me individually if you anticipate issues regarding missing an exam or turning in a homework assignment.

Extra Credit Policy:

- There will be NO opportunity to counterbalance low grades by doing extra work. Please put forth your best effort on all reading assignments, class activities, tests, quizzes, and papers.

Requirements for Written Assignments:

- All written assignments must be typed, double spaced with a standard 12 point font
 - Single spaced heading at the top right of paper, include: name, date, and course section #
 - Use no more than one inch margins at the top, bottom and sides
 - Proofread and use spell check
