Mr. Wellek's Government/Economics class with invited students from other classes had a 'conversation' with our senator in Washington, Mr. Robert Casey. Through the wonders of internet connections our students were able to see Senator Casey in his chambers in the capital and ask him questions about a variety of issues. It was kind of him to take the time to connect with his soon to be voting constituents. It is Mr. Wellek's hope that experiences such as these will inspire our students to become involved in the political process and realize that they have an important role to play as a responsible citizen in our society. MATH CLASS

Mr. Amendola's Applied math 9 recently completed a student survey using Excel. Students surveyed 100 FHS students (25 in each grade) on their interests in music, TV shows, fast food restaurants and computer use. Mr. Amendola's students then compiled the data on Excel, and used the data to project what the entire population prefers using the sample population. Students also compared the data results from each grade individually to project differences among each grade level with regard to the survey questions.

In Mr. Sanford's 12th grade College Algebra class they have been studying and solving problems dealing with Trigonometry. To be more specific, they have been using the Law of Sines and the Law of Cosines to solve for missing angles and sides of both right and oblique triangles.

An activity was designed for the gymnasium. The owner of Sanford's Surveying, Michael Sanford, was able to bring in his equipment and let the students see their mathematics come to life.



The students were posed with three real life problems and needed to collect certain information using the surveying equipment. The next step was to calculate the answers using the mathematics we have been studying in class. See the pictures.

Math department prepares for **PSSA exam**

In preparation for the PSSA math exam given in March, the math department will be sharing with all juniors on Wednesday, March 11 during tutorial. That time will be used to discuss some test strategies for taking the math PSSA exam and why the test is so important, not only to the students but to the district. We will also explain the change in scheduling that happens if a student scores below proficient on the PSSA exam – which is that they would then be required to take Applied Math Topics in their senior year to review the topics on the PSSA exam. On March 12, 13 and 16 those juniors, who are not currently in a math class, will be assigned to a review session during tutorial to practice open-ended problems. The PSSA exam will begin on March 18. Juniors who are currently in a math class will review and practice open-ended problems in their math class prior to the actual test.

SPLASH FOR CASH !!

On Sunday March 8, 2009 from 12 to 6, the Junior Class is sponsoring a Splash for Cash at Splash Lagoon. WORLD LANGUAGE CLASS

1. Clubs – Spanish and French club members met during the last week in January to make posters for winter sports. Members created encouraging phrases for wrestling, swimming, water polo and basketball. On February 10 the clubs held a joint meeting to make valentines for their friends and loved ones.
2. French students traveling to Cholet this Spring have been meeting regularly to discuss various topics. Videos have been shown on sights they will see, expectations and behavior have been addressed, packing

lists and money exchanges will be discussed in the future. Spanish travelers going to Costa Rica in June are busy getting documentation together (passports, etc...)

ERIE COUNTY TECHNICAL SCHOOL

As we enter the scheduling process, please consider whether one of the many options that exist at the Erie County Technical School may be perfect for your son/daughter during 10th through 12th grade. Two labs are available for 12th graders even if they have never enrolled at ECTS: Tourism and Hospitality Management and Networking Technologies. This year's juniors observed a presentation about these exciting programs on 2/18/09.

SCHEDULING

The scheduling process has started at Fairview High School. The timeline is as follows:



February 11, 2009	Course request forms are sent for each student with recommendations by core course and world language departments at FMS - They will get them back to us by February 25.
In-service Day Friday, February 13	Course request forms are completed for each student with recommendations by core course and world language departments at FHS Teachers, counselors, and principal discuss changes they recommend for the master schedule.
Tuesday, February 24	Evening orientation session at FHS with current 8 th graders and their parents to give overview of scheduling process. *
Tuesday, February 24 10:20- 10:50	Guidance counselors go to FMS to talk with 8 th graders in an assembly to explain the scheduling process.
February 25-27	Guidance counselors talk to FMS students individually to get their requested electives and two alternates for their course request sheets. (3 days)
Monday, February 16	Guidance counselors meet with the FHS students in homerooms during tutorial – they will explain the process AND hand out course lists.
Wednesday Feb 18 – March 6 ?????	Guidance counselors talk to FHS students individually to get their requested electives and two alternates to complete their course request sheets. * (takes 2 weeks)
Monday, March 9- Friday, March 13	Course request data is entered into CSIU program by a substitute secretary. Reports are prepared to include rosters of students by course and courses offered with total number of students registered for each course.
March 16 (PSSA week) March 20	Departments look at the reports and determine if any students are misplaced. They discuss with the principal how many sections should be offered of each class. Elective choices are reviewed. If too many students are signed up for specific electives, they may be rescheduled into their alternate choices. Attempts will be made to meet seniors' requests first.
Late March	Counselors make teacher recommended changes.
Early April	Departments meet and make a 'wish list' of how they would prefer the schedule to work out: what teacher is assigned to given courses, when the class would occur (semester / time of day), how many different class preparations per teacher per semester, when plan periods should occur, etc. and submit this data to the principal. Principal discusses the list with the department head.
Early April	Principal uses the above data to prepare a draft of the finalized master schedule. Principal meets with guidance counselors and department heads to look at draft of master schedule and inspect for conflicts or potential problems making changes as necessary.
Mid April	Final draft of master schedule is prepared.
Late April	Student schedule process in CSIU software program begins. Principal works on this with assistance of guidance counselors, guidance secretary, and department heads adjusting master schedule and student schedules as necessary.
Early May	Meet with all students by class – give them each a draft of their next year's schedule and have them mark "OK" or indicate problems with it – requests for change. There is an opportunity to ask counselors a question at this time. If necessary, counselors will meet with students individually to correct schedules. Any change requests by students must be submitted in writing (including justification and signature by parent) on our FHS form.
Mid May	Final draft of schedule delivered to students. *

Essay Contest

The Pennsylvania Society for Biomedical Research is holding their 18th annual high school essay contest. The purpose of the contest is to recognize students who demonstrate superior understanding of the appropriate use of animals in biomedical research and who can artfully communicate that understanding in writing. PSSA TEST DATES AND INFORMATION

The writing exams went off successfully on February 10 and 11. We are still in the process of completing makeups for those students who were absent. The math and reading exams will be March 18, 19, and 20. The science exams will be April 29 and May 1. Parents of 11th graders will be receiving more detailed information about the tests with the report cards.

We need your help to make the exams successful, and there are a number of ways you can do this.

First, encourage your child to take these exams seriously. Students who fail the test may be required to alter their schedules for remediation. Furthermore, the results from these tests appear on each student's transcripts which will be sent to the colleges and universities your child applies to. It is in your child's interest to score as high as possible on these exams.

Next, try and schedule any doctors' appointments around the exams. All 11th graders must take all the exams, so anyone who is absent will be required to make the mixed exams up. This will be done during school so the student will miss significant class time.

Finally, please encourage your child to get a good night's sleep and eat a nutritious breakfast. The exams are approximately 2 ½ hours each day so a good night's sleep is crucial. Although the students will receive a light snack prior to taking the exams, having a good breakfast before they arrive should help them concentrate.

ATHLETICS

As we move from the winter athletics season to spring parents and athletes should be aware of certain requirements. spring athletes who have not participated in a sport previously this school year, will need to submit a completed physical form from their doctor. Anyone who has already submitted this form in a previous season, needs to submit the parental recertification form (a green form that states that the student has had no changes in his/her physical condition that would hamper their participation and also updates contact information). Also, any winter season athletes must turn in their uniforms and equipment directly to the Athletic Trainer/ Equipment Manager, Nicole Parker, as soon as possible.

The boys' basketball team finished the regular season with an 18-4 record. The Tigers earned a share of the region title with Mercyhurst Prep, along with a District 10 playoff berth. Several milestones were reached during the season. Senior Chris Glecos scored his 1,000th career point in December, while Coach Keith Nies became Fairview's all-time career wins leader with his 125th victory in February.

The girls' basketball team registered a 13-9 overall record for the season. The win total is the most for the Lady Tigers in a number of years. Coach Carla McKenna has a solid foundation for the future, graduating only one senior from this year's team.

Josh Eckendorf led the wrestling team this season by posting the most career wins in Fairview history (126). He finished third in the Sectional Meet at Union City. Aric Weber was second and Joe Gennero fourth in the tournament. All three wrestlers advance to the District Tournament February 21st at Sharon High School. The Tigers suffered a number of injuries this season, which made a rebuilding year even more difficult for first-year head coach Ben Corbin.

The swimming program continued its dominance in region. Both the boys and girls finished with 14-0 regular season records. Maggie Glass set a new school record in the 100 freestyle, while R.J. Petrella set a new school mark in the 200 Individual Medley. The boys and girls won the Iroquois Invitational Meet as well. The Tigers begin District 10 competition February 21st and 28th.

Senior Nick Lohrer received second team honors in the 2009 Louisville Slugger Pre-Season High School All-American Baseball Team. The team is selected by writers for the *Collegiate Baseball* newspaper. Lohrer, a right handed pitcher, had a 7-2 record with a 1.79 earned run average last season. He struck out 73 batters in 58 innings. He also hit .403 with six homeruns.

The Fairview Athletic Boosters and Athletic Director Jerry Lightner organized "Unite Against Violence Day" on January 31st for the girls' basketball game against East High. Girls from both teams were given t-shirts to mark the event. The focus of the day was a celebration of all of the accomplishments of both teams, on and off the basketball court. Both teams enjoyed pizza provided by the boosters after the game.

LIBRARY

The Young Adult Book Club met on Wednesday, February 18th. They had an enjoyable conversation about Stuck In Neutral by Terry Trueman. The students have chosen two new books for their next meeting: The Shack by William Young and the Newbery Award Winner for 2008, The Graveyard Book by Neil Gaiman.

A Promethean Board is installed in the library computer lab. Our goal is to continue to make FHS library a "library for the future." By placing the Promethean Board in the library, we hope to encourage any teacher who wants to make their lessons more interactive and who are not part of the CFF grant to work collaboratively with Mrs. Crotty in creating lessons which encourage more student engagement.

Say goodbye to cutting out letters and images by hand! The library purchased a Cricut Cutting machine for all teachers to use. This machine has turned our bulletin boards into true works of art! If you want to see for yourself, take a look at the bulletin boards in the main hallway of FHS.

DISCIPLINE

The Fairview School Board passed a new Bullying/Cyberbullying policy during its December meeting. The policy responds to a law passed by the Pennsylvania Legislature in July. It requires all school districts to incorporate a bullying policy into its student code of conduct.

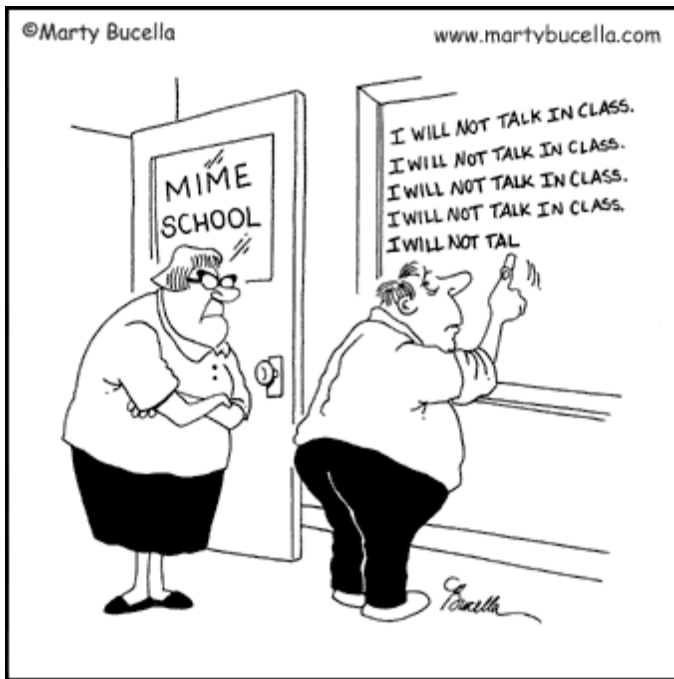
The new Fairview policy defines bullying and cyberbullying, as well as the authority of the school district and the delegation of responsibility of students. It also outlines the consequences for violations.

Governor Edward Rendell and the state legislature developed the law to address the increasing problem schools are having with bullying and cyberbullying. The Fairview School District initiated the HALT Anti-bullying Program this year to help deal with the problem.

Elaine Surma, from the Attorney General's Office, conducted a presentation at the high school open house on February 11th. The theme of the discussion was *Cyberbullying and the Law*.
