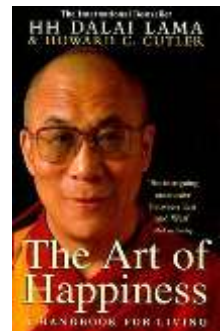

Dalai Lama

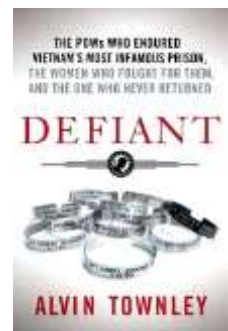

Willie Robertson; Korie Robertson

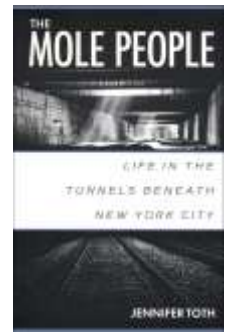

Jennifer Toth

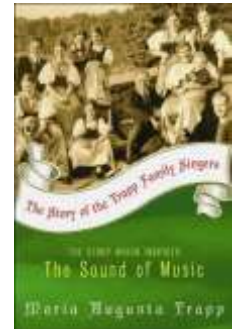
Thousands of people live in the subway, railroad, and sewage tunnels that form the bowels of New York City and this book is about them, the so-called mole people.

Maria Augusta Trapp

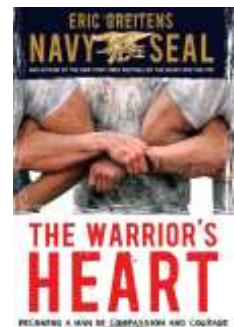
