WEEKLY REMINDERS:

WOTW 1: affix (n.) - one or more letters occurring as a bound form attached to the beginning, end, or base of a word and serving to produce a derivative word or an inflectional form (e.g., a prefix or suffix).

WOTW 2: inference (n.) - a judgment based on reasoning rather than on a direct or explicit statement. A conclusion based on facts or circumstances; understanding gained by "reading between the lines."

Period 1:

1. Take AP Essay #1 (on Thursday).
2. Take AP Essay #2 (on Friday).

Period 2, 3, 8:

1. Using the computers (or your iPads):
 - Create a Google Document in Folder "100 Greatest Works Ever Written."
 - Research lists of great works (not just those written in English). These works could be poems, plays, short stories, novels, nonfiction (like philosophy, essays, and the like).
 - Do your best to get at least 50 and up to 100 in your document. Be sure they aren't just novels.
 - Put a one-sentence summary after each great work telling me WHY it is on your list. What is it about? Does it answer one of our great questions? Which one?

Period 4:

1. Using the computers (or your iPads):
 - Create a Google Document in Folder "100 Greatest Works Ever Written."
 - Research lists of great works (not just in English). These works could be poems, plays, short stories, novels, nonfiction (like philosophy, essays, and the like).
 - Do your best to get at least 50 and up to 100 in your document.
 - Put a one-sentence summary after each great work telling me WHY it is on your list. What is it about? Does it answer one of our great questions? Which one?

Period 6:

1. View the movie of The Crucible.
2. If the movie can't get played by Beka or Madison, then you need to read your Outside Reading.

Period 7:

1. GET YELLOW TEXTBOOKS FROM TABLE. [This will take both days].
2. On Thursday turn to page 271. Read "The Declaration of Independence" which ends on p. 276.
3. Read ALOUD with a partner taking turns every paragraph. Take your time. Read it carefully as it is one of the greatest American documents ever written.
4. With your partner, answer the questions on page 279: Numbers 1 (including the Comprehension Check bullets), 2, 3, 6, and 8. THESE WILL BE SUBMITTED BY THE END OF THE PERIOD ON FRIDAY.
