They both change the plot, combine characters, add non-existing characters, delete characters, skip parts, along with several other inaccuracies. Please be careful about watching either version of these movies before your big test. They will distort your perception of the book and therefore hurt your chances of passing. If you have already seen either of these film versions, please try your best to separate yourself from your preconceived notions of this book. On the other hand, watching *The Lord of the Rings* trilogy with your family is highly recommended and will be helpful in understanding *The Hobbit*. *The Hobbit* precedes (comes before) *The Lord of the Rings* on a timeline. However, *The Lord of the Rings* has a lot of accurate flashbacks alluding to *The Hobbit* along with many of the same characters and the same settings. *The Lord of the Rings* also goes into further detail about great battles before the time of *The Hobbit* and the history of Middle Earth, which can definitely be helpful in understanding *The Hobbit* and the important purpose of Bilbo's life and journey.

The Lord of the Rings trilogy includes: *The Fellowship of the Ring*, *The Two Towers*, and *The Return of the King*.

Front Gate of the Lonely Mountain





[I expected you would need help with this Post-it note, so here it is: (You're Welcome!)]

- Bilbo uses **KENNINGS** to riddle the dragon with. A **kenning** is a type of figurative language, which uses a **metaphor to replace a common or proper noun**. This type of figurative language is common in Anglo-Saxon and Norse Mythology where one's name and honor depended on one's accomplishments or their forefathers' accomplishments. Some examples of **kennings** that Bilbo uses to replace his name are: clue-finder, web-cutter, the stinging fly, Ringwinner, Luckwearer, Barrel-rider.... Notice that sometimes Tolkien will capitalize the kennings that he uses and sometimes he won't. Technically, if the kenning is being used to replace a person's name, it should be capitalized. When a kenning is used to replace a common noun, it should not be capitalized. Has Tolkien or his editors make a mistake? Hmmm. Maybe not. Look at the difference of when he uses an article (a, an, the) before his kenning and when he doesn't. What does this tell us about the English language when it comes to common and proper nouns? (The questions proposed in this paragraph were meant for rhetorical purposes only. Only answer what is asked of you in the part that is not bracketed.)]
