### CIVICS II:

Put your name and period in the bottom, right-hand corner. Example:

Kofi Annan was the Secretary-General of the United Nations from 1997 to 2007.



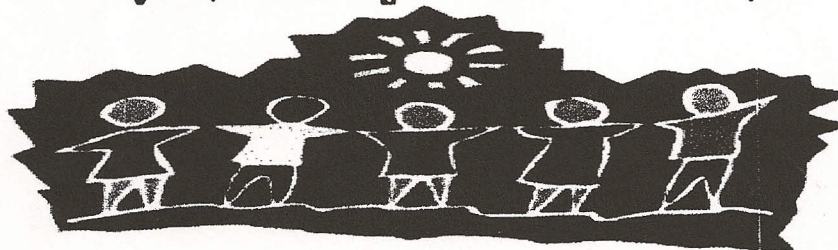
