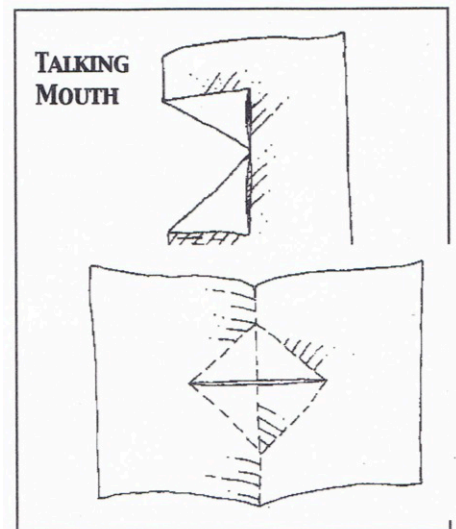
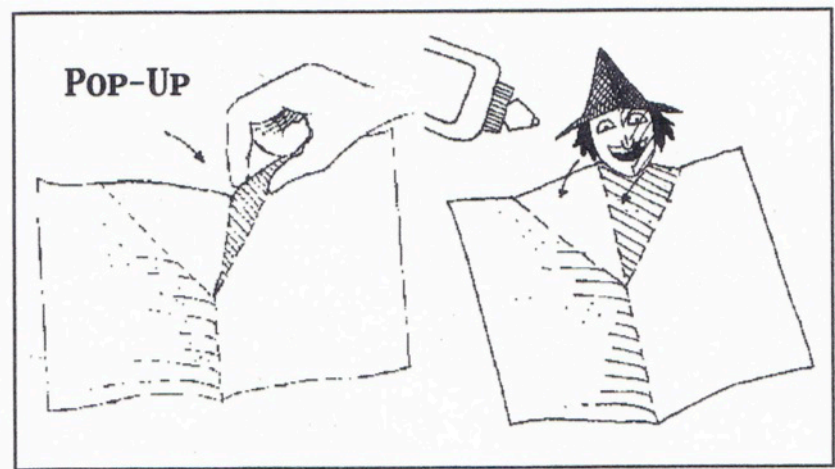
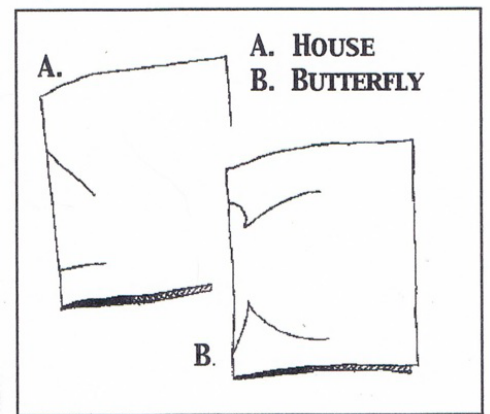
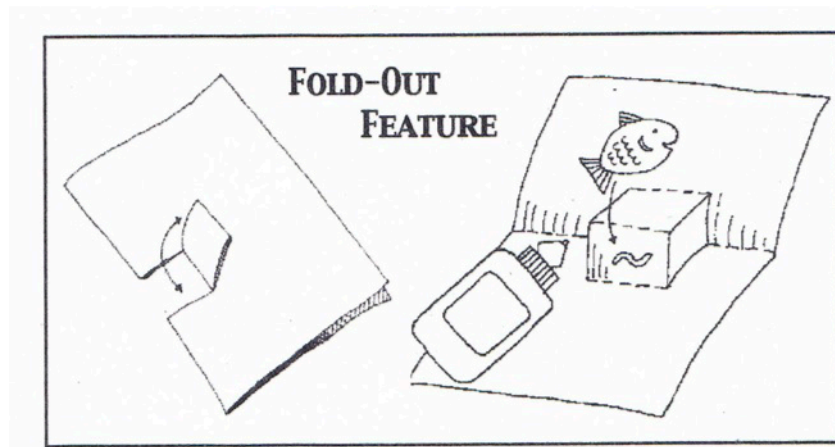


6. Pop Up Books

Who can resist this exciting book form that provides unique opportunities for story and design?



Writing Ideas Using a Pop Up Book:

- * Animal Rhymes: Using Chicken Little by Steven Kellogg, create rhyming names for animals (Snakey Lakey). Write an adventure for the animal, then illustrate it.
- * Shoes: Read Alligator Shoes by arthur Dorros or Shoes by Elizabeth Winthrop. Draw or cut out pictures of shoes and write couplets about different types of shoes: High top shoes are really cool, but never wear them in the pool.
- * Specalized Subject Pop Ups: Create a book of specialized vocabulary from art, science or history.
- * Famous People: Make a collaborative book of famous people that pop up.
- * Vocabulary Fun: Use Q is for Duck by Mary Elting and Michael Folsom. Challenge students to figure out why "A is for Zoo", and "C is for Hen"
