Les consonnes finales (Final consonants)

In French, the last consonant of a word is often not pronounced.

- Remember: Final "s" is usually silent.
Répétez: **trois français anglais**
- Most other final consonants are usually silent.
Répétez: **Richard Albert Robert salut américain canadien bien deux**

EXCEPTION: The following final consonants are usually pronounced: "c," "f," "l," and sometimes "r."
Répétez: **Éric Daniel Lebeuf Pascal Victor**

However, the ending -er is usually pronounced /e/.
Répétez: **Roger Olivier**
