



The "Bog" chair is made from a standard structural timber, typically number 2 pine. The timber starts out 8' long, 11" wide, and 1 & 1/8" thick.

The seat section is typically reserved for gentlemen. If one is comfortable seating oneself with one's knees in separate zip codes, space remains for one's beverage between one's legs. This design has been noted to make more modest ladies and Scotsmen have to swing their legs uncomfortable off of the end of the chair. Accordingly, the "Ladies Model" should have a seat 10" - 12" long, rather than the 1' 2" indicated in the drawing.

Note that the slot in the back is only 1/8" thicker than the neck of the "spoon." This can make for a very tight fit if the wood swells even slightly. Accordingly, you will want to be prepared to open up the height of the slot to accommodate the easy movement of the spoon in the assembly process. Your mileage may vary. But be careful: if the slot is too loose, the chair will lean back too far.

Assemble by sliding the narrow section of the "spoon" into the slot on the back until the seat touches the back. Place the chair on the ground with the short end of the back on the ground. Take care when sitting down or standing up, and the chair will be slightly unstable until there is weight on it. Falling asleep in this chair is an acquired skill.

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
