in the future.

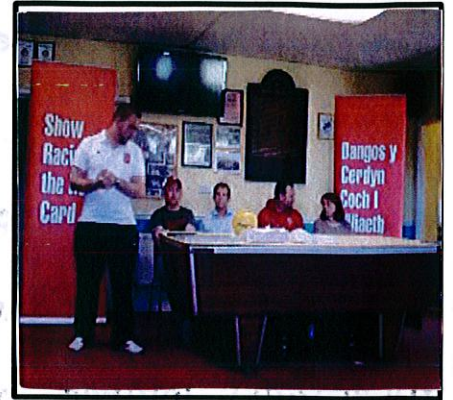

First the children travelled on a luxurious bus with comfortable seats, coffee machine

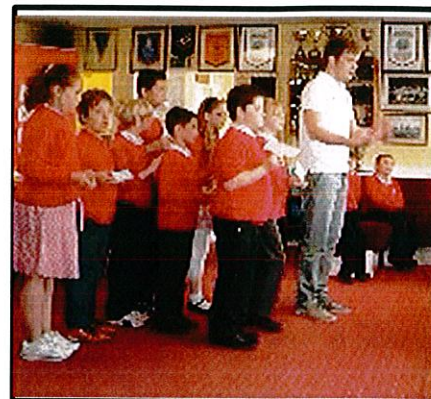

out that a teacher could be a rapper and that Cher Lloyd was a Gypsy traveller. The morning ended with lunch.

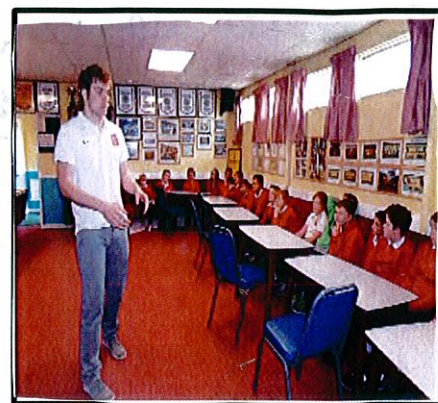

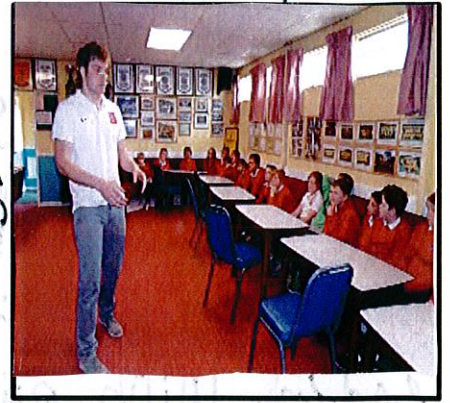

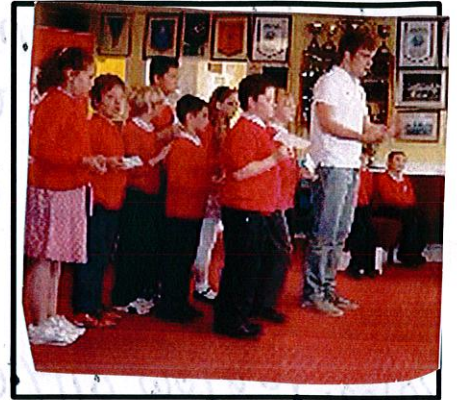
