

The most basic way to use Webster is to print copies of the board during your meeting using a printer that is also connected to the computer.

In addition, the Webster software records what you write or draw, so you can capture a snapshot of your whiteboard notes on the connected computer. This enables you to add or erase, save, print, or distribute the snapshot using the features of the Webster software at any time, even when a whiteboard is not turned on or connected to the computer.

If you connect a projector to your computer, the whiteboard becomes a giant, interactive touch screen that enables you to operate your computer while standing at the whiteboard. For instance, you can control a presentation (using software such as PowerPoint) on your computer while standing at the whiteboard simply by using a finger or stylus as the mouse.



Since you can operate your computer and any software on it from the whiteboard, you can write on the whiteboard to make notes next to the projected computer image, and capture everything on the board (both notes and projected image) using the Webster software.

In Microsoft Windows, Webster is also compatible with Microsoft NetMeeting, giving you fully interactive teleconferencing capabilities from your TS or LT whiteboard.
