Although our professional development is not free, it seems to meet your needs directly

All of the materials on the curriculum portion of our site at <http://cybersmartcurriculum.org/> ARE free to use, as you can easily link to them directly on our web site. They are designed for teachers to use with their students - not to create teacher awareness of the topics. From our web site the student activity sheets can be downloaded and copied for use. The teacher lesson plans are also often downloaded by teachers to retain in their lesson planning book.

You might be interested to take a look here <http://cybersmartcurriculum.org/materials/> and see how one district integrated our curriculum into their district. Many districts create a sort of customized "template" for their district and select the lessons from our curriculum that they want all teachers at a particular grade level to teach. They then put this template up on their web site and directly link to the lessons selected.

What we do NOT allow is for a district to copy our curriculum and put it on their intranet. As long as our free materials are accessed from our web site and our copyright is retained on all materials they are free to use.
