

Please create original sentences for each of the following words, underlining the word in your sentence.

1. **agitation** (n.) a state of excitement, disturbance, or worry. *The cancer diagnosis left Mike's family in a state of agitation.*
2. **ewer** (n.) a large jug or pitcher with a wide mouth. *The waiter filled our glasses with water he poured from a ewer.*
3. **ignoble** (adj.) dishonorable; base; despicable. *Janice made a life-altering mistake when she chose to marry that ignoble man.*
4. **indiscriminate** (adj.) lacking discrimination or careful choice; random or promiscuous. *By randomly selecting numbers from a hat, the teacher created the groups indiscriminately.*
5. **perpetual** (adj.) eternal; permanent. *The universe exists in a state of perpetual motion.
The couple vowed to love each other perpetually.*
6. **pious** (adj.) having or expressing reverence for a god or gods; religious; devout. *My aunt was an incredibly pious individual; she lived her entire life in devotion to God.*
7. **rapture** (n.) the state of mind resulting from feelings of high emotion; joyous ecstasy. *The Chocolate Decadence Cake left me in a state of rapture.*
8. **semblance** (n.) outward appearance, especially without any inner substance or reality. *The con artist arrived at the door of the unsuspecting couple with a semblance of friendliness; his true nature wouldn't be revealed until later when he stole their entire life's savings.*
9. **vengeance** (n.) the act of or desire for taking revenge; retributive punishment. *Seeking vengeance for the crime will not make your pain go away; it is better to forgive.*
10. **wretched** (adj.) 1. in poor or pitiful circumstances. 2. characterized by or causing misery. *The wretched orphan begged for money every day until the kind older woman took him in.*
11. Greek Root. **mania**: "madness" mania, maniac, kleptomania, pyromania
Examples: **mania** [a mental illness]; **maniac** [an insane and dangerous person]; **kleptomania** [an obsessive impulse to steal]; **pyromania** [an irresistible urge to start fires].
12. Latin Root. **greg**: "herd or flock"
Examples: **gregarious** [enjoying the company of others], **congregation** [a group of persons gathered for a common purpose], **segregate** [to set apart or be set apart from others or the main group], **Gregarian** [gregarious; belonging to the herd or common sort; common]
