



## LP Candidate Shakes Up N.C. Politics

Michael Munger calls himself the “accountability hammer.” In taking his gubernatorial campaign across the state of North Carolina, he hopes to hold major party candidates accountable to the voters by raising issues he says will “otherwise will be ignored.”

Munger, who was well known for his golden locks of hair that he grew and donated to the charitable organization “Locks of Love,” is no political amateur. Munger has been the chairman of the Duke University political science department since 2000, and previously worked in the first Reagan administration on deregulation of industry and the high consumer costs of trade barriers.

Like many Republicans, Munger quickly grew disillusioned with the party under the Bush administration, and officially joined the Libertarian Party in 2004. “The war, the attacks on gay rights, the unbelievable hypocrisy of the Republican-controlled Congress in its voracious spending habits and the deficit all made me look elsewhere,” says Munger.

While the campaign has been going strong, the political establishment in North Carolina has dropped their own “hammer” in attempt to marginalize Munger’s message. Though having campaigned for more than two years already, and being a well-respected leader in the community, he has recently

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## Delegates Nominate Barr to Head ‘08 Ticket

The Libertarian Party saw many firsts at its 2008 national convention, which was held over Memorial Day weekend in Denver, CO. Not only did the Libertarian Party have for the first time two former members of Congress running for the Presidential nominate, but the Party went through an unprecedented six rounds of voting to determine its nominee. In the end, former Georgia Congressman Bob Barr walked away with the nomination in-hand and set out to change the future of the United States.

“I’m sure we will emerge here with the strongest ticket in the history of the Libertarian Party,” Barr stated in his victory speech shortly after being selected as the Party’s nominee, and recent polls indicate exactly that.

With his Vice Presidential candidate Wayne Root, who sealed the nomination in the second round of voting, Barr has already been

polling in double digits in some states. Nationally, a recent Zogby poll has him at 6 percent—more than 5 times as well Ed Clark finished in 1980, which became the benchmark the Libertarian Party has always strived to match again.

Success in the early polls is largely due to the success Barr has had in the media, with frequent appearances on major outlets on television, radio and print. It may also have a lot to do with his savvy campaign manager, Russ Verney, who was the mastermind

behind one of the most successful third-party candidates in American history, Ross Perot.

Regardless of the factors, Barr’s campaign is revving up for what is sure to be the Libertarian Party’s best year since it was founded in 1971.

## Lawsuits Pending in Ballot Access Challenges

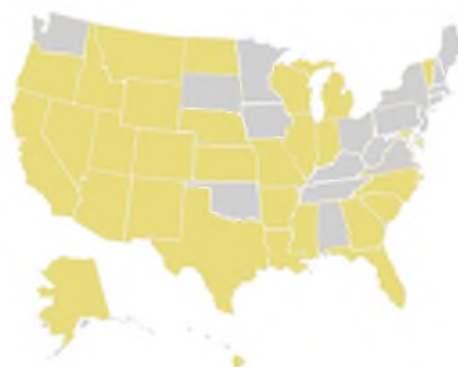

We’re getting down to the wire for Ballot Access season 2008, and the Libertarian Party is still on track to be on the ballot in at least 48 states. Now that we have a strong nominee for President in Bob Barr, we may even be able to aim higher.

Since the convention, we have been able to complete the two largest petitioning efforts before us, Illinois and Pennsylvania. The Illinois party turned in 49,564 signatures on June 23—almost double the 25,000 required. We were all biting our fingernails for the next week, as this was the period of time anyone in Illinois

had to challenge our petitions. The week came and went without a challenge, which means we are securely on the ballot now in 31 states. The Illinois Ballot Access team, which included more than a dozen very active volunteers led by Crystal Jurczynski, did a superlative job and set an example for how any state party can gather tens of thousands of signatures in 90 days.

In Pennsylvania, we have collected almost 50,000 signatures as well. In this state, the Party is simply waiting for the deadline



at the end of July to turn them in. Pennsylvania is also a challenge state, which gives us incentive to wait until the last minute to hand over our signatures. We are confident that the strategy we employed

# A Rising Tide Lifts All Boats

**T**hough used by President John F. As we transition from pre-nomination to the post-nomination phases of my campaign, the enthusiasm for liberty has grown and grown with each passing day.

Opportunities in the mainstream media continue to grow, exposing more of the American public to the ideas of liberty and freedom absent from the campaigns of the

political establishment.

This year is sure to be a banner year for the Libertarian Party not just at the very top of the ticket, but for all of the other down-ticket candidates too.

When voters go to the polls in November to cast a vote for Libertarian Party candidate Bob Barr, they will be more inclined to vote for other Libertarian candidates for local and statewide races. The explosion in membership following the national convention is a great indication of what is to come in the next few months. As more Americans are exposed to the Libertarian Party through my campaign, and realize that there is a viable choice aside from those candidates of the political establishment, election totals from across the nation will rise.

This is why it is so important that all Libertarians come together to support Libertarian candidates. With your help, we can make this the most prosperous and exciting year the Libertarian Party has ever seen.

In 1980, Ed Clark set the standard that we have struggled to meet again. In the subsequent years, we have only once broken even half the number of votes Ed Clark received in his presidential bid. In 2008, the question is not if we will come close to breaking the mark, but by how much will we break it.

We're not just in this to make a statement, or to "see what we can do." We have said from the start that our goal is the White House, and we intend to play the role of a spoiler no more than John McCain or Barack Obama will spoil our chances. Our message of liberty will resonate with liberals who are fed up with the incompetence of the Democratic Party in standing up to Republicans on issues of civil liberties and war, and we will attract conservatives who are tired of the fiscal irresponsibility and social intolerance of the Republican

Party. Do we need to pick a fight with the social conservatives?

With this approach, we are not limiting ourselves to a single demographic. Just as the Libertarian Party is composed of many different varieties of libertarians, our message will be one that appeals to any American who wants less government, less taxes and less intervention in their lives.

This is the strength of our Party, and it will be the strength of our campaign. A dynamic message with mass appeal that is based on reason and emphasizes individual freedom and personal responsibility.

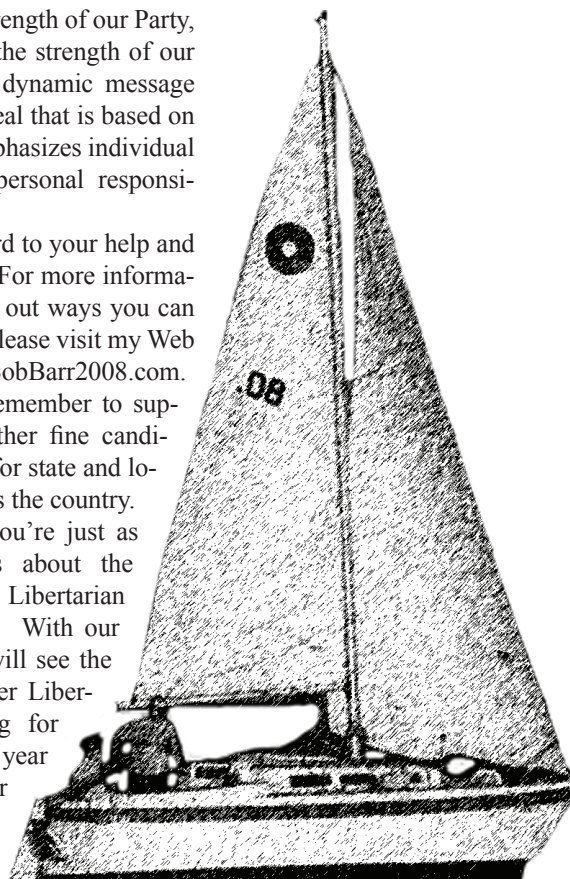

## THE MAILBOX

### Party of Principle\*

As a result of what happened in Denver at our Convention, I regret to announce that we are no longer The Party of Principle. But it's not what you might think – this has nothing to do with either our Presidential candidate or the Platform that was adopted.

We can no longer call ourselves The Party of Principle, but must now refer to the LP as The Party of Principle\* – and as with certain sports achievements, that asterisk is important. Because that footnote must declare the exception – “\* except where it concerns the Statement of Principles, in which instance we are prepared to throw our integrity and honor overboard if that is necessary to protect that Statement from undesired modification, even if that modification does not weaken but in fact strengthens the Statement.”

The Joint Proposal from the Bylaws and Platform Committees was attacked and trashed, leaving the Statement in its prior form. Those who attended the Denver Convention just to see that this proposal was defeated – and there were several such attendees – went there armed with their indignation and a poor knowledge of Robert's Rules and not having read the proposal in detail.

When the proposal was first presented, one of these delegates objected, insisting it was out of order. The Chair ruled that it was in order, at which point, this delegate insisted that the Chair consult with the Parliamentarian – a Professional Registered Parliamentarian hired to be on hand for just such consultations. Inherent in the request that the Chair ask for the Parliamentarian's professional and highly educated opinion was the implicit promise to abide by that guidance,

as reflected in the resultant decision of the Chair. But when the verdict of the Chair, guided by the Parliamentarian, was rendered, and it was not what that delegate wanted and expected, that same delegate threw his honor overboard and appealed the ruling of the Chair. This time, the indignation prevailed over the guidance of the Parliamentarian, and the Chair's ruling was overturned and the Joint Proposal was declared, by a majority of the delegates, out of order. In fact, several delegates admitted, during the discussion prior to the vote, that while they agreed the ruling of the Chair was correct, they still didn't like it and would vote to overturn the Chair's ruling.

An interesting tidbit ensued not once but twice after this point in the proceedings. Part of the Joint Proposal insisted that the protection of the Statement of Principles had a ‘backdoor’ that could be taken advantage of by only two-thirds, rather than the ‘padlock’ protection of seven-eighths. It was the insistence of the indignant delegates that no such backdoor existed. But on two separate instances, another indignant delegate tried to suspend the rules to shut that backdoor – the very backdoor that other delegates insisted did not exist! They apparently wanted it both ways. Fortunately for our remaining honor, those proposals were not considered.

What to do now? Well clearly, the delegates are prepared to violate Robert's Rules and common decency in order to prevent even the slightest improvement to our beloved and inviolate Statement of Principles. That asterisk, then, should be added to the Party's moniker.

## Guest Commentary: Democracy in America?

The United States prides itself on its democratic principles and in fact promotes them around the world. Former President Jimmy Carter is called to various “third” world nations to monitor elections to make sure they are run fairly. We are even at war now with Iraq trying to force democracy on the Iraqi people.

Unfortunately, we need to look no further than our backyard to see that America doesn't come close to living up to its democratic standards. Here in Illinois in the 14th Congressional district, The Republican candidate for Congress, Jim Oberweis, needed to get 793 petition signatures to get on the ballot, the Democrat candidate Bill Foster needed to get 863 petition signatures. Those “third” party and independent candidates who are not in the power club need to get 9,995 petition signatures to get on the

ballot, or 12.5 times as many signatures. This is true for all Congressional districts and in all races, “third” parties and independents have to get huge multiples of signatures than the Republicans and Democrats do, who make the rules.

The effect of this is to make it nearly impossible for third parties or independents to make the ballot, or if they do, will have spent so many resources on getting on the ballot that there is little left on which to wage a campaign. The net result is that we have a very undemocratic state here in Illinois.

In comparison, in Iraq, where our men and women are fighting and dying trying to establish democracy, a recent election had 111 different political parties on the ballot. According to Richard Winger, editor of “Ballot Access News” and the recognized expert on ballot access law, the United States has

the most restrictive and unequal ballot access laws in the world.

Congressional candidate Dan Druck has vowed that he will fight all the way to the US Supreme Court, if need be, to obtain fairness in ballot access laws in Illinois, and to secure

his right to be on the ballot for Congress in the 14th District. Supporters of Dan ob-

tained 7,153 signatures to get Dan on the ballot, almost 10 times the required amount for the Republicans or Democrats.

If you are outraged at this totally unfair ballot access requirement, please help us fight the unfairness and support our lawsuit to give Dan his right to compete against Oberweis and Foster this coming November election. Check Dan's campaign out [www.timefordan.com](http://www.timefordan.com).

### California

#### VP candidate Wayne Root visits state

Wayne Root visited the San Francisco Bay Area the weekend of June 28. On Saturday, with assistance from Libertarian Party of California State Chair Kevin Takenaga, Northern California Vice Chair Richard Newell and other local Libertarian Party members, we held a Barr/Root fundraiser at the Pacific Rod and Gun Club in San Francisco. For one hour, Wayne participated in .22 caliber target practice with several donors. As the other guests arrived, they mixed with each other and Wayne. A light meal was served, and then three San Francisco area LP Congressional candidates spoke briefly. Thereafter, Wayne gave a talk, and this was followed by a question and answer period. The event raised approximately \$1,622 net.

On Sunday, Wayne was the guest of honor in the Outright Libertarians contingent in the San Francisco Pride Parade, riding in an open convertible and waving to the crowd of more than 250,000. The parade was covered by KRON-TV and Clear Channel radio.

After the parade, Takenaga rushed Wayne down to San Jose for a late afternoon pizza party. After some introductory remarks by LP of Santa Clara County Chair Brian Darby, Wayne gave a short speech, and then LNC Region 2 Representative Mark Hinkle did a great job of fundraising.

The pizza party raised approximately \$1,434 net.

At this point, Takenaga drove Wayne back to San Francisco for yet another fundraising event: a party at the home of Mark Johnson. That event raised approximately \$740.

After subtracting his travel expenses, we helped Wayne raise a net total of approximately \$2,700 during his weekend trip to the San Francisco Bay area.

We arranged all of these events with just two weeks notice. That is typical for a political campaign, because candidate's schedules are continuously in a state of flux.

The members of the Libertarian Party of California thanks Wayne Root for doing a fan-

tastic job of updating us about his campaign, and we admire his ability to speak about basic libertarian principles in a way to which the average American voter can understand and relate.

### Illinois

#### Ballot access drive comes to a close

On June 23, the Libertarian Party of Illinois filed 3,484 petitions with the Illinois State Board of Elections to get our candidates for U.S. President, Vice President and Senate on the ballot. Those petitions contained 49,562 signatures, on target with our goal of 50,000 signatures.

Our filing was so strong that the enemies of liberty did not even attempt to challenge our signatures, meaning that the Libertarian Party is officially on the ballot in Illinois!

The LPI wishes to thank all who contributed to the success of our petition drive including our circulators, donors, coordinators, mentors and committee members. We also very much appreciate the support we received from the Libertarian National Committee, who supplied both human resources and financial backing critical to our success.

For the second year, the LPT participated in outreach at the Van's Warped tour ([www.warpedtour.com](http://www.warpedtour.com)). Patrick Barton covered the outreach booths at events in San Antonio on July 5 and Houston on July 6.

Barton reported a very good response in both locations. About 150 people took the "World's Smallest Political Quiz" and 100 were added to the contact list. It was a popular booth at both locations. In Houston, the Obama campaign booth was adjacent and they commented on how impressed they were with the activity at the Libertarian Party booth.

The LPT announced a money bomb for March 15 with a goal of \$50,000. The result was over \$28,000 donated. The date was extended to June 15 at the conclusion of the state convention. At this point the amount pledged or received is approximately \$35,000.

These funds are needed to meet our annual budget and keep our staff working. With a record number of candidates, increased media attention and Ron Paul supporters looking for a home, we need your support.

# LP Battles for Ballot Access

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in Illinois of turning in twice the number of signatures required, and making sure they are good signatures, can also withstand any challenge or deter it entirely.

That will make 32 states once we are certified there.

Ohio is very close to being state number 33 on or list.

Here we have already collected more than 6,000 signatures and should be at our final goal of 8,000 by the time you read this. Also, on July 14, our lawsuit demanding full party ballot status in Ohio was heard. If you know your history then you probably already are thinking that having a hearing on Bastille Day is a fine omen. With the results of either the petitioning effort or a positive result in the lawsuit in hand, we'll have the Barr/Root ticket on the ballot in the crucial swing state of Ohio.

In Massachusetts, LPMA Political Facilitator Carol McMahon is currently engaged in the laborious process of turning in about 20,000 of our signatures to the 351 various town clerks for verification. Once we complete the substitution process in Massachusetts, which unfortunately requires a lawsuit, it will make Massachusetts state number 34.

Quite a few of our deadlines for ballot access occur in late July and early August. Our state parties are well on their way to finishing in advance of these deadlines in Virginia, New Jersey, Tennessee, Washington, and Iowa. We are working with these states to make sure they can finish their requirements on their own, but for the most part, they are doing well. Our Ballot Access Coordinator Scott Kohlhaas, who has been indispensable throughout this long ballot access season, will be in Seattle the weekend of July 19 to assist with the drive there. Once completed, those efforts will bring our count up to 39 states with Libertarian ballot access.

Kentucky, Alabama and New Hampshire all have significant enough burdens that we have to send in professional petitioners. We're past the halfway point in Kentucky, about one-third done in New Hampshire and off to a solid start in Alabama. The LPNH has distinguished itself by using this petition to get new candidates for other offices on the ballot, and have worked closely with our professionals to find good local loca-

tions in a state that attracts visitors from all over. (Maybe it's because people enjoy visiting and shopping in a state where freedom still means something.)

All of those projects are going according to plan, which should result in states 40 through 42.

Maine and South Dakota are like these previous three states in that we have to get between 5,000-10,000 by early August. But unlike those states, both Maine and South Dakota require that all our petitioners be in-state residents. This means we have to spend more money to hire companies and professional crews to work those areas. However they are hard at work in both places and should be able to bring in states number 43 and 44.

The largest ballot drive left is New York, which requires 15,000 valid signatures in a six-week window that ends August 19. We are off to a good start in the Empire State toward our goal of about 22,500 total signatures. Although it is a significant hurdle to jump, the professionals and the state party volunteers there have a lot of experience with previous petitioning efforts, giving us confidence that New York will become the 45th state in our column.

Rhode Island and Minnesota both are ready to start with smaller signature requirements and the two latest deadlines, both in September. Once we are done in the rest of the states, it will be a simple matter to bring our count to 47.

This brings us to the states where the challenges are greatest – the kinds of situations that I wouldn't wish this ballot access headache on anyone, not even the Democrats and Republicans who wrote these insane state laws.

In Connecticut we have had to redraw our petition due to that state's amazing bureaucracy regarding substitution for our stand-in candidates on the original petition.

Thanks to LPCT Treasurer Andy Rule, we are expediting this process and should be able to start again there very soon. However that only leaves us until August 6 to get about 12,000 signatures against a requirement of 7,500 valid ones. Complicating that matter is that Connecticut is another state that requires petitioners to be in-state residents. The nature of Libertarian Party Ballot Access is that we just don't give up, so we have the plan in place to blitz

Connecticut in the last half of July and make sure it is state number 48 in our tally. It will be all worth it because if Bob Barr gets just 1 percent of the vote in Connecticut, then the party will enjoy ballot access there for the next cycle.

When we started this ballot access season, our goal was these 48 states. But at that time we did not know we were going to nominate such a strong candidate at the top of our ticket as we have with Bob Barr. His campaign brings the commitment and resources to make the last three a possibility.

The Barr campaign is currently going all out in West Virginia to meet their requirement of 15,118 valid signatures by August 1. Mike Ferguson, Midwest coordinator for the Barr campaign, has come out from Missouri to run this operation. In Oklahoma, the campaign has filed enough signatures to set up a lawsuit against what are easily the most draconian ballot access laws in the country. In the District of Columbia, the excitement of the Barr campaign has brought together enough talented and experienced people to get us a reasonable start there.

It's a long and tough road that we've successfully traveled before and are nearing the end of again. So many good people have helped—far too many to mention—with volunteer signatures, financial donations, and all the crazy logistics of running such an enterprise.

Even more of your help is needed now if we are going to give every American the option to vote Libertarian in November. The Illinois effort alone cost over \$100,000. Connecticut will most likely cost close to \$50,000. The amount of money we have to spend in other states is not insignificant either. If you can contribute, please visit <http://www.lp.org/contribute>.

We also need volunteers to get signatures!

Every signature collected by a volunteer means we don't have to spend \$2 or more to buy it from a paid petitioner. So 100 signatures is even better than a \$200 contribution because it also saves us time and allows you to talk to 100 more people about the Libertarian Party.

## Bob Barr

Candidate for President



Bob Barr is the 2008 Libertarian nominee for President of the United States. Previously, he represented the 7th District of Georgia in the U. S. House of Representatives from 1995 to 2003, serving as a senior member of the Judiciary Committee, as Vice-Chairman of the Government Reform Committee, and as a member of the Committee on Financial Services. He now practices law with the Law Offices of Edwin Marger, and runs a consulting firm, Liberty Strategies LLC, headquartered in Atlanta, Georgia and with offices in the Washington, D.C. area. Barr works tirelessly to help preserve our fundamental right to privacy and our other civil liberties guaranteed in the Bill of Rights.

From 2003 to 2008, he occupied the 21st Century Liberties Chair for Freedom and Privacy at the American Conservative Union. Since 1997 he has served as a Board Member of the National Rifle Association. Bob is also a member of The Constitution Project's Initiative on Liberty and Security, and he served from 2003 to 2005 as a member of a project at the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University addressing matters of privacy and security. In fact, recognizing

Bob Barr's leadership in privacy matters, New York Times columnist William Safire has called him "Mr. Privacy." Barr serves as a board member for Privacy International, an international watchdog group headquartered in London.

Bob has appeared on virtually every major cable and network television program dealing with public policy matters, and has served as a contributor for CNN. He has written a regular column for the Atlanta Journal-Constitution, hosted a nationally-syndicated weekly radio show, and served as Contributing Editor for The American Spectator. Bob's writings appear in numerous academic, local, regional, national and international publications. He is the author of "The Meaning of Is, The Squandered Impeachment and Wasted Legacy of William Jefferson Clinton," published by Stroud & Hall. He is a member of the Board of Advisors for the Georgetown Journal of Law and Public Policy.

Bob has served as an adjunct professor at Kennesaw State University in Kennesaw, GA, and serves as a national officer for Tau Kappa Epsilon Fraternity.

Bob was appointed by President Reagan

to serve as the United States Attorney for the Northern District of Georgia (1986-90), and served as President of Southeastern Legal Foundation (1990-91). He was an official with the CIA from 1971-78.

Barr is a speaker with the All American Speakers Bureau ([www.allamericanspeakers.com](http://www.allamericanspeakers.com)). He has traveled widely and spoken to audiences across America and internationally, and has served as an official member of the U.S. delegation at several major United Nations conferences.

Wayne is a Lifetime member of the Libertarian Party, and proudly dedicated to the cause of liberty.

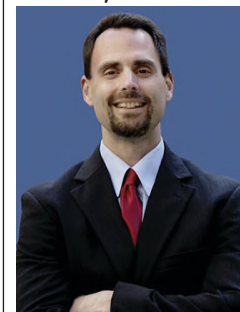

## Libertarian Munger Challenges North Carolina Political Elite

been shut out of five media-sponsored debates. "The candidates from the two state-sponsored parties are the culprit," Munger explains. "The media sponsors of the debates would be happy to include me, if the Democrat and Republican candidates would allow it."

In addition to Munger's troubles with the establishment candidates, the Libertarian Party of North Carolina also faces a battle with the state over party recognition. When the state officially derecognized the party in 2005, the LPNC lost nearly 13,000 members. The Party recently regained its party status in May, but because the state dragged its feet on posting the new forms for party affiliate, the Party has had trouble rebuilding its registered voter list. "How can we register people as Libertarian when they won't change the forms?" Munger wrote in a recent e-mail. "The state is intentionally dragging its feet, in violation of the law."

Despite these hurdles, Munger remains optimistic. "This is a great

year to be a Libertarian," he says. "We have a fantastic Presidential candidate, and number of exciting and dynamic candidates in the state races. There is a real ground swell against the 'politics as usual' approach of candidates from both of the state-sponsored parties. I am very excited, and proud to be a part of such an historic election."

Radio ads purchased with the donations from his "money grenade"—which raised \$2,500 more than expected—will begin airing soon during the morning drive in the three largest media markets in North Carolina. Advertisements, as well as earned media, are key components of Munger's statewide campaign. "The news media has been quite fair," Munger says, adding that he has received "solid and consistent coverage" from the major state newspapers.

Overall, Munger hopes to make an impact in North Carolina politics by showing that the Libertarian Party is a viable alternative to establishment candidates (and many times in North Carolina it is the only other option in a seat that would have

gone unopposed). "Any 'third party' candidate is hoping to raise issues that otherwise will be ignored," says Munger. "I can make a difference by forcing the candidates of the state-sponsored parties to have to face those issues."

Early last month, Munger was polling at 4 percent—a number that looks to increase as Libertarian Party presidential candidate Bob Barr gains momentum in the state. With a solid foundation already set, Munger could very well shake up the political establishment in North Carolina.

Let us welcome those who express a desire to return America back to the principles on which it was founded. The future of our nation relies on it.

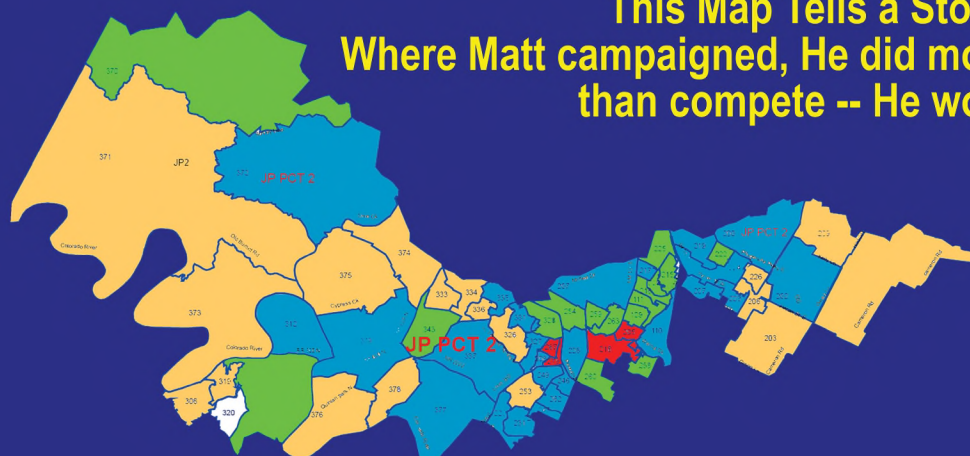
