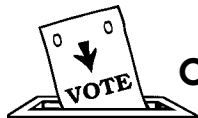

CANDIDATES NEEDED FOR CAMPAIGN 2002

Campaign 2000 may have just ended, but we must prepare ourselves for Campaign 2002. The primary election will be March 5, 2002, so the filing deadlines soon will be upon us. The first day to take out papers will be September 28, 2001. The whole process is complicated by reapportionment, the change of districts required by the new census figures. We don't know yet the new district boundaries, but hopefully the Legislature will tell us before long.

Libertarians are needed to run for 164 partisan offices. They are:

- 7 statewide offices — Governor, Lt. Governor, Secretary of State, Controller, Treasurer, Attorney General and Insurance Commissioner.
- 4 seats on the State Board of Equalization
- 53 seats in the U. S. House of Representatives (California has gained one seat.)
- 20 seats in the State Senate (even districts)
- All 80 seats in the State Assembly

In order to run, all candidates must be registered to vote as Libertarians. There was a deadline of about November 2000 if you were registered in another party before that. If you are registered Decline to State or not registered to vote at all, the deadline is coming up soon (August 2001) so be sure to register. Candidates for State Senate, State Assembly and Board of Equalization must live in their districts. Congressional candidates do not have to.

Getting on the ballot (and avoiding the filing fee) requires collecting signatures from 10% of the registered Libertarians in the district (or 150, whichever is less). The signature count will range from 40 to 150, depending on the area. The party will provide the lists of registrants. Candidates whose districts overlap can coordinate efforts, and some candidates have registered all new Libertarian voters to sign the petitions. It's not as hard as it sounds to get on the ballot. Since we first gained ballot status for the 1980 election, hundreds of Libertarians have done it.

In 2000 we had a record 113 candidates run for the 153 positions available. Some ran active campaigns and others didn't do much at all. The minimum the party asks is that a candidate be well-versed on Libertarian positions, be willing to answer questionnaires from special interest groups, speak to the news media when they call, and attend candidates forums. Beyond that, it's up to the candidate. Remember, it's important to have Libertarians on the ballot to give each voter a true alternative.

LIBERTARIAN PARTY UPDATES

FROM THE CHAIR:



Please read my previous column in the online June issue of this newsletter. It contains important information on deadlines for filing ballot arguments on local initiatives going on the ballot in November. Web address is <http://www.ca.lp.org/lpcm/>

This is probably the longest and most controversial column I've ever written. Recently, a prominent Libertarian gave me some advice. He told me that we needed to find one very promising partisan race and focus all of our resources there.

This was my response: normally, 80% or more of registered Republicans who vote, cast their ballot for a Republican candidate, an 80%+ loyalty rate. Democrat voters have a 75%+ loyalty rate. No matter how much advertising or messages they hear, these 75%+ (and 80%+) voters will not change their voting patterns.

To bring this thought home and personal, answer this question to yourself: How much more money should Al Gore have spent on advertising in order for YOU to have changed your vote to him?

Democrats and Republicans have what are known as "targeted races." These are races where the number of voters willing to switch from one party to another is higher than the margin of victory. They focus their resources and their best candidates there. Victory is won on the margin.

Other districts are thought of as "safe districts" — Democrats and Republicans believe it is impossible to affect the outcome of a race no matter how much money or volunteers they pour into the district. It is not unusual for Democrats and Republicans to not run candidates in some of these districts. For the same reason, the level of spending in these races tends to be lower.

When it comes to partisan races, there are no Libertarian "safe districts." Now, here's the part you may not want to read: Unfortunately, I believe there are no races where the voter loyalty rates among Democrats and Republicans are so low that there are enough persuadable voters to score a partisan Libertarian victory.

So what do we do to implement Libertarian policies so that we can positively affect our level of freedom? In my opinion, we need to focus on the low-hanging fruit, the low-level, non-partisan races where the likelihood of winning is much higher. Operation Breakthrough proved that by running a large quantity of candidates in these low-level races and with very little resources per candidate, we were able to achieve victory in 8 out of every 100 races, much higher than the 0 out of every 100 races in partisan races.

Assuming you're willing to financially support this, it is my intention to scale up this project so that we can run hundreds of candidates next year. Combined with some better candidate training, perhaps we can raise the percentages a bit to 12 out of every 100 races, perhaps even better. Is this as exciting as attempting to win a partisan race next year? No, but it does seem to work.

Does that mean we shouldn't run partisan candidates? No, we absolutely **MUST** run partisan candidates. These candidates can be very effective in introducing more people to our movement and getting more members into the party so that some day we will be able to win partisan races. The first Libertarian I ever met — I was 16 at the time — was a candidate running for State Assembly. Without him, I may not be here in this movement today. So, I suppose if anyone ever gets really mad at me, I should direct his or her ire to this man, my friend, Daniel Wiener. People should feel free to direct any messages of disappointment and anger to him at wiener@zerocall.com. (Dan, feel free to thank me at any time for directing more e-mail traffic to you.)

If it were up to me, I'd have every partisan candidate focusing on making presentations in front of high school and college classrooms. This audience is composed of many voters, and soon to be voters, who are not yet aligned with any political party. They are our future. By September, I hope that we can put together a standard speech and collateral materials for these candidates to make them more effective at this approach. If it were up to me, I'd hand out awards each year to the partisan candidates who got the highest number of prospects to call 800 ELECTUS for more information (or alternatively, to those candidates who got the highest number of new members).

Of course, I'm just a chairman, not a czar, so I'll need to try and be as persuasive as I can. (For the record, I don't want to be a czar.)

I realize that not everyone will agree with this approach. And I respect those who disagree with it. If someone can show me another approach that has some evidence that it works, I'd be very interested in looking at it. I'm always willing to listen.

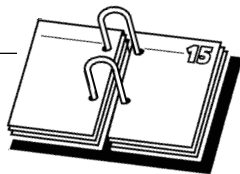

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S JOURNAL

Saturday, June 2, 2001: 5:30 AM.

The alarm rings and I quickly shut it off so that it doesn't wake up my sleeping wife and one-year-old son. I am definitely not an early riser. I shuffle into the shower as I start thinking about the day: I am travelling to San Jose for the quarterly meeting of the LPC's Executive Committee, the policy-setting board to which I answer.

I leave the house just before 7:00 am and make it to Burbank Airport by 7:15. As I sit in the terminal with heavy eyelids, I am greeted with a "Hello, Juan!" by Ted Brown, longtime member of the LPC Executive Committee. It turns out Ted and I are on the same flight, as is LPC Chairman Aaron Starr, who shows up a little later.

LPC Treasurer Lori Adasiewicz meets us at San Jose Airport to take us to the meeting location, a Holiday Inn Express hotel a few miles from the airport. The meeting goes well. I am armed with my Executive Director's Report, a document detailing all of my activities in the preceding quarter. It usually takes me an entire day to prepare that report, and I present the highlights at every meeting. (Executive Director's Reports can be viewed on the LPC web site at www.ca.lp.org.)

The meeting ends on time for a change. Ted, Aaron, and I head back to the airport for our return flight. It's been a long day; I am home again at 9:00 PM, but my son has already fallen asleep for the night. At least someone in the family is getting enough rest. I make a mental note to be extra attentive to him tomorrow.

Friday, June 8: 4:30 AM.

Here we go again. Another early flight, another night of interrupted sleep. The destination today: Oregon, where I have been invited by the state LP there to give a talk on being a state party executive director. My flight lands in Portland at 9:30 AM, when the state chair and his wife pick me up. We drive three hours to the coastal location of the convention, the beach town of Newport.

By the time we arrive in the early afternoon I am needing a nap badly. My beach-front hotel room looks out over the Pacific Ocean. As the crashing waves lull me to sleep I worry because I have yet to write my talk for the next day. After dinner I go in search of ice cream but a sudden torrential downpour prevents me from succeeding.

Saturday, June 9:

I give my 30-minute talk to a lunch crowd of about 40 Oregon Libertarians. The talk was written late the previous night over coffee and a slice of caramel pecan cheesecake. Fortunately, everyone seems pleased. I am gratified at being able to help out another state party considering making the big move to hiring paid staff.

The one snag in the day: no one has figured out how to get me back to Portland the next morning in time for my early morning flight back to Burbank.

BONNIE FLICKINGER LIBERTARIAN HERO!

For the past nine years the citizens of Moreno Valley have been privileged to have a strong and effective voice for liberty serving them in city government.

Libertarian Bonnie Flickinger currently holds the office of Mayor in Moreno Valley. She was first elected in 1992,

and won re-election in both 1994 and 1998. Moreno Valley is the largest American city (pop. 136,000) ever to have a Libertarian Mayor.

Flickinger is currently one of the highest elected Libertarians in the country. And with three straight municipal victories under her belt, she is also one of the most successful candidates the party has ever seen. A few highlights of Mayor Bonnie Flickinger's career in Moreno Valley:

- Defeated ordinance that would have made "possession of a graffiti implement by a minor" a crime. Replaced it with ordinance which requires restitution by the taggers.
- Repealed ordinance which said that you couldn't have a business operation in your two-car garage unless you could still park two cars in it.
- Got City Council meetings televised resulting in less political wheeler-dealing.
- Defeated proposal to build an \$18 million baseball stadium with the taxpayers' money.
- Brochure listing city services formerly cost taxpayers \$1 each to print. Now it's paid for by local businesses' advertising.
- Turned the operation of the library system over to a private company.

The two smaller measures passed; the three larger measures failed, including Measure A, for which the LPSM was the only organized opposition. The arguments against all 5 measures in the ballot pamphlets were sponsored by the LP of SM County ("LPSM"), authored by yours truly.

We saved taxpayers \$170 million in the Sequoia UHSD (with interest) and another \$26 million (rough estimate) in the Belmont/Redwood Shores ESD. We and some non-libertarian allies saved taxpayers a further \$27 million in San Bruno. Total taxes averted? \$223 million for this special election alone.

Ultimately, of course, it was the participating voters who defeated the larger measures — but we articulated the reasons for them to do so.

The successful Millbrae bond measure shows why they use stealth elections. Only 2302 of Millbrae's 10815 voters (21%) voted for the measure, but, with the low turnout, that was sufficient to saddle all of the city's 22,000 residents with millions in new public debt. Similarly, 25% of Atherton's voters approved their tax. Only 14% of the registered voters in the Sequoia UHSD district voted for Measure A, but they very nearly pulled it off anyway. Yikes!

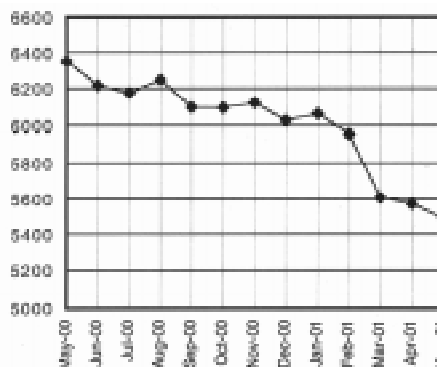

WHAT I SAW AT THE REVOLUTION (SO FAR)

It's a mixed bag. Some things surprised me and some didn't. Sometimes the Libertarian solution is obvious and sometimes it isn't.

I DO always try to keep my mission in mind – to increase the net amount of freedom in the world. The “eye on the prize” part is easy. The mixed bag part comes in where I try to figure out the best way to accomplish it.

STUFF THAT SURPRISED ME

Sometimes it's really hard to figure out where the money is coming from:

- We have block grants

- We have trusts

- We have property tax dollars (OK, that one is easy).

- We have Qwimby fees

- We had ERAF money, but the State took it back before I was on board.

And as I said earlier, sometimes it's hard to know WHAT the most Libertarian solution is.

STUFF THAT DIDN'T

There ARE good people in government. Many of them hate waste, hate asking the taxpayers for money, and want to reduce the size of government. I think this bears repeating because libertarians often seem to have this mindset that ALL government people are moronic, jack-booted thugs. This is simply not the case. I am working harder than I thought I would.

We often think that the Libertarian solution is obvious. But often it's not. Case in point: We have what we call a Special Assessment District. The people voted it onto themselves last year, before I was on board. The votes were weighted according to the amount of property tax you paid; i.e., if you paid \$10,000 in property taxes and voted NO, it took 10 YES votes from taxpayers who paid \$1000 to cancel out your vote. And it passed with about 60% of the vote.

But, the catch is, the Board has to re-approve it every year. With a possible 3% increase. The obvious Libertarian solution is to vote NO, right? Well, what happens if every one who shows up at the public hearing wants it? What happens if the people want it because they've crunched the numbers, and have figured out that the addition \$24 per year they are paying (or \$24.72 with the 3% increase), is more than offset by the increase in their property values due to having great parks in the neighborhood?

It's going to pass whether I vote NO or not. Can I more effectively increase the net amount of freedom in the world by working hard to eliminate (or at least reduce) the 3% increase? Of course if I do that, I have to vote yes on the measure.

These are the kinds of things I (and all the elected Libertarians after me) will have to address. As you can probably see, I have barely gotten my feet wet. Ask me in four years, I may have some very different answers!

LPC Convention UPDATE

YOUR IDEAS NEEDED FOR THE NEW LPC PROGRAM!

The first LPC Program will be adopted at the 2002 Convention

The LPC Program will be an important outreach product — marketed to the public, used to draw new members, Libertarian registered voters and donors, and used by candidates. It is to contain practical libertarian solutions to societal problems, solutions which bring society closer to that conceived in the Statement of Principles and Platform.

Bylaw changes to create the LPC Program were passed at the 2001 LPC Convention. The process for adopting and approving the Program is similar to that for the Platform. Each region selects delegates to the Program Committee at least 30 days prior to the Convention (Bylaw 12, Section 3). The Program Committee meets at the Convention. It then reports its recommendations to the Convention floor, plank by plank, until five planks have been adopted. If less than five have been approved and if time permits, any delegate may propose a new plank or amendment from the floor (Rule 15, Section 3).

Since currently there is no program, discussion throughout the Party, well in advance, will be necessary to secure enough agreement so that an adequate, quality program will be adopted, especially given the limited time at the Convention. Regions should choose their Program representatives as soon as possible. The more advance work done, the more smoothly things will go at the Convention.

The Executive Committee has selected Lawrence Samuels (lawsamz@hotmail.com, 831-626-8417) and Bruce Dovner (bdovner@artnet.net, 310-327-9005) to be program coordinators pro tem. The actual Program Coordinator will "be appointed by the Executive Committee at least 30 days before the convention" (Bylaw 12, Section 3).

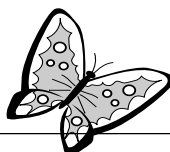
