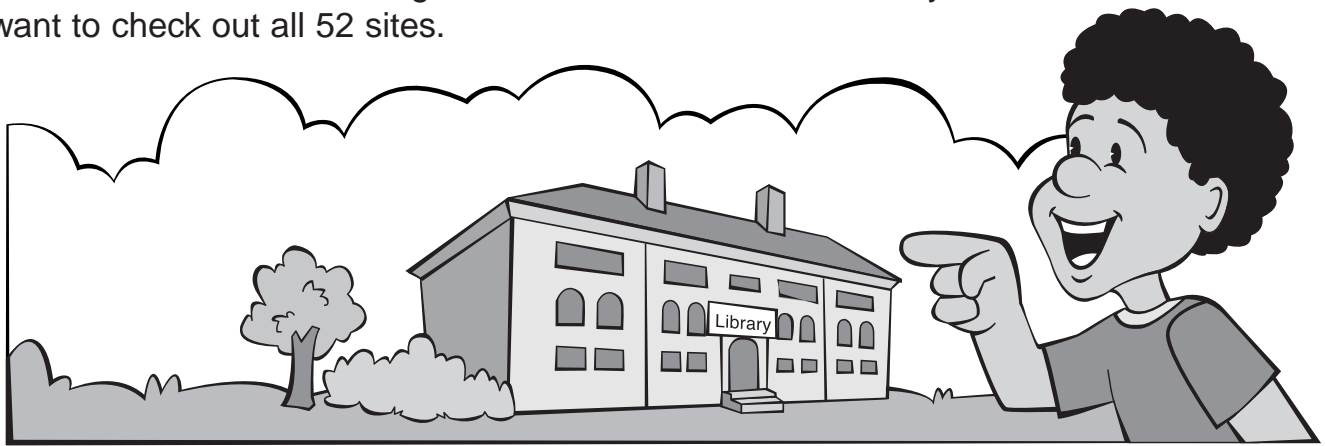

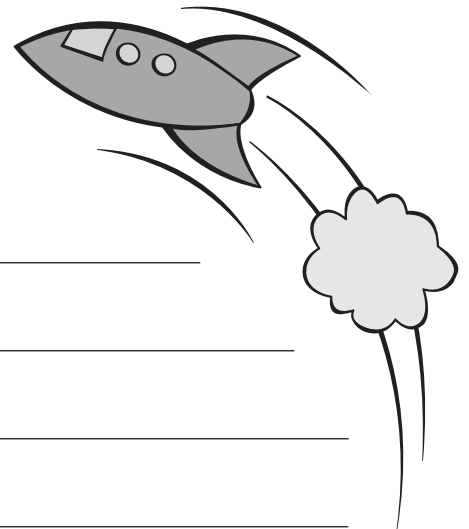
## What's at the library?
