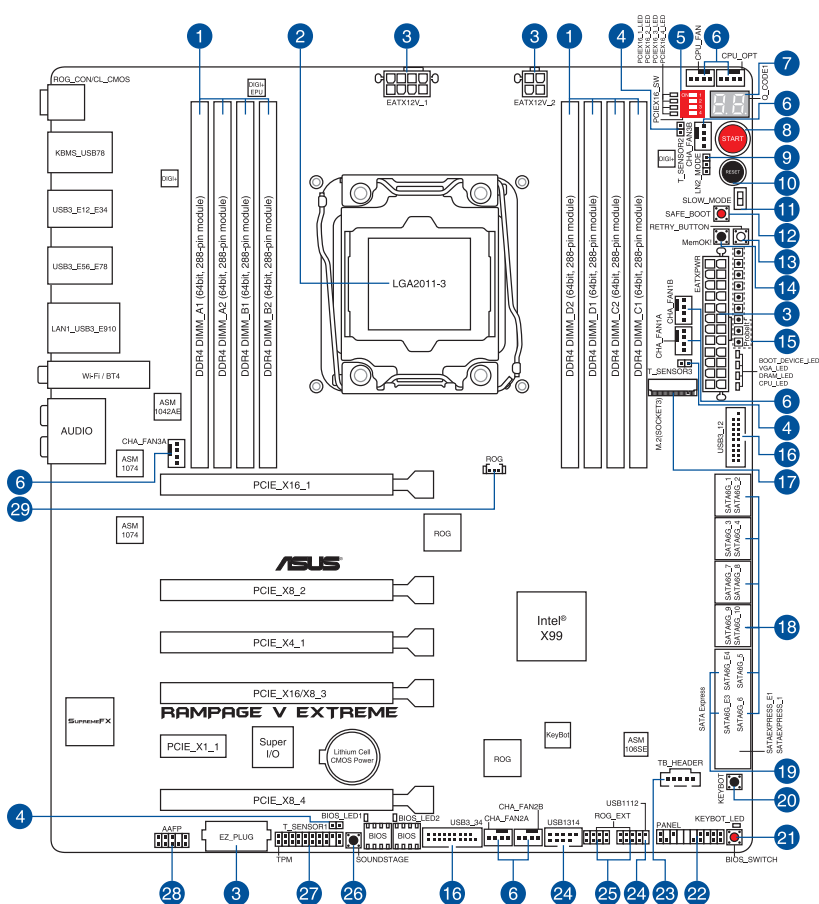
### 1.2.1 Before you proceed

Take note of the following precautions before you install motherboard components or change any motherboard settings.

- Unplug the power cord from the wall socket before touching any component.
  - Before handling components, use a grounded wrist strap or touch a safely grounded object or a metal object, such as the power supply case, to avoid damaging them due to static electricity.
  - Hold components by the edges to avoid touching the ICs on them.
  - Whenever you uninstall any component, place it on a grounded antistatic pad or in the bag that came with the component.
  - Before you install or remove any component, ensure that the ATX power supply is switched off or the power cord is detached from the power supply. Failure to do so may cause severe damage to the motherboard, peripherals, or components.

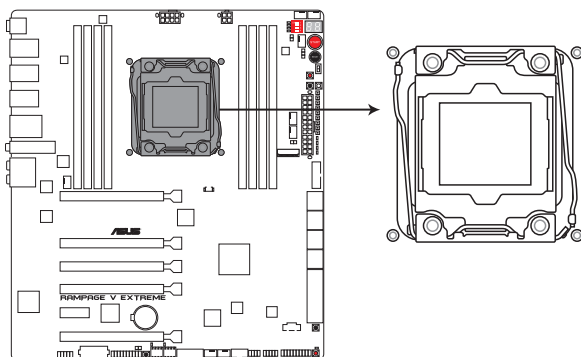

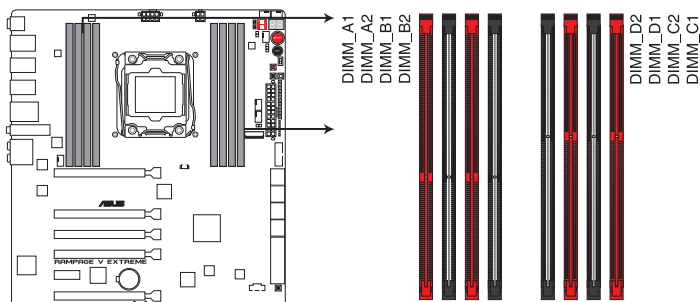

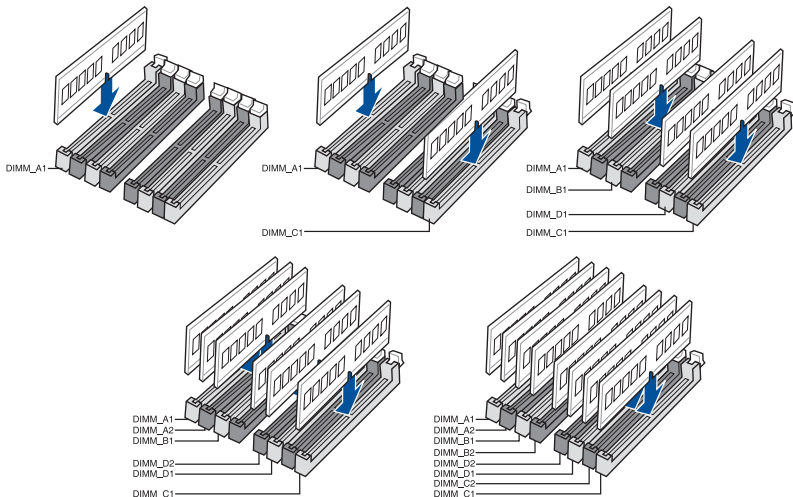


A DDR4 module is notched differently from a DDR3 or DDR2 module. DO NOT install a DDR3 or DDR2 memory module to the DDR4 slot.

- You may install varying memory sizes in Channel A, Channel B, Channel C, and Channel D. The system maps the total size of the lower-sized channel for the dual-channel configuration. Any excess memory from the higher-sized channel is then mapped for single-channel operation.
  - According to Intel® CPU spec, DIMM voltage below 1.65V is recommended to protect the CPU.
  - Always install DIMMs with the same CAS latency. For optimum compatibility, we recommend that you obtain memory modules from the same vendor.
  - Due to the memory address limitation on 32-bit Windows® OS, when you install 4GB or more memory on the motherboard, the actual usable memory for the OS can be about 3GB or less. For effective use of memory, we recommend that you do any of the following:

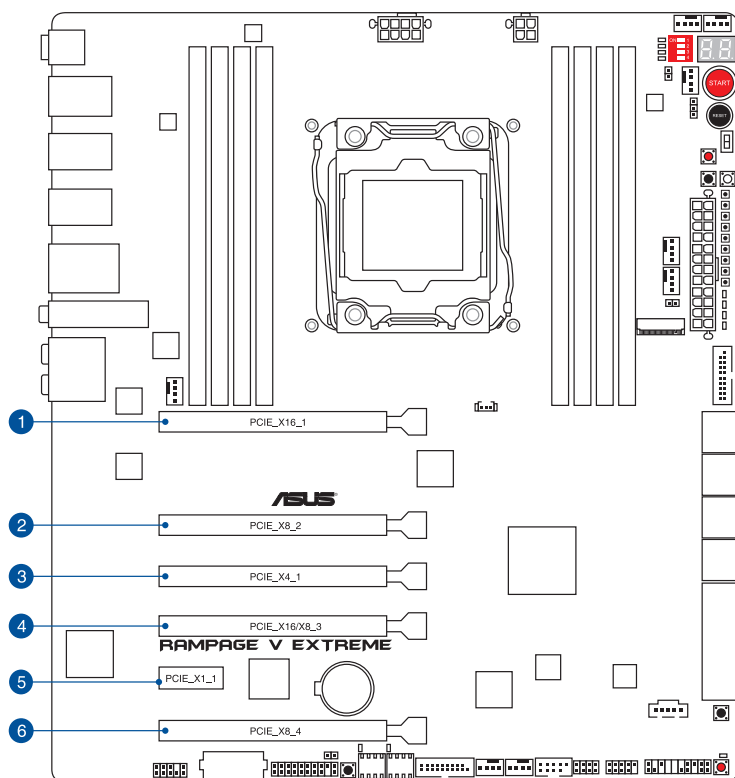

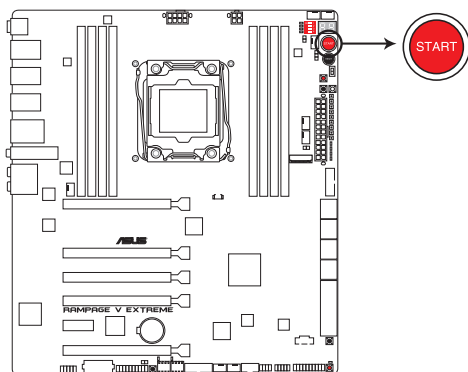

## 1.2.6 Onboard buttons and switches

Onboard buttons and switches allow you to fine-tune performance when working on a bare or open-case system. This is ideal for overclockers and gamers who continually change settings to enhance system performance.

### 1. Power-on (START) button

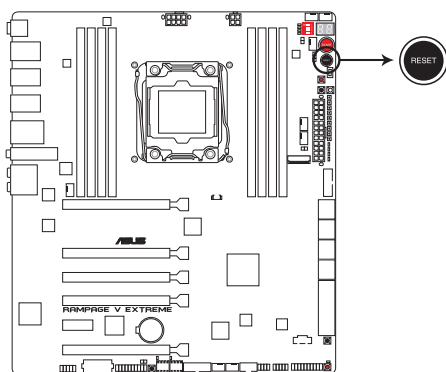
The motherboard comes with a power-on button that allows you to power up or wake up the system. The button also lights up when the system is plugged to a power source indicating that you should shut down the system and unplug the power cable before removing or installing any motherboard component.

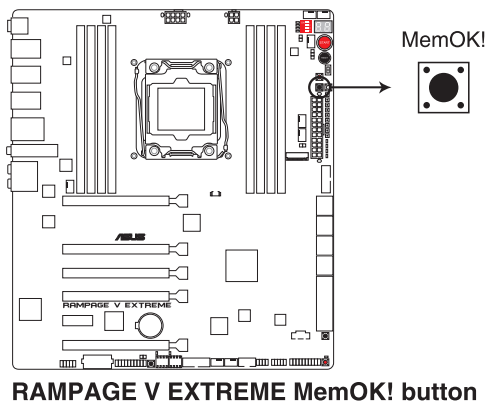

### 3. MemOK! button (MemOK!)

Installing DIMMs that are not compatible with the motherboard may cause system boot failure. One indicator is the DRAM\_LED lighting continuously.

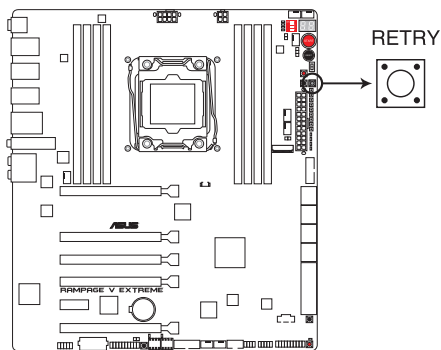
Press and hold the MemOK! button to initiate the memory compatibility tuning process that can help lead to a successful boot.



- Refer to the **Onboard LEDs** section for the exact location of the DRAM\_LED.
- The DRAM\_LED also lights up when the DIMM is not properly installed. Turn off the system and reinstall the DIMM before using the MemOK! function.
- The MemOK! button does not function under Windows® OS environment.
- During the tuning process, the system loads and tests failsafe memory settings. It takes about 30 seconds for the system to test one set of failsafe settings. If the test fails, the system reboots and test the next set of failsafe settings. The blinking speed of the DRAM\_LED increases, indicating different test processes.
- Due to memory tuning requirement, the system automatically reboots when each timing set is tested. If the installed DIMMs still fail to boot after the tuning process is completed, the DRAM\_LED lights continuously. Replace the DIMMs with ones recommended in the Memory QVL (Qualified Vendors Lists) in this user manual or at [www.asus.com](http://www.asus.com).
- If you turn off the computer and replace DIMMs during the tuning process, the system continues memory tuning after turning on the computer. To stop memory tuning, turn off the computer and unplug the power cord for about 5–10 seconds.
- If your system fails to boot up due to BIOS overlocking, press the MemOK! button to boot and load the BIOS default settings. A message will appear during POST to remind you that the BIOS has been restored to its default settings.
- We recommend that you download and update to the latest BIOS version from [www.asus.com](http://www.asus.com) after using the MemOK! function.

#### 4. ReTry button (RETRY)

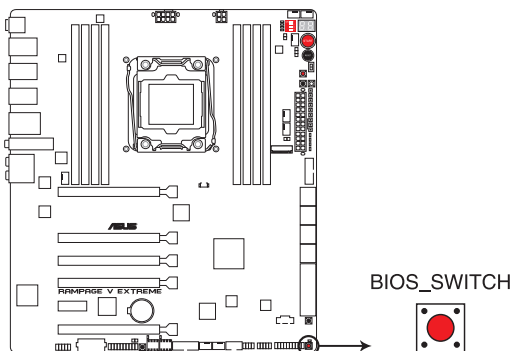
The ReTry button is specially designed for overclockers and is most useful during the booting process where the Reset button is rendered useless. When pressed, it forces the system to reboot while retaining the same settings to be retried in quick succession to achieve a successful POST.

## 10. Slow Mode Switch (SLOW\_MODE)

Slow Mode Switch is employed during LN2 benching. Some processors have a small optimum temperature range to run at their highest frequency. Temperatures that fall outside this band may yield instability. For example, a processor may need to operate at -80°C under load and only 75°C when idle to maintain stability at 5.8GHz.

At lower frequencies, the CPU's temperature tolerance increases. It will however remain stable at lower frequencies at much colder or warmer temperatures. Once it comes out of a heavy load while transitioning over to a light load, when the temperature does not warm fast enough, it may crash. To overcome this, simply flip the switch over to decrease the processor frequency. Switching over to Slow-Mode during critical moments when Temperature/Max Frequency alignment is off-sync can prevent a lot of crashes, even when trying to boot into the OS at cold temperatures.



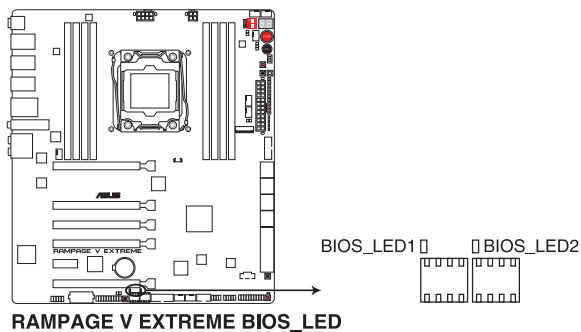

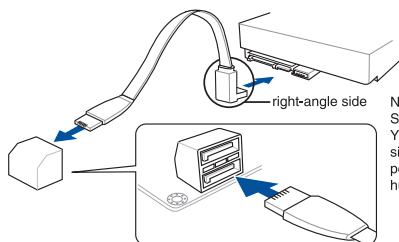
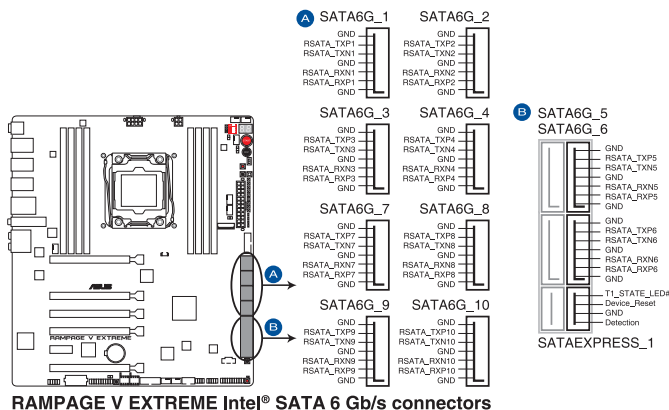


## 1.2.9 Internal connectors

## 6. USB 2.0 connectors (10-1 pin USB1112; USB1314)

These connectors are for USB 2.0 ports. Connect the USB module cable to any of these connectors, then install the module to a slot opening at the back of the system chassis. These USB connectors comply with USB 2.0 specification that support up to 480 Mbps connection speed.

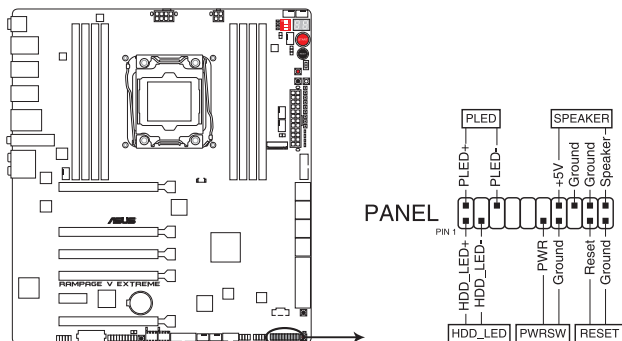


- For a fully configured system, we recommend that you use a power supply unit (PSU) that complies with ATX 12 V Specification 2.0 (or later version) and provides a minimum power of 450 W.
- Do not forget to connect the 4-pin/8-pin EATX12 V power plug; otherwise, the system will not boot.
- Connect the 4-pin EZ\_PLUG power plugs to ensure sufficient power when you install multiple graphics cards.
- Use of a PSU with higher power output is recommended when configuring a system with more power-consuming devices. The system may become unstable or may not boot up if the power is inadequate.
- If you want to use two or more high-end PCI Express x16 cards, use a PSU with at least 1000W of output power to ensure system stability.



### 13. System panel connector (20-8 pin PANEL)

This connector supports several chassis-mounted functions.

- **ATX power button/soft-off button (2-pin PWRSW)**

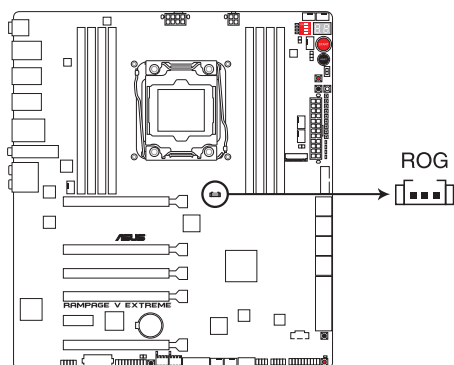
This connector is for the system power button. Pressing the power button turns the system on or puts the system in sleep or soft-off mode depending on the BIOS settings. Pressing the power switch for more than four seconds while the system is ON turns the system OFF.

- **Reset button (2-pin RESET)**

This 2-pin connector is for the chassis-mounted reset button for system reboot without turning off the system power.

#### 14. ROG Logo LED connector (3-pin ROG)

This connector is for the box (labelled **Republic of Gamers**) below the CPU socket. Connect the box's cable to this connector. The box lights up when you turn on the system.

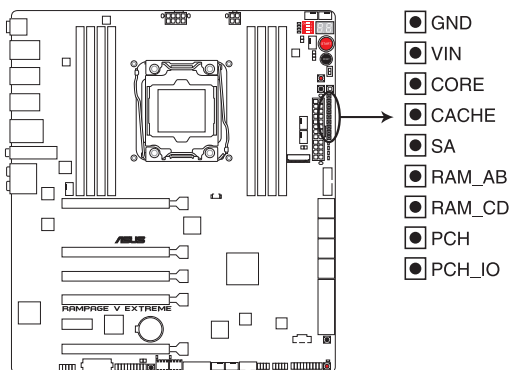

### Installing the ASUS 3T3R dual band Wi-Fi antenna

To install the ASUS 3T3R dual band Wi-Fi antenna, connect the bundled ASUS 3T3R dual band Wi-Fi antenna connector to the Wi-Fi ports at the back of the chassis.



- Ensure that the ASUS 3T3R dual band Wi-Fi antenna is securely installed to the Wi-Fi ports.
- Ensure to install the Bluetooth driver before installing the Wi-Fi GO! software.



The illustration above is for reference only. The I/O port layout may vary with models, but the Wi-Fi antenna installation procedure is the same for all models.

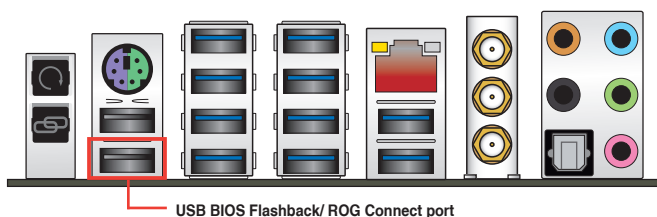
## 2.2 BIOS update utility

### USB BIOS Flashback

USB BIOS Flashback allows you to easily update the BIOS without entering the existing BIOS or operating system. Simply insert a USB storage device to the USB port specially allocated for the USB BIOS Flashback feature then press the ROG Connect button for three seconds. The BIOS will be updated automatically.

To use USB BIOS Flashback:

1. Download the latest BIOS file from the ASUS website
2. Extract and rename the BIOS image file to **R5E.CAP**.
3. Copy **R5E.CAP** to the root directory of the USB flash disk drive.
4. Turn off the system and insert the USB storage device to the ROG Connect port.
5. Press the ROG Connect button and release when a flashing light appears, which indicates that the BIOS Flashback function is enabled.
6. Wait until the light goes out, indicating that the BIOS updating process is completed.



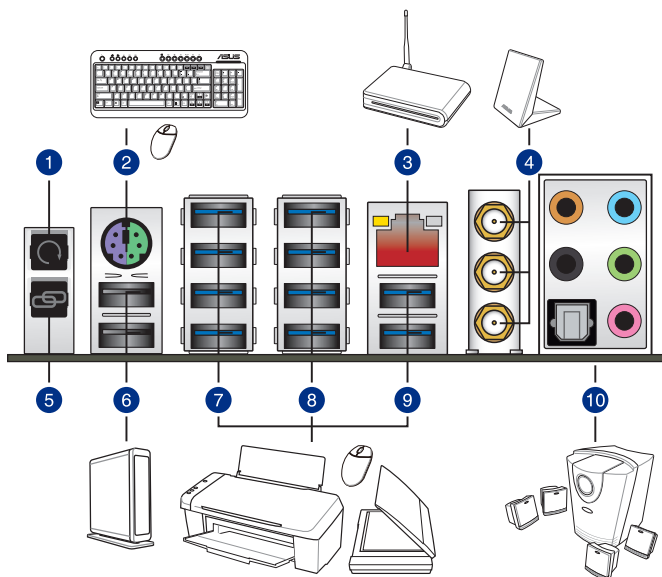

## 2.4 OC Panel

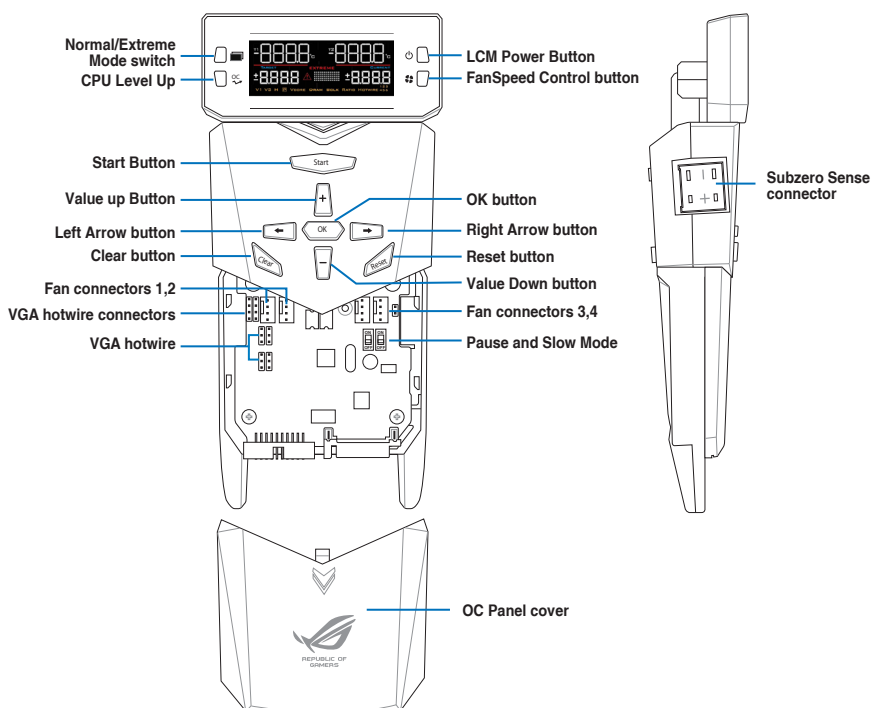
The OC Panel is a device that allows you to overclock your PC without the need to go to the BIOS settings or use software utilities. You can setup the OC Panel in an available 5.25-inch drive bay on your computer chassis (Normal Mode) or as an external handheld console on an “open-air” OC test bench (Extreme Mode).

These modes are further explained in the succeeding subsections.

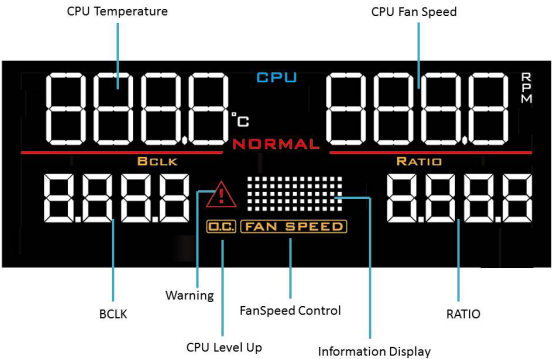


- Ensure that your system has adequate cooling designed for overclocking before using the OC Panel.
- Ensure to update your OC Panel's firmware. Visit [www.asus.com](http://www.asus.com) for the latest firmware and updates about the OC Panel.
- Ensure that you have installed ROG Connect Plus driver for the NORMAL Mode of the OC Panel.

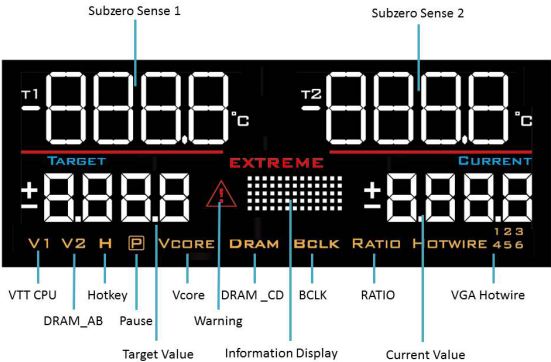

## 2.4.2 Setting up your OC Panel in Normal Mode

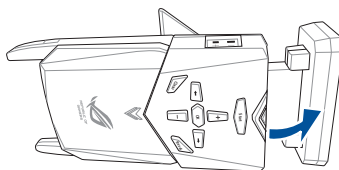


Ensure that you have installed ROG Connect Plus driver for the NORMAL Mode of the OC Panel.

The OC Panel in Normal Mode mainly provides easy access buttons for increasing your CPU's frequency level, adjusting fan speeds, and customizing overclocking profiles. It also displays vital information about your computer's CPU temperature, ratio, base clock, and CPU fan speed (RPM).

To set up your OC Panel in Normal Mode:

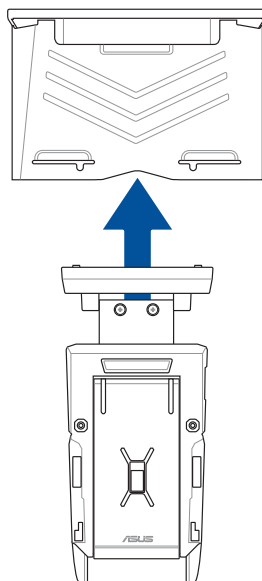
1. Tilt the OC Panel LCM display until it is perpendicular to the body of OC Panel.



2. Prepare the bundled OC Panel 5.25-inch drive bay metal case and set of two (2) screws.
3. Align and insert the OC Panel into the OC Panel 5.25-inch drive bay metal case.



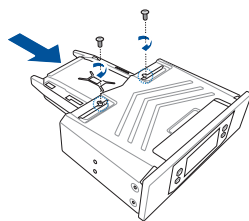

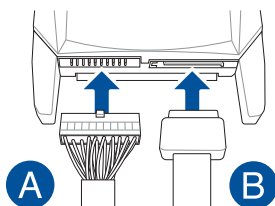
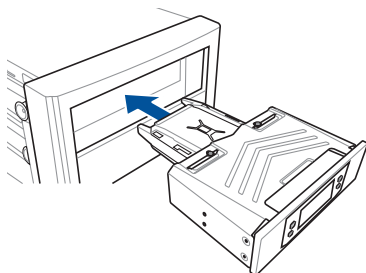
4. Secure the OC Panel to the OC Panel 5.25-inch drive bay metal case with the two (2) screws.



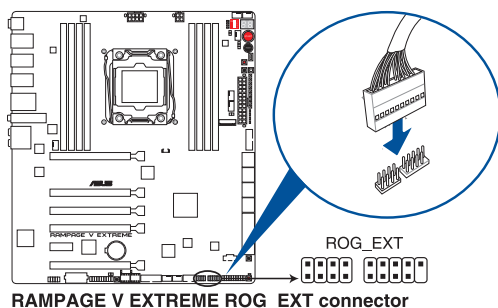
Ensure that the OC Panel fits snugly into the OC Panel 5.25-inch drive bay metal case.



5. Shut down your computer.
6. Open your computer chassis and remove the front cover of an available 5.25-inch drive bay.
7. Align and insert the OC Panel and the OC Panel 5.25-inch drive bay metal case assembly into the drive bay.
8. Secure the OC Panel and the OC Panel 5.25-inch drive bay metal case assembly into the drive bay with four (4) screws.
9. Connect the OC Panel data cable (A) and a SATA Power cable (B) to the OC Panel.



10. Locate the ROG\_EXT connector on the motherboard and connect the OC Panel cable.



11. Boot your computer.
12. Press the OC Panel LCM Power button to turn on the OC Panel LCM display.

### 2.4.3 Setting up your OC Panel in Extreme Mode

The OC Panel in Extreme Mode is set up with an open chassis system or “open-air” OC test bed assembly and enjoyed as a handheld console to perform overclocking and voltage tuning.

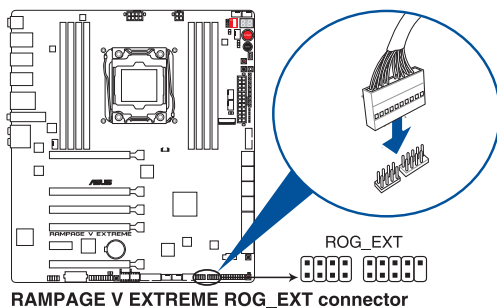
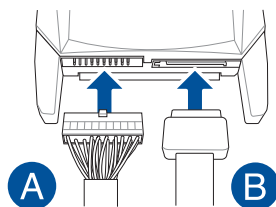
When in Extreme Mode, you can utilize more features such as Subzero Sense and VGA Hotwire. It also comes with some of the most commonly used voltage tuning presets that are preconfigured for the optimum overclocking experience at your convenience.



Extreme Mode capabilities including V1, V2, DRAM, and other voltage definitions vary by chipset. Please refer to your motherboard manual for details.

To setup the OC Panel in Extreme Mode:

1. Shut down your computer.
2. Connect the OC Panel cable (A) and a SATA Power cable (B) to the OC Panel.
3. Locate the ROG\_EXT connector on the motherboard and connect the OC Panel cable.



4. Boot your computer.
5. Press the OC Panel power button to turn on the OC Panel LCM display.

## 2.5 Starting up for the first time

1. After making all the connections, replace the system case cover.
2. Ensure that all switches are off.
3. Connect the power cord to the power connector at the back of the system chassis.
4. Connect the power cord to a power outlet that is equipped with a surge protector.
5. Turn on the devices in the following order:
  - a. Monitor
  - b. External SCSI devices (starting with the last device on the chain)
  - c. System power
6. After applying power, the system power LED on the system front panel case lights up. For systems with ATX power supplies, the system LED lights up when you press the ATX power button. If your monitor complies with the green standards or if it has a power standby feature, the monitor LED may light up or change from orange to green after the system LED turns on.

The system then runs the power-on self tests (POST). While the tests are running, the BIOS beeps (refer to the BIOS beep codes table) or additional messages may appear on the screen. If you do not see anything within 30 seconds from the time you turned on the power, the system may have failed a power-on test. Check the jumper settings and connections or call your retailer for assistance.

BIOS Beep	Description
One short beep	VGA detected Quick boot set to disabled No keyboard detected
One continuous beep followed by two short beeps then a pause (repeated)	No memory detected
One continuous beep followed by three short beeps	No VGA detected
One continuous beep followed by four short beeps	Hardware component failure

7. Hold down the <Delete> key during power on to enter the BIOS Setup. Follow the instructions in Chapter 3.

## 2.6 Turning off the computer

While the system is ON, press the power button for less than four seconds to put the system to sleep mode or soft-off mode, depending on the BIOS setting. Press the power switch for more than four seconds to let the system enter the soft-off mode regardless of the BIOS setting.

## 3.1 Knowing BIOS



The new ASUS UEFI BIOS is a Unified Extensible Interface that complies with UEFI architecture, offering a user-friendly interface that goes beyond the traditional keyboard-only BIOS controls to enable a more flexible and convenient mouse input. You can easily navigate the new UEFI BIOS with the same smoothness as your operating system. The term "BIOS" in this user manual refers to "UEFI BIOS" unless otherwise specified.

BIOS (Basic Input and Output System) stores system hardware settings such as storage device configuration, overclocking settings, advanced power management, and boot device configuration that are needed for system startup in the motherboard CMOS. In normal circumstances, the default BIOS settings apply to most conditions to ensure optimal performance. **DO NOT change the default BIOS settings** except in the following circumstances:

- An error message appears on the screen during the system bootup and requests you to run the BIOS Setup.
- You have installed a new system component that requires further BIOS settings or update.



Inappropriate BIOS settings may result to instability or boot failure. **We strongly recommend that you change the BIOS settings only with the help of a trained service personnel.**



When downloading or updating the BIOS file, rename it as **R5E.CAP** for this motherboard.

## 3.2 BIOS setup program

Use the BIOS Setup to update the BIOS or configure its parameters. The BIOS screen includes navigation keys and a brief on-screen tip to help guide you in using the BIOS Setup program.

### Entering BIOS at startup

To enter BIOS Setup at startup, press <Delete> during the Power-On Self Test (POST). If you do not press <Delete>, the computer continues to boot normally.

### Entering BIOS Setup after POST

To enter BIOS Setup after POST:

- Press <Ctrl>+<Alt>+<Delete> simultaneously.
- Press the reset button on the system chassis.
- Press the DirectKey button on the motherboard. You can perform this option if the DirectKey item is enabled in the BIOS Setup. See the section about **Boot Menu** on **Chapter 3** for more information in enabling the DirectKey function in BIOS.
- Press the power button to turn the system off then back on. Do this option only if you failed to enter BIOS Setup using the previous options.



- 
- The BIOS setup screens shown in this section are for reference purposes only, and may not exactly match what you see on your screen.
  - Ensure that a USB mouse is connected to your motherboard if you want to use the mouse to control the BIOS setup program.
  - If the system becomes unstable after changing any BIOS setting, load the default settings to ensure system compatibility and stability. Select the Load Optimized Defaults item under the Exit menu or press hotkey <F5>. See the section about Exit menu on Chapter 3 for more information.
  - If the system fails to boot after changing any BIOS setting, use the Safe-Mode button first before trying to clear the CMOS and resetting the motherboard to the default value. For more information about the Safe-Mode button, see the Onboard buttons and switches section on Chapter 1 of this user guide. For the Clear CMOS button, see the section about Rear I/O Connection on Chapter 2.
  - The BIOS setup program does not support bluetooth devices.

### BIOS menu screen

The BIOS Setup program can be used under two modes: **EZ Mode** and **Advanced Mode**. You can change modes from the **Exit** menu or from the **Exit/Advanced Mode** screen.

## 3.2.1 EZ Mode

EZ Mode provides you with an overview of the basic system information and allows you to select the display language, system performance mode, and boot device priority. To access the Advanced Mode, click **Exit/Advanced Mode**, then select **Advanced Mode** or press the <F7> hot key for the advanced BIOS settings.



The default screen for entering the BIOS setup program can be changed. For more information, see the Setup Mode item of the Boot menu section on Chapter 3.

To access the Advanced Mode, click **Exit**, then select **Advanced Mode** or press **F7** hotkey.

#### Menu bar

The menu bar on top of the screen has the following main items:

<b>My Favorites</b>	For saving the frequently-used system settings and configuration
<b>Main</b>	For changing the basic system configuration
<b>Extreme Tweaker</b>	For changing the overclocking settings
<b>Advanced</b>	For changing the advanced system settings
<b>Monitor</b>	For displaying the system temperature, power status, and changing the fan settings
<b>Boot</b>	For changing the system boot configuration
<b>Tool</b>	For configuring options for special functions
<b>Exit</b>	For selecting the exit options and loading default settings



## Menu items

The highlighted item on the menu bar displays the specific items for that menu. For example, selecting **Main** shows the Main menu items.

The other items (My Favorites, Extreme Tweaker, Advanced, Monitor, Boot, Tool, and Exit) on the menu bar have their respective menu items.

## Back button

This button appears when entering a sub menu. Press <Esc> or use the USB mouse to click this button and return to the previous menu screen.

## Sub menu items

A greater than sign (>) before each item on any menu screen means that the item has a sub menu. To display the sub menu, select the item and press <Enter>.

## Pop-up window

Select a menu item and press <Enter> to display a pop-up window with the configuration options for that item.

## Scroll bar

A scroll bar appears on the right side of a menu screen when there are items that do not fit on the screen. Press the Up/Down arrow keys or <Page Up> / <Page Down> keys to display the other items on the screen.

## Navigation keys

At the bottom right corner of the menu screen are the navigation keys for the BIOS setup program. Use the navigation keys to select items in the menu and change the settings.



If you delete all shortcut items from the F3: Shortcut list, the default shortcut items will reappear after your next startup.

## General help

At the top right corner of the menu screen is a brief description of the selected item. Use <F12> key to capture the BIOS screen and save it to the removable storage device.

## Configuration fields

These fields show the values for the menu items. If an item is user-configurable, you can change the value in the field opposite the item. You cannot select an item that is not user-configurable.

A configurable field is highlighted when selected. To change the value of a field, select it and press <Enter> to display a list of options.

## Quick Note button

This button allows you to enter notes of any modifications you have made in BIOS.



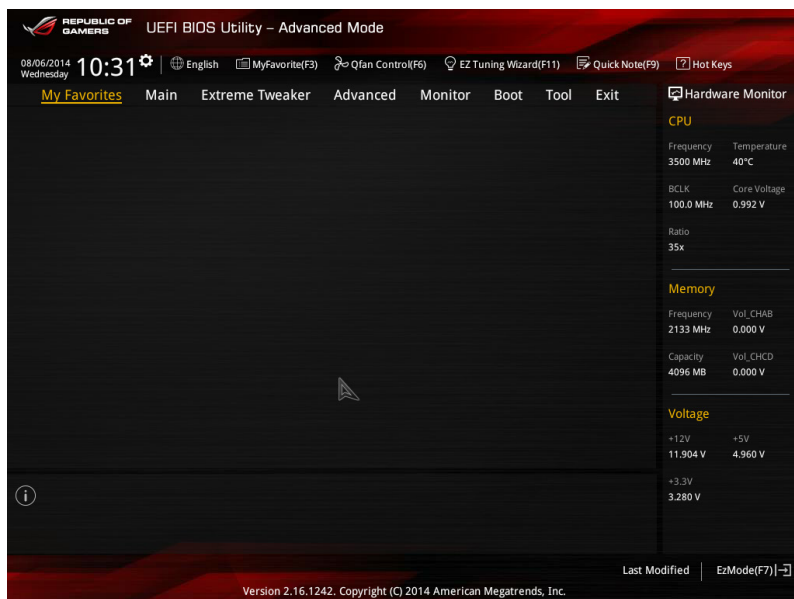
- The Quick Note function does not support the following keyboard functions: delete, cut, copy, and paste.
- You can only use the alphanumeric characters to enter your notes.

## Last Modified button

This button shows the items that you last modified and saved in BIOS Setup.

## 3.3 My Favorites

My Favorites is your personal space where you can easily save and access your favorite BIOS items.



### Adding items to My Favorites

To add frequently-used BIOS items to My Favorites:

1. Use the arrow keys to select an item that you want to add. When using a mouse, hover the pointer to the item.
2. Press <F4> on your keyboard or right-click on your mouse to add the item to My Favorites page.

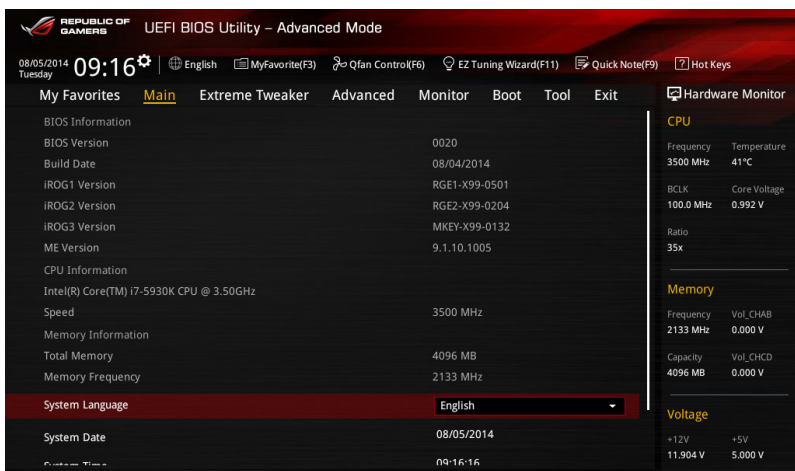

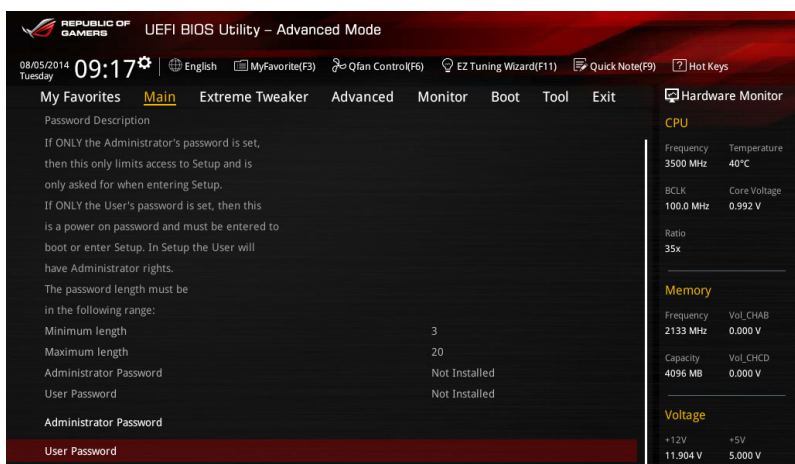
## 3.4 Main menu

The Main menu screen appears when you enter Advanced Mode in the BIOS Setup program. The Main menu provides you an overview of the basic system information, and allows you to set the system date, time, language, and security settings.



## Security

The Security menu items allow you to change the system security settings.



- If you have forgotten your BIOS password, erase the CMOS Real Time Clock (RTC) RAM to clear the BIOS password. See the section about **Rear I/O Connection** in **Chapter 2** for more information.
- The Administrator or User Password items on top of the screen show the default [Not Installed]. After you set a password, these items will be displayed as [Installed].

## Administrator Password

If you have set an administrator password, we recommend that you enter the administrator password when accessing the system. Otherwise, you may be restricted from viewing or modifying certain fields in the BIOS Setup program.

To set an administrator password:

1. Select the **Administrator Password** item and press <Enter>.
2. From the **Create New Password** box, key in a password then press <Enter>.
3. Confirm the password when prompted.

To change an administrator password:

1. Select the **Administrator Password** item and press <Enter>.
2. From the **Enter Current Password** box, key in the current password then press <Enter>.
3. From the **Create New Password** box, key in a new password then press <Enter>.
4. Confirm the password when prompted.

To clear the administrator password, follow the same steps as in changing an administrator password, but press <Enter> when prompted to create/confirm the password. After you clear the password, the Administrator Password item on top of the screen will show as **Not Installed**.

## User Password

If you have set a user password, you must enter the user password when accessing the system. The User Password item on top of the screen shows the default Not Installed. After you set a password, this item will show **Installed**.

To set a user password:

1. Select the **User Password** item and press <Enter>.
2. From the **Create New Password** box, key in a password then press <Enter>.
3. Confirm the password when prompted.

To change a user password:

1. Select the **User Password** item and press <Enter>.
2. From the **Enter Current Password** box, key in the current password then press <Enter>.
3. From the **Create New Password** box, key in a new password then press <Enter>.
4. Confirm the password when prompted.

To clear the user password, follow the same steps as in changing the user password, but press <Enter> when prompted to create/confirm the password. After you clear the password, the **User Password** item on top of the screen will show **Not Installed**.

### 3.5 Extreme Tweaker menu

The Extreme Tweaker menu items allow you to configure overclocking-related items.

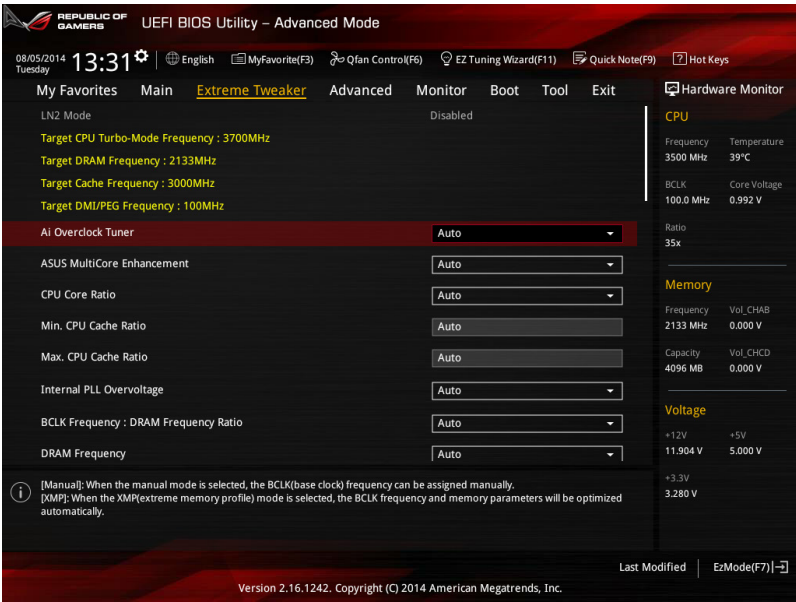


Be cautious when changing the settings of the Extreme Tweaker menu items. Incorrect field values can cause the system to malfunction.



The configuration options for this section vary depending on the CPU and DIMM model you installed on the motherboard.

Scroll down to display other BIOS items.



## Ai Overclock Tuner [Auto]

Allows you to select the CPU overclocking options to achieve the desired CPU internal frequency. Select any of these preset overclocking configuration options:

- [Auto] Loads the optimal settings for the system.
- [Manual] Allows you to individually set overclocking parameters.
- [X.M.P.] If you install memory modules supporting the eXtreme Memory Profile (X.M.P.) Technology, choose this item to set the profiles supported by your memory modules for optimizing the system performance.

## ASUS MultiCore Enhancement [Auto]

Allows you to enable or disable the MultiCore Enhancement feature.

Use the <+> and <-> keys to adjust the maximum CPU fan duty cycle. The values range from 40% to 100%. When the CPU temperature reaches the upper limit, the CPU fan will operate at the maximum duty cycle.

### CPU Fan Middle. Duty Cycle (%) [20]

Use the <+> and <-> keys to adjust the maximum CPU fan duty cycle. The values range from 40% to 100%. When the CPU temperature reaches the upper limit, the CPU fan will operate at the maximum duty cycle.

### CPU Lower Temperature [20]

Displays the lower limit of the CPU temperature.



**CPU Fan Min. Duty Cycle (%) [20]**

Use the <+> and <-> keys to adjust the minimum CPU fan duty cycle. The values range from 40% to 100%. When the CPU temperature is under its CPU lower temperature setting, the CPU fan will operate at the minimum duty cycle.

**Chassis Fan 1 A/B Q-Fan Control; Chassis Fan 2 A/B Q-Fan Control; Chassis Fan 3 A/B Q-Fan Control [DC Mode]**

- [Disabled] Disables the Chassis Q-Fan control feature.
- [DC mode] Enable the chassis Q-Fan control in DC mode for 3-pin chassis fan.
- [PWM mode] Enable the chassis Q-Fan control in PWM mode for 4-pin chassis fan.

**Chassis Fan 1 A/B Q-Fan Source; Chassis Fan 2 A/B Q-Fan Source; Chassis Fan 3 A/B Q-Fan Source [CPU]**

The assignment fan will be controlled according to the selected temperature source. Configuration options: [CPU] [MB] [VRM] [MB] [T\_SENSOR1] [EXT\_SENSOR1] [EXT\_SENSOR2] [EXT\_SENSOR3]



For T\_SENSOR1, connect a Thermistor cable to the T\_SENSOR1 header then place the other end to a component to get the temperature.

**Chassis Fan 1 A/B Fan Speed Low Limit; Chassis Fan 2 A/B Fan Speed Low Limit; Chassis Fan 3 A/B Fan Speed Low Limit [300 RPM]**

This item appears only when you enable the Chassis Q-Fan Control feature and allows you to disable or set the chassis fan warning speed.

Configuration options: [Ignore] [200 RPM] [300 RPM] [400 RPM] [500 RPM] [600 RPM]



The following items appear only when you set the Chassis1/Chassis2/Chassis3 Q-Fan Control feature to [Enabled].

**Chassis Fan 1 A/B Profile; Chassis Fan 2 A/B Profile; Chassis Fan 3 A/B Profile [Standard]**

This item allows you to set the appropriate performance level of the chassis fan.

- [Standard] Sets to [Standard] to make the chassis fan automatically adjust depending on the chassis temperature.
- [Silent] Sets to [Silent] to minimize the fan speed for quiet chassis fan operation.
- [Turbo] Sets to [Turbo] to achieve maximum chassis fan speed.
- [Manual] Sets to [Manual] to assign detailed fan speed control parameters.



The following items appear only when you set Chassis Fan 1 A/B Profile, Chassis Fan 2 A/B Profile, Chassis Fan 3 A/B Profile to [Manual].

**Chassis Fan 1/2/3 Upper Temperature [70]**

Use the <+> or <-> keys to adjust the upper limit of the CPU temperature. The values range from 20°C to 75°C.

**Chassis Fan 1/2/3 Max. Duty Cycle (%) [100]**

Use the <+> or <-> keys to adjust the maximum CPU fan duty cycle. The values range from 20% to 100%. When the CPU temperature reaches the upper limit, the CPU fan will operate at the maximum duty cycle.

**Chassis Fan 1/2/3 Middle Temperature [45]**

Displays the lower limit of the CPU temperature.

**Chassis Fan 1/2/3 Fan Middle. Duty Cycle (%) [60]**

Use the <+> or <-> keys to adjust the maximum CPU fan duty cycle. The values range from 20% to 100%. When the CPU temperature reaches the upper limit, the CPU fan will operate at the maximum duty cycle.

**Chassis Fan 1/2/3 Lower Temperature [40]**

Displays the lower limit of the CPU temperature.

**Chassis Fan 1/2/3 Min. Duty Cycle (%) [60]**

Use the <+> and <-> keys to adjust the minimum chassis fan duty cycle. The values range from 60% to 100%. When the chassis temperature is under 40°C, the chassis fan will operate at the minimum duty cycle.

**Allow Fan Stop [Disabled]**

This function allows the fan to run at 0% duty cycle when the temperature of the source is dropped below the lower temperature. Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

**Anti Surge Support [On]**

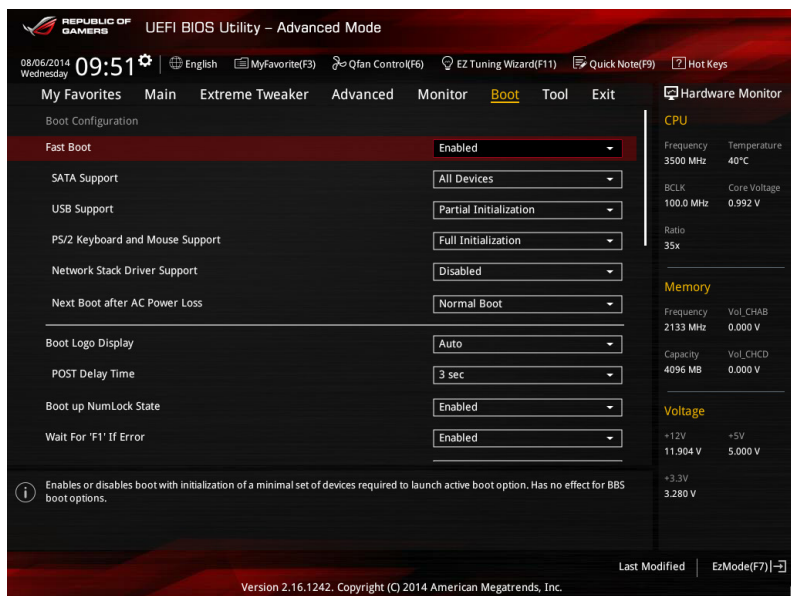
This item allows you to turn on/off the OVP (Over Voltage Protection) and UVP (Under Voltage Protection) functions. This causes the system to automatically shut down when the voltage exceeds the safe range that protects the motherboard's components.

[Boot Drive Only] Only boot drive connected to SATA ports will be detected during POST.

**USB Support [Partial Initialization]**

- [Disabled] All USB devices will not be available until OS boot up for a fastest POST time.
- [Full Initialization] All USB devices will be available during POST. This process will extend the POST time.
- [Partial Initialization] For a faster POST time, only USB ports with keyboard and mouse connections will be detected.

**P/2 Keyboard and Mouse Support [Full Initialization]**

Allows you to disable or have full system control of the PS/2 devices' availability during POST.

Configuration options: [Disabled] [Full Initialization] [Auto]

**Network Stack Driver Support [Disabled]**

This item allows you to enable or disable the Network Stack Driver Support function.

Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

**Next Boot after AC Power Loss [Normal Boot]**

- [Normal Boot] Returns to normal boot on the next boot after AC power loss.
- [Fast Boot] Accelerates the boot speed on the next boot after AC power loss.

**Boot Logo Display [Auto]**

- [Auto] Auto adjusts the Boot Logo size for Windows requirements.
- [Full Screen] Maximizes the Boot Logo size.
- [Disabled] Hides the boot logo during POST.




---

The following items appears only when you set the Boot Logo Display item to **[Auto]** or **[Full Screen]**.

---

**POST Delay Time [3 sec]**

This item allows you to select a desired additional POST waiting time to easily enter the BIOS Setup. You can only execute the POST delay time during normal boot. The values range from 0 to 10 seconds. This feature will only work when set under normal boot.

The following items appears only when you set the Boot Logo Display item to **[Disabled]**.

**POST Report [5 sec]**

This item allows you to select a desired POST report waiting time.

Configuration options: [1 sec] - [2 sec] [Until Press ESC]

**Bootup NumLock State [On]**

[On] Set the power-on state of the NumLock to [On].

[Off] Set the power-on state of the NumLock to [Off].

**Wait For 'F1' If Error [Enabled]**

[Disabled] Disables the function.

[Enabled] The system waits for the <F1> key to be pressed if an error occurs.

**Option ROM Messages [Force BIOS]**

This item allows you to set the display mode for Option ROM.

Configuration options: [Force BIOS] [Keep Current]

**INT19 Trap Response [Immediate]**

[Immediate] Executes the trap for INT19 immediately.

[Postponed] Executes the trap during legacy boot.

**Above 4G Decoding [Disabled]**

This item allows you to decode the 64-bit capable devices above 4G address space. Ensure that your system supports 64-bit PCI decoding.

Configuration options: [Disabled] [Enabled]

**Setup Mode [Advanced Mode]**

[Advanced Mode] This item allows you to go to Advanced Mode of the BIOS after POST.

[EZ Mode] This item allows you to go to EZ Mode of the BIOS after POST.

**CSM (Compatibility Support Module)**

Allows you to configure the CSM (Compatibility Support Module) items to fully support the various VGA, bootable devices and add-on devices for better compatibility.

**Launch CSM [Enabled]**

[Auto] The system automatically detects bootable and add-on devices.

[Enabled] For better compatibility, enable the CSM to fully support the non-UEFI driver add-on devices or the Windows® UEFI mode.

[Disabled] Disable the CSM to fully support the non-UEFI driver add-on devices or the Windows® UEFI mode.

The following items appear when you set the Launch CSM to [Enabled].

---

**Boot Device Control [UEFI and Legacy]**

This item allows you to select the type of devices that you want to boot.

Configuration options: [UEFI and Legacy] [Legacy OpROM only] [UEFI only]

**Boot from Network Devices [Legacy OpROM first]**

This item allows you to select the type of network devices that you want to launch.  
Configuration options: [Ignore] [Legacy OpROM first] [UEFI driver first]

**Boot from Storage Devices [Legacy OpROM first]**

This item allows you to select the type of storage devices that you want to launch.  
Configuration options: [Both, Legacy OpROM first] [Both, UEFI first] [Legacy OpROM first] [UEFI driver first] [Ignore]

**Boot from PCI-E/PCI Expansion Devices [Legacy OpROM first]**

This item allows you to select the type of PCIe/PCI expansion devices that you want to launch.  
Configuration options: [Legacy OpROM first] [UEFI driver first]

**Secure Boot menu**

This item allows you to configure the Windows® Secure Boot settings and manage its keys to protect the system from unauthorized access and malwares during POST.

**OS Type [Windows UEFI Mode]**

[Windows UEFI Mode]	This item allows you to select your installed operating system. Execute the Microsoft® Secure Boot check. Only select this option when booting on Windows® UEFI mode or other Microsoft® Secure Boot compliant OS.
[Other OS]	Get the optimized function when booting on Windows® non-UEFI mode. Microsoft® Secure Boot only supports Windows® UEFI mode.

**Key Management**

This item allows you to manage the Secure Boot keys.

**Install Default Secure Boot keys**

This item allows you to immediately load the default Security Boot keys, Platform key (PK), Key-exchange Key (KEK), Signature database (db), and Revoked Signatures (dbx). When the default Secure boot keys are loaded, the PK state will change from Unloaded mode to loaded mode.

**Clear Secure Boot keys**

This item appears only when you load the default Secure Boot keys. This item allows you to clear all default Secure Boot keys.

**Save Secure Boot Keys**

This item allows you to save the PK (Platform Keys) to a USB storage device.

## PK Management

The Platform Key (PK) locks and secures the firmware from any permissible changes. The system verifies the PK before your system enters the OS.

### Delete PK

This item allows you to delete the PK from your system. Once the PK is deleted, all the system's Secure Boot keys will not be active.

Configuration options: [Yes] [No]

### Load PK from File

This item allows you to load the downloaded PK from a USB storage device.



The PK file must be formatted as a UEFI variable structure with time-based authenticated variable.

## KEK Management

The KEK (Key-exchange Key or Key Enrollment Key) manages the Signature database (db) and Revoked Signature database (dbx).



Key-exchange Key (KEK) refers to Microsoft® Secure Boot Key-Enrollment Key (KEK).

### Delete the KEK

This item allows you to delete the KEK from your system.

Configuration options: [Yes] [No]

### Load KEK from File

This item allows you to load the downloaded KEK from a USB storage device.

### Append KEK from File

This item allows you to load the additional KEK from a storage device for an additional db and dbx loaded management.



The KEK file must be formatted as a UEFI variable structure with time-based authenticated variable.

## DB Management

The db (Authorized Signature database) lists the signers or images of UEFI applications, operating system loaders, and UEFI drivers that you can load on the single computer.

### Delete the db

This item allows you to delete the DB file from your system.

Configuration options: [Yes] [No]

### Load db from File

This item allows you to load the downloaded DB from a USB storage device.

### Append db from File

This item allows you to load the additional DB from a storage device so that more images can be loaded securely.



---

The db file must be formatted as a UEFI variable structure with time-based authenticated variable.

---

### DBX Management

The dbx (Revoked Signature database) lists the forbidden images of db items that are no longer trusted and cannot be loaded.

#### Delete the dbx

This item allows you to delete the dbx file from your system.

#### Load dbx from File

This item allows you to load the downloaded dbx from a USB storage device.

Configuration options: [Yes] [No]

#### Append dbx from File

This item allows you to load the additional dbx from a storage device so that more db's images cannot be loaded.



---

The dbx file must be formatted as a UEFI variable structure with time-based authenticated variable.

---

### Boot Option Priorities

These items specify the boot device priority sequence from the available devices. The number of device items that appears on the screen depends on the number of devices installed in the system.

- To access Windows® OS in Safe Mode, press <F8 > after POST (Windows® 8 not supported).
  - To select the boot device during system startup, press <F8> when ASUS Logo appears.

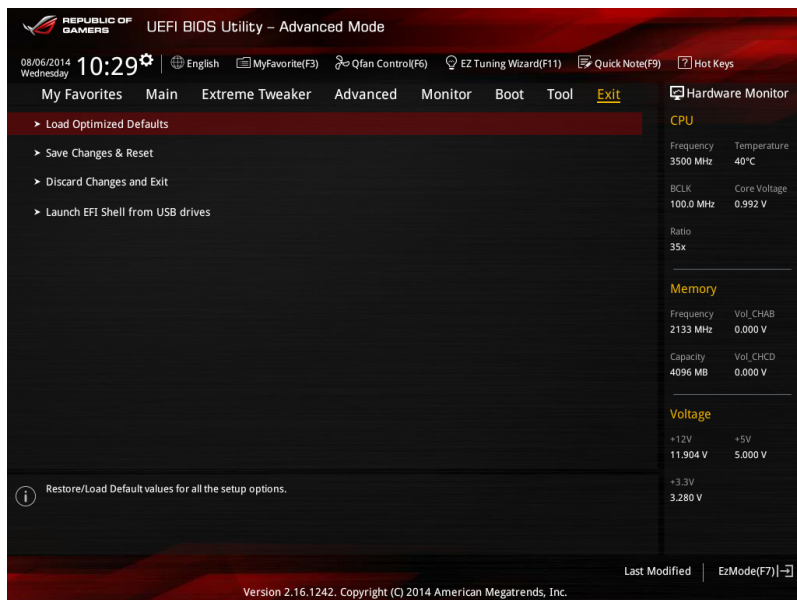

### Load from Profile

This item allows you to load the previous BIOS settings saved in the BIOS Flash. Key in the profile number that saved your BIOS settings, press <Enter>, and then select **Yes**.



- DO NOT shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS to prevent the system boot failure!
- We recommend that you update the BIOS file only coming from the same memory/CPU configuration and BIOS version.

### Profile Name

This item allows you to key in a profile name.

### Save to Profile

This item allows you to save the current BIOS settings to the BIOS Flash, and create a profile. Key in a profile number from one to eight, press <Enter>, and then select **Yes**.

### Load/Save Profile from/to USB Drive

This item allows you to load or save profile from your USB drive, load and save profile to your USB drive.

## BIOS Flashback

Allows you to select between BIOS1 and BIOS2. Provides boot selection utility.

### Force BIOS1/BIOS2 Boot

Select [Yes] to force the boot using BIOS2.

### COPY BIOS1/BIOS2 to BIOS2/BIOS1

Select [Yes] to copy the content of BIOS1 to BIOS2.

## ASUS DRAM SPD Information

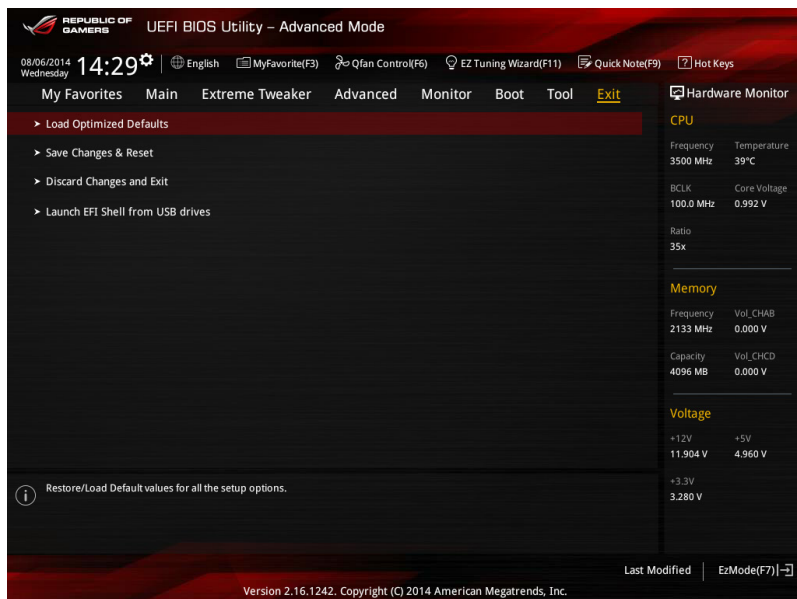
This item allows you to view the DRAM SPD information.

### DIMM Slot Number

Allows you to view the information about the installed DIMMS when selected.

## 3.10 Exit menu

The Exit menu items allow you to load the optimal default values for the BIOS items, and save or discard your changes to the BIOS items. You can access the EZ Mode from the Exit menu.



### Load Optimized Defaults

This option allows you to load the default values for each of the parameters on the Setup menus. When you select this option or if you press <F5>, a confirmation window appears. Select **OK** to load the default values.

### Save Changes & Reset

Once you are finished making your selections, choose this option from the Exit menu to ensure the values you selected are saved. When you select this option or if you press <F10>, a confirmation window appears. Select **OK** to save changes and exit.

### Discard Changes & Exit

This option allows you to exit the Setup program without saving your changes. When you select this option or if you press <Esc>, a confirmation window appears. Select **Yes** to discard changes and exit.

### Launch EFI Shell from USB drives

This option allows you to attempt to launch the EFI Shell application (shellx64.efi) from one of the available filesystem devices.

## 3.11 Updating BIOS

The ASUS website publishes the latest BIOS versions to provide enhancements on system stability, compatibility, or performance. However, BIOS updating is potentially risky. If there is no problem using the current version of BIOS, **DO NOT** manually update the BIOS. Inappropriate BIOS updating may result in the system's failure to boot. Carefully follow the instructions of this chapter to update your BIOS if necessary.



---

The following utilities allow you to manage and update the motherboard BIOS setup program.

1. **EZ Update:** Updates the BIOS in Windows® environment.
2. **ASUS EZ Flash 2:** Updates the BIOS using a USB flash drive.
3. **ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3:** Restores the BIOS using the motherboard support DVD or a USB flash drive when the BIOS file fails or gets corrupted.
4. **ASUS BIOS Updater:** Updates and back ups the BIOS in DOS environment using the motherboard support DVD and a USB flash disk drive.

### 3.11.1 EZ Update

The EZ Update is a utility that allows you to update the motherboard BIOS in Windows® environment.

- EZ Update requires an Internet connection either through a network or an ISP (Internet Service Provider).
  - This utility is available in the support DVD that comes with the motherboard package. Refer to the documentation that came with the support DVD.

### 3.11.2 ASUS EZ Flash 2

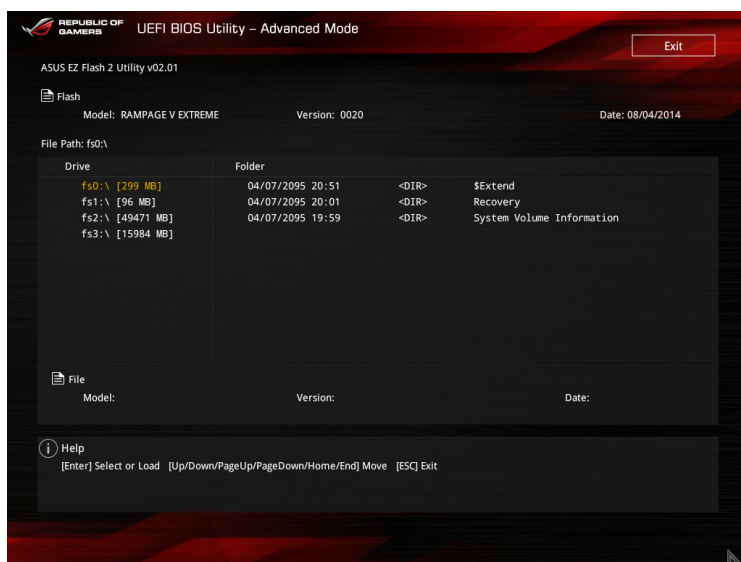
ASUS EZ Flash 2 allows you to update the BIOS without having to use a bootable floppy disk or an OS-based utility.



Before you start using this utility, download the latest BIOS from the ASUS website at [www.asus.com](http://www.asus.com).

#### To update the BIOS using EZ Flash 2:

1. Insert the USB flash disk that contains the latest BIOS file to the USB port.
2. Enter the Advanced Mode of the BIOS setup program. Go to the Tool menu to select ASUS EZ Flash Utility and press <Enter> to enable it.



3. Press <Tab> to switch to the Drive field.
4. Press the Up/Down arrow keys to find the USB flash disk that contains the latest BIOS, and then press <Enter>.
5. Press <Tab> to switch to the Folder Info field.
6. Press the Up/Down arrow keys to find the BIOS file, and then press <Enter> to perform the BIOS update process. Reboot the system when the update process is done.



- This function can support devices such as a USB flash disk formatted in FAT 32/16 format and a single partition only.
- DO NOT shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS to prevent system boot failure!



Ensure to load the BIOS default settings to ensure system compatibility and stability. Select the Load Optimized Defaults item under the Exit menu. See the section **Exit Menu** on Chapter 3 for details.

### 3.11.3 ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3

The ASUS CrashFree BIOS 3 utility is an auto recovery tool that allows you to restore the BIOS file when it fails or gets corrupted during the updating process. You can restore a corrupted BIOS file using the motherboard support DVD or a USB flash drive that contains the BIOS file.



The BIOS file in the motherboard support DVD may be older than the BIOS file published on the ASUS official website. If you want to use the newer BIOS file, download the file at [support.asus.com](http://support.asus.com) and save it to a USB flash drive.

## Recovering the BIOS

### To recover the BIOS:

1. Turn on the system.
2. Insert the motherboard support DVD to the optical drive, or the USB flash drive containing the BIOS file to the USB port.
3. The utility automatically checks the devices for the BIOS file. When found, the utility reads the BIOS file and enters ASUS EZ Flash 2 automatically.
4. The system requires you to enter BIOS Setup to recover the BIOS setting. To ensure system compatibility and stability, we recommend that you press <F5> to load default BIOS values.



DO NOT shut down or reset the system while updating the BIOS! Doing so can cause system boot failure!

### 3.11.4 ASUS BIOS Updater

The ASUS BIOS Updater allows you to update the BIOS in DOS environment. This utility also allows you to copy the current BIOS file so that you can use it as a backup when the BIOS fails or gets corrupted during the update process.



The succeeding utility screens are for reference only. The actual utility screen displays may not be same as shown.

#### Before updating BIOS

1. Prepare the motherboard support DVD and a USB flash drive in FAT32/16 format and single partition.
2. Download the latest BIOS file and BIOS Updater from the ASUS website at <http://support.asus.com> and save them on the USB flash drive.

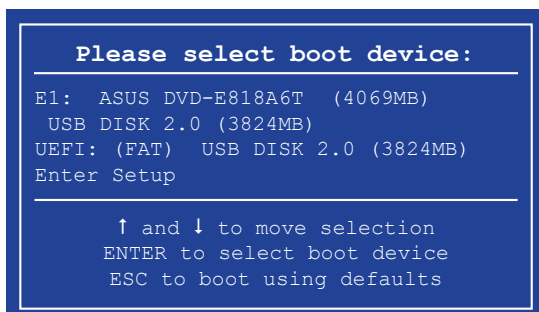

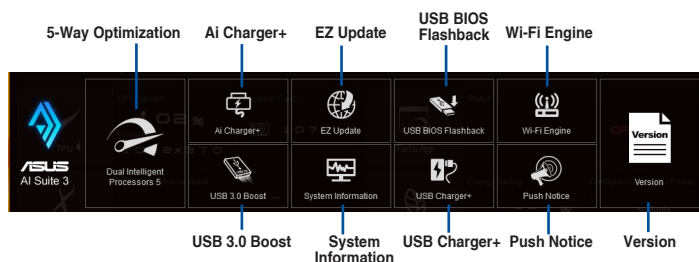

It automatically balances the system's performance, power saving, levels, and fan settings via the user-friendly AI Suite 3 utility.

### 5-Way Optimization

The 5-Way Optimization function dynamically optimizes your PC based on real-time usage to provide the best system status. It covers the essential areas such as CPU performance, energy saving, stable digital power, cool and quiet fan control, and includes tailored settings for your apps to ensure your PC is ready for gaming, entertainment, productivity, or just about anything.



DO NOT remove your fan during the tuning process.

## Turbo Processing Unit (TPU)

TPU allows you to manually adjust the CPU frequency, CPU cache, core frequencies, DRAM frequency, and related voltages for enhanced system stability and a performance boost.



Refer to the CPU documentation before adjusting CPU voltage settings. Setting a high voltage may damage the CPU permanently and setting a low voltage may lead to an unstable system.



For system stability, the TPU settings are not saved in the BIOS and are not loaded during system bootup. Save your overclocking settings as a TPU profile and manually load this profile after system bootup.

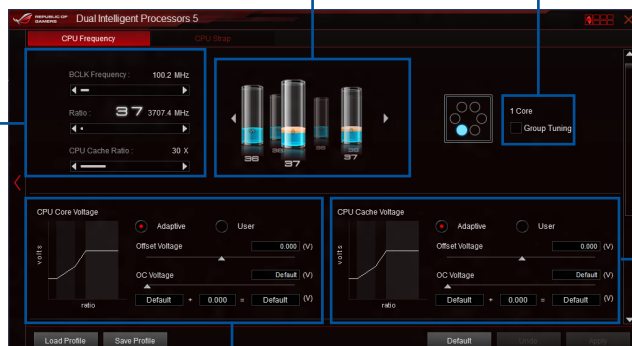

## 4.11 RAMDisk

RAMDisk is a data-storage software that reserves a part of your system's memory and turns it into a high-speed virtual drive where you can store cache files and game apps for instant access. The Dynamic Memory Allocation function can release the unused memory of RAMDisk back to the system when needed and helps extend the lifespan of your SSD or HDD.



The following folders are not suitable for RAMDisk optimization. Moving them into the RAMDisk might negatively affect the performance of your system.

- **Swap file/Page file:** The swap file is a permanent storage space used as the virtual memory expansion of the system memory. Moving the swap file into the RAM Disk simply defeats the purpose of having it and may decrease your system's performance.
- **Startup folders:** Since RAMDisk loads during boot up together with the contents of the Junction folders, changing the location of the startup folders may cause system error and disable loading your RAMDisk.

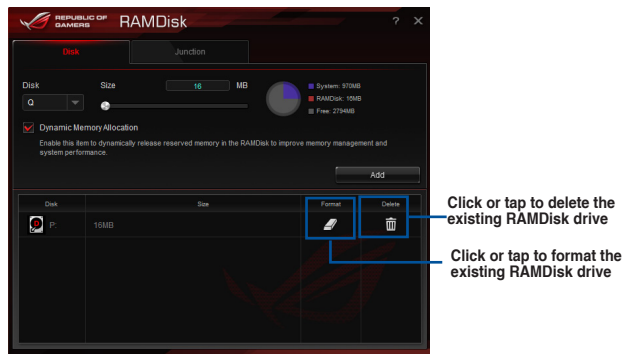

# 5

## 5.1 RAID configurations

The motherboard comes with the Intel® Rapid Storage Technology that supports RAID 0, RAID 1, RAID 10, and RAID 5 configuration.



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If you want to install a Windows® operating system to a hard disk drive included in a RAID set, you have to create a RAID driver disk and load the RAID driver during OS installation. Refer to section 5.2 **Creating a RAID driver disk** for details.

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### 5.1.1 RAID definitions

**RAID 0 (Data striping)** optimizes two identical hard disk drives to read and write data in parallel, interleaved stacks. Two hard disks perform the same work as a single drive but at a sustained data transfer rate, double that of a single disk alone, thus improving data access and storage. Use of two new identical hard disk drives is required for this setup.

**RAID 1 (Data mirroring)** copies and maintains an identical image of data from one drive to a second drive. If one drive fails, the disk array management software directs all applications to the surviving drive as it contains a complete copy of the data in the other drive. This RAID configuration provides data protection and increases fault tolerance to the entire system. Use two new drives or use an existing drive and a new drive for this setup. The new drive must be of the same size or larger than the existing drive.

**RAID 5** stripes both data and parity information across three or more hard disk drives. Among the advantages of RAID 5 configuration include better HDD performance, fault tolerance, and higher storage capacity. The RAID 5 configuration is best suited for transaction processing, relational database applications, enterprise resource planning, and other business systems. Use a minimum of three identical hard disk drives for this setup.

**RAID 10** is data striping and data mirroring combined without parity (redundancy data) having to be calculated and written. With the RAID 10 configuration you get all the benefits of both RAID 0 and RAID 1 configurations. Use four new hard disk drives or use an existing drive and three new drives for this setup.

## 5.1.2 Installing Serial ATA hard disks

The motherboard supports Serial ATA hard disk drives. For optimal performance, install identical drives of the same model and capacity when creating a disk array.

### To install the SATA hard disks for a RAID configuration:

1. Install the SATA hard disks into the drive bays.
2. Connect the SATA signal cables.
3. Connect a SATA power cable to the power connector on each drive.

## 5.1.3 Setting the RAID item in BIOS

You must enable the RAID function in the BIOS Setup before creating RAID sets using SATA HDDs. To do this:

1. Enter the BIOS Setup during POST.
2. Go to the **Advanced** menu > **SATA Configuration**, and then press <Enter>.
3. Set the SATA Mode item to [RAID Mode].
4. Save your changes, and then exit the BIOS Setup.



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Refer to Chapter 3 for details on entering and navigating through the BIOS Setup

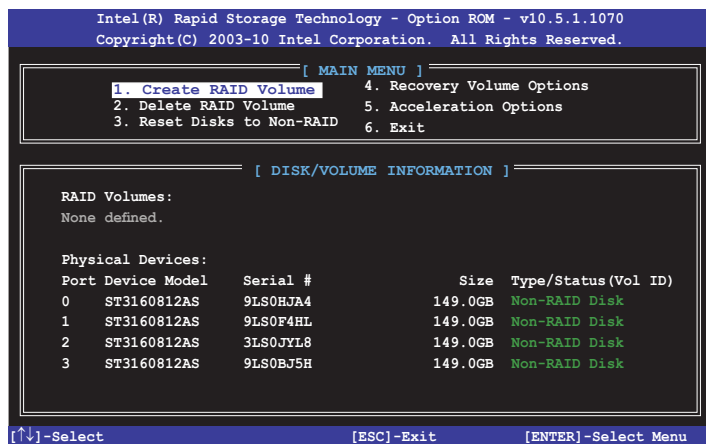

7. When the **Capacity** item is selected, enter the RAID volume capacity that you want and press <Enter>. The default value indicates the maximum allowed capacity.

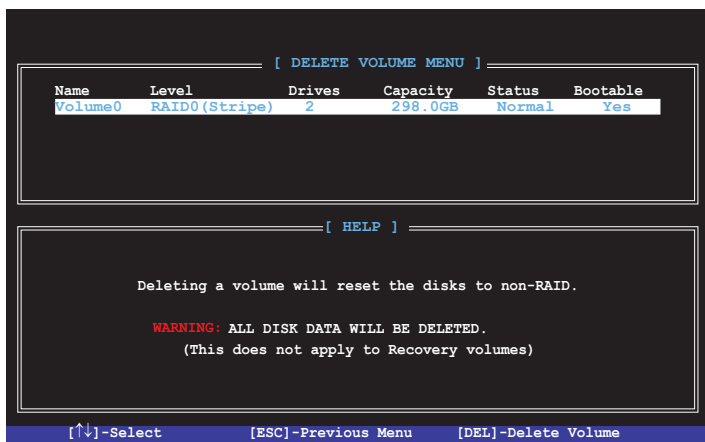

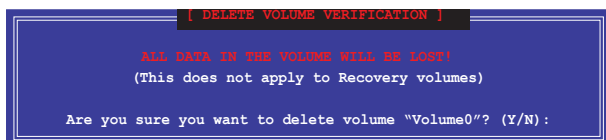

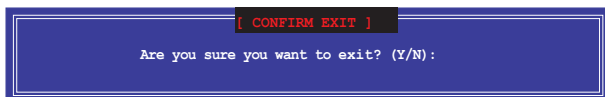

## 5.2 Creating a RAID driver disk

A floppy disk with the RAID driver is required when installing a Windows® operating system on a hard disk drive that is included in a RAID set.



---

The motherboard does not provide a floppy drive connector. You have to use a USB floppy disk drive when creating a SATA RAID driver disk.

---

### 5.2.1 Creating a RAID driver disk without entering the OS

To create a RAID driver disk without entering the OS:

1. Boot your computer.
2. Press <Delete> during POST to enter the BIOS setup utility.
3. Set the optical drive as the primary boot device.
4. Insert the support DVD into the optical drive.
5. Save changes and exit BIOS.
6. When the Make Disk menu appears, press <1> to create a RAID driver disk.
7. Insert a formatted floppy disk into the USB floppy disk drive, then press <Enter>.
8. Follow the succeeding screen instructions to complete the process.

### 5.2.2 Creating a RAID driver disk in Windows®

To create a RAID driver disk in Windows®:

1. Start Windows®.
2. Plug the USB floppy disk drive and insert a floppy disk.
3. Place the motherboard support DVD into the optical drive.
4. Go to the **Make Disk** menu, and then click **Intel AHCI/RAID Driver Disk** to create a RAID driver disk.
5. Select **USB floppy disk drive** as the destination disk.

3. Click the name of the device you've inserted, go to **Drivers > RAID**, and then select the RAID driver for the corresponding OS version. Click **OK**.
4. Follow the succeeding screen instructions to complete the installation.
