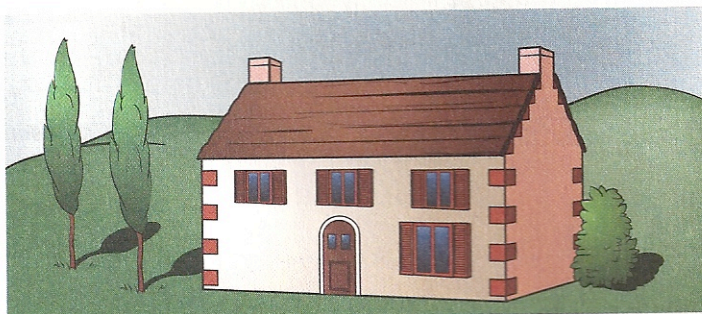




# Vocabulaire

Where is the garden?

GUILLAUME: Le jardin est là-bas.

The garden is over there.

ABDUL: Où est le garage?

Where is the garage?

ALI: Il est derrière le jardin.

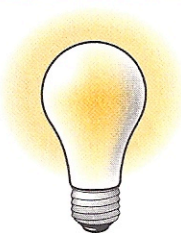
It's behind the garden.

LISETTE: Il y a combien de pièces dans ta maison?

How many rooms are there in your house?

MARIANNE: Il y a cinq pièces.

There are five rooms.



There are four ways to write "the":

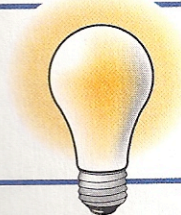
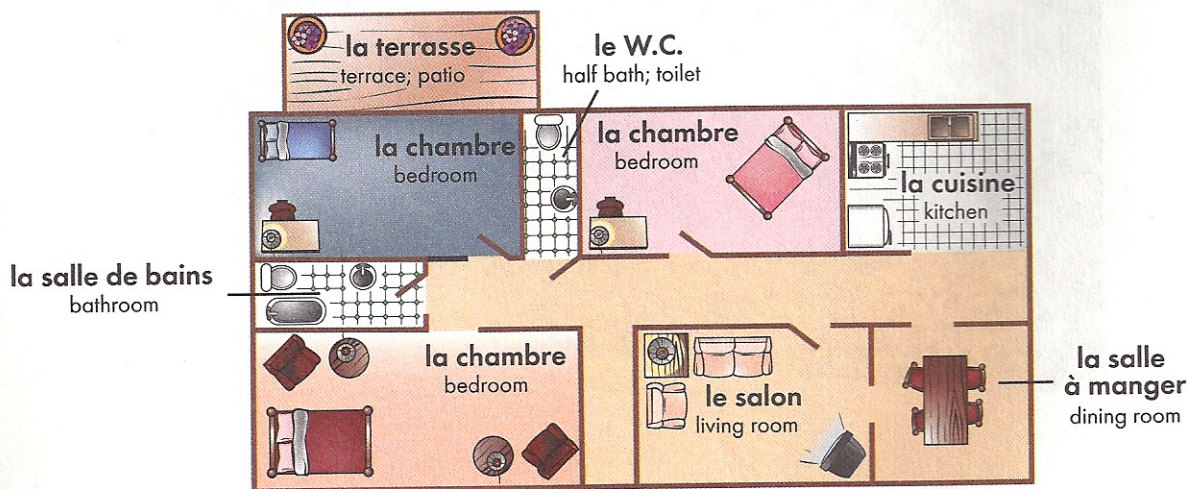
**le** (in front of a masculine singular noun)

**la** (in front of a feminine singular noun)

**l'** (in front of noun that begins with a vowel)

**les** (in front of a plural noun)

The word **jardin** can mean "yard," as well as "garden."

**La pièce** refers to a room in a house.

**La salle de séjour** is another way to say "living room."
