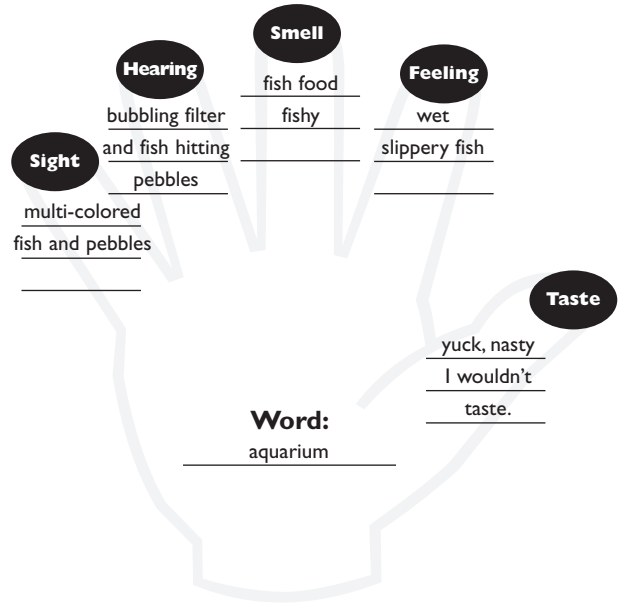


Five Senses Map

A Five Senses Map shows how a word can relate to the five senses: taste, feeling, smell, hearing, and sight. The word to be explored goes on the palm of the hand. Words, phrases, and sentences that tell how the word relates to each sense go on the lines. Look at the example.

To make your own Five Senses Map, choose a vocabulary word you want to explore and write it on the palm of the hand. Then think about tastes, feelings, smells, sounds, and sights you associate with that word. Describe them on the lines provided. You may need to leave some lines blank—not all words relate to all five senses.
