


LET'S TALK NUMBERS...

Paper requirements & what you need to have:

- 1) 3 bib cards (from 3 sources)
 - a. 1 book source
 - b. 1 online source
 - c. 1 "other" (can be another book or online source)
- 2) 3 direct quotes –Inserted into paper with explanation/support and proper citation.
 - a. Minimum of 1 direct quote taken from each source.
- 3) 40 note cards divided by 3 sources AND divided into 5 parts of the paper
 - a. Minimum 5 for intro paragraph and 5 for conclusion (=10)
 - b. Minimum 10 per body paragraph (=30)
 - c. Minimum of 7 notecards taken from each source (=21 of 40)
- 4) 1 outline with 5 parts
 - a. 5 paragraphs (Intro, 3 body paragraphs, conclusion)
- 5) 1 typed Works Cited Page (showing minimum of 3 sources→ from bib cards!)
- 6) 1 Rough Draft showing edits

Breakdown of Required Notecards and Bib cards:



Totals:

5 paragraphs

40 notecards

3 sources/bib cards

At least 7 note cards
per bib card

3 direct quotes
(1 from each source)

Introduction Paragraph (minimum 5 notecards).

- A “Hook” sentence to catch readers’ attention
- The definition of your social issue
- Further explanation of your social issue
- Thesis sentence (introduces 3 subtopics)—***last sentence of intro paragraph***

Body Paragraph 1 (minimum 10 notecards) Suggestions:

- Topic Sentence (with transitional statements)
- Examples
- Explanations/ additional definitions
- Details
- Facts
- Statistics
- Direct quotes (at least 1 per source, remember!)
- Summary Sentence

Body Paragraph 2 (minimum 10 notecards) Suggestions:

- Topic Sentence (with transitional statements)
- Examples
- Explanations/ additional definitions
- Details
- Facts
- Statistics

Body Paragraph 3 (minimum 10 notecards). Suggestions:

- Topic Sentence (with transitional statements)

- Summary Sentence

Conclusion Paragraph (minimum 5 notecards) Something to leave the audience thinking about

- Restates the thesis—***typically first sentence of conclusion paragraph***
- A “wrap-up” of everything previously stated
- An interesting fact
- Something to leave the audience thinking about
- NEVER INTRODUCE NEW INFO./MATERIAL IN THE CONCLUSION.
