# Johnson to attend West Point, serve country

The United States Military Academy at West Point will receive a new cadet next fall in O’Gorman’s own Joey Johnson.

After four years of Johnson’s hard work in high school, it all came down to the application in the fall of his senior year.

“The application process was much like a marathon. I had to qualify medically, physically, academically and criminally. I even had to give them a police record check,” said Johnson.

In addition, Johnson performed a separate application process to receive a nomination from a congressperson. Johnson was nominated by then-Representative Herseth-Sandlin, as well as both of the senators.

With an acceptance of around just 15%, Johnson was up against plenty of competition. Even so, friends had little doubt in Johnson’s ability.

“I wasn’t surprised,” said close

friend senior Chris Michels. “If they weren’t going to accept him, then who were they going to?”

Since most letters of acceptance from West Point are received in mid-April, Johnson’s family was thrilled to have received his on January 8, according to his mother, Mrs. Shelley Johnson.

“I first felt excitement and then relief that now I had my future set up,” said Johnson.

That future comes much sooner to the West Point cadets than those of most other colleges. At precisely 6:30AM on June 27th, Johnson will report for six weeks of basic training.

Despite not knowing any other future cadets, Johnson has no qualms about making friends.

“I am sure that basic training will bring me close together with my squad,” said Johnson. “I am sure we will all be united by a similar motivation and sense of duty.”

Very close to his family and friends, Johnson anticipates that being separated from them will be the greatest challenge in the com-

ing years.

Still, he plans on remaining positive.

“Hopefully, it is the memories that I have of them that will motivate me to succeed,” said Johnson.

Throughout summer basic training especially, communication with friends and family will be a challenge.

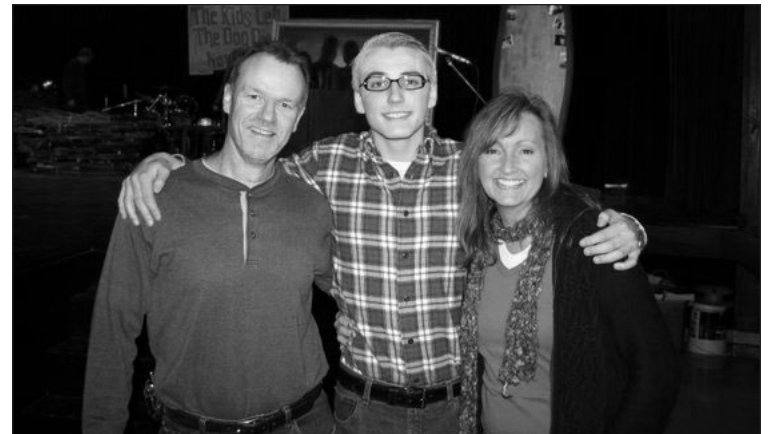
“During basic training, I’ll have to write him letters,” said Michels. “After that, I can text, Skype, and Facebook him like normal.”

Even so, the full school year will be an additional challenge for some.

“For me, the hardest part will be not being able to see Joe every day,” said S. Johnson, “not hearing him play the piano or sing or laugh—not watching him be chased by [our dog] Lucy—not getting one of his great hugs.”

On the other hand, S. Johnson understands Johnson’s purpose in life.

“By keeping our faith central in our lives, I know we will all be fine,” said Johnson. “This was

Due to years of hard work and

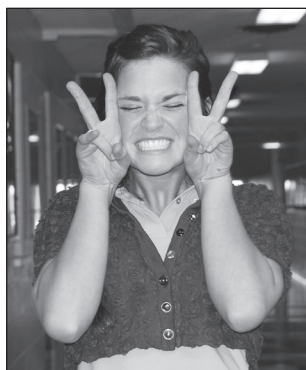
ambition, Johnson is that much closer to achieving his dream. West Point is just one step closer to his ultimate goal.

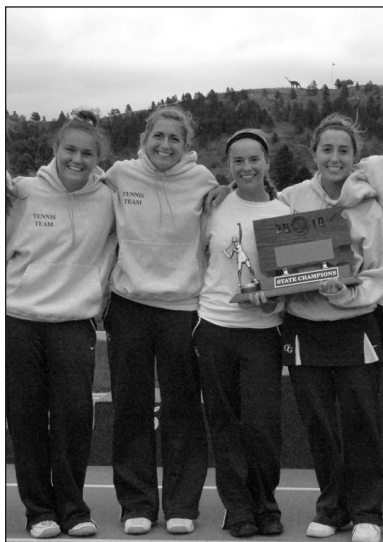

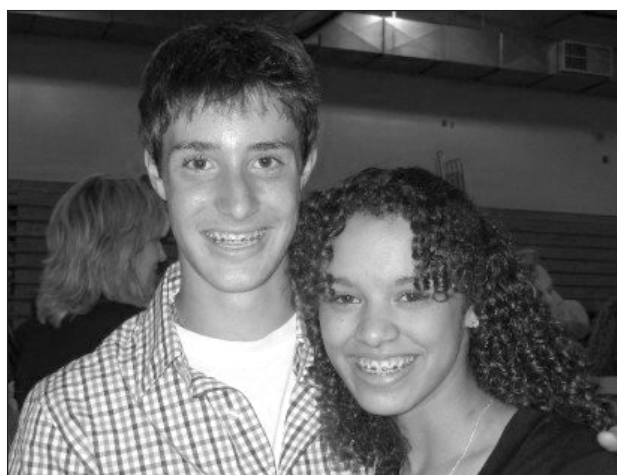
