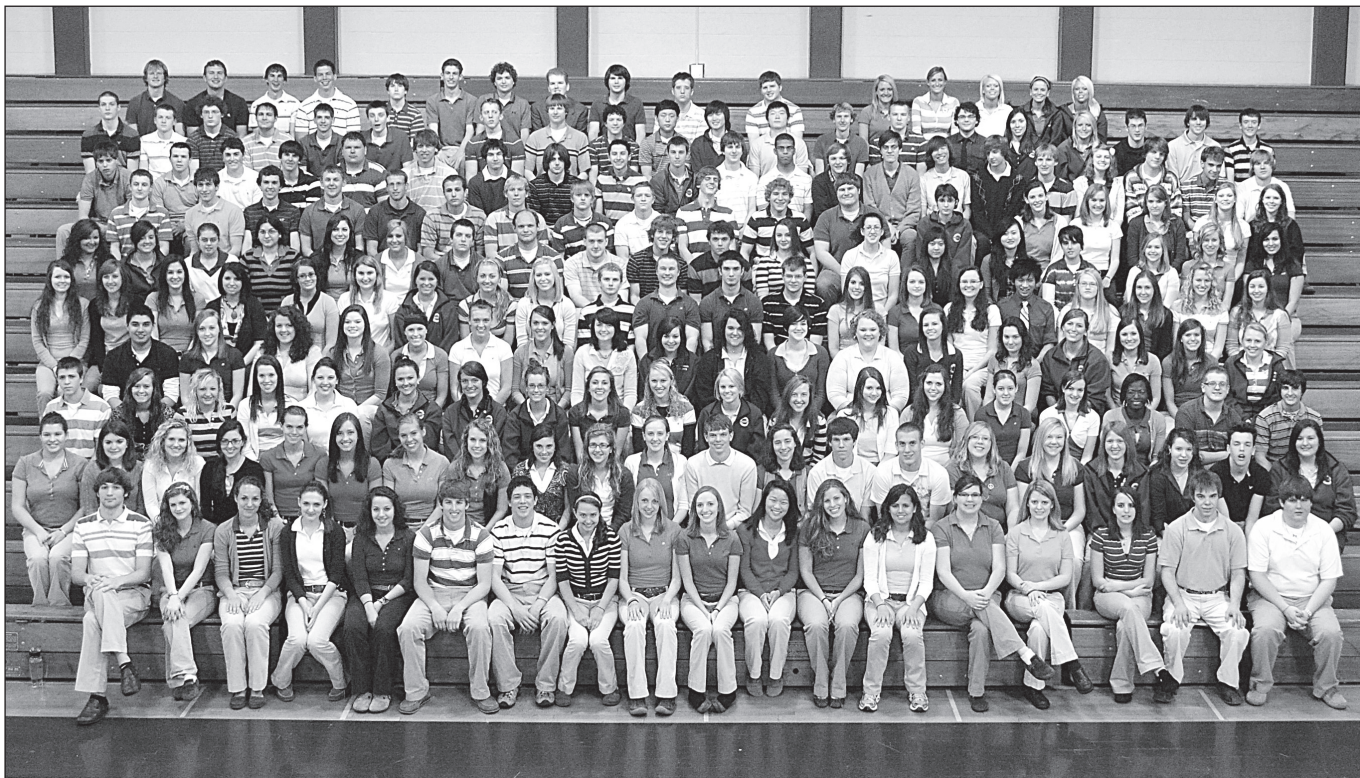
And now, after we've gotten to know one another, it all comes to an end. Our journey in English is

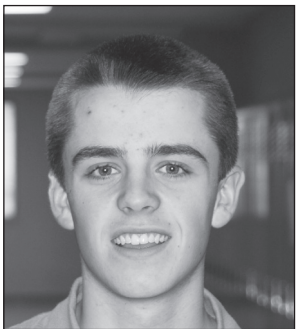

Scholarships remain important; O'Gorman senior receives full ride

Now more than ever college academic scholarships are allowing students to go to the schools they have always dreamed about attending. Scholarships are everywhere and a person only needs to look to find one.

O'Gorman High School students have traditionally received many academic scholarships and often times they are impressive four-year scholarships.

AJ Gaspar, an O'Gorman senior, has received a full ride to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Gaspar received the Chancellor's scholarship to UNL because he was a National Merit Finalist.

"Studying hard and maintaining my grades were most important for my scholarship," said Gaspar.

"However, I also needed to show involvement, leadership, and submit letters of recommendation from two teachers."

The process of receiving an academic scholarship can be easy or difficult depending on who you are.

"For me, the process was relatively simple," said Gaspar. "Nebraska sent me a letter after I was named a National Merit semi-finalist informing me that I could receive a full ride if I attended their school."

There are a multitude of resources for scholarships however; students need to become educated on their scholarship options early in their high school career, such as Gaspar did, in order to begin working to meet the required qualifications for the scholarship by senior year.

For high school students to find good academic scholarships they need to be prepared to do research and investigate because scholarships, although available, are not going to just fall out of the sky.

"The most important thing to remember is that scholarships won't usually come looking for you," said Gaspar. "I was very lucky in that respect."

"Looking for scholarships is hard work, but put it in perspective; a \$1000 scholarship that takes six or seven hours of work to earn is far more valuable than

if you spent that time working retail," said Gaspar.

The types of scholarships available come in a wide variety and some with even comical requirements.

"There are scholarships for tall people, people who have ancestors that came over on the Mayflower; you name it, there is probably a scholarship for it," said Mrs. Donna Carlson, O'Gorman guidance counselor.

The O'Gorman guidance office is ready to help whenever students have questions regarding scholarships. In addition, scholarships are posted on the SFCS website.

The amount of money given for scholarships varies from small amounts to a full ride.

"Some of the higher priced schools have more scholarship money available because of endowments, but they also know they have to bring their cost into an affordable range in order to compete with other schools," said Carlson.

"Scholarships are one part of the financial aid process that can make some of the higher priced

schools more affordable," said Carlson.

"We encourage students to apply to schools, even though they believe a school is out of their price range. Then when they get their financial aid package they can compare what their out of pocket cost is for each school and make a decision based on that."

Many factors are considered when rewarding scholarships.

"A strong academic grade point average would be important, as well as rigor of the curriculum, class rank, and usually an ACT or SAT score," said Carlson.

"Some scholarships also look at leadership, service, and character to support the academic criteria."

Just when individuals think the hard part is over by earning single or multiple scholarships for his or her college, students often must also perform well in college to keep their scholarship.

"Usually a student must maintain a certain grade point average while taking a required amount of

O'Gorman has had students excel in various sports for decades. This year's senior class is no different.

Fifteen seniors have received athletic scholarships. These athletes will be taking their skills to the college level to compete for teams at all levels from NAIA to NCAA Division 1.

Some of these athletes will be helped in the transition from high school student athlete to college student athlete by a teammate that will play for the same team with them again next year.

Afton Keiser and Kerry Grogan will both play soccer for the University of South Dakota next year, while Austin Berg and Josh Miller will play football for Dakota Wesleyan University.

"It makes the whole transition easier," said Berg.

They will not be the only seniors that will be playing with a teammate again. Alex Robey will join former Knights Danny Hughes (2009) and Bryan Whitesel (2007) as a member of the University of Sioux Falls basketball team.

Dan Furlong will join his Stampede

teammates Josh Holstrom and Chad Ruhwedel next year back in his home state of Massachusetts to play hockey for the University of Massachusetts Lowell. Furlong spent two years with the Herd and led the Stampede defenseman in nine goals. Seven of Furlong's goals came on power plays, which was second most on the team.

Some of the seniors will be going to teams that are competitive nationally.

Zach Johnson will swim for the Oakland Golden Grizzlies next year. The Grizzlies have been in the Summit League for 12 years and have won the conference title the last 11 straight years. Oakland also regularly has swimmers qualify for the NCAA meet.

Volleyball star Abby Meyers will play for the Southwest Minnesota State Mustangs. The Mustangs went 25-8 last year and finished fourth in the Northern Sun Intercollegiate Conference.

They have qualified for the NCAA Division II volleyball tournament the past six seasons.

At the other end of the spectrum, one O'Gorman athlete will join a program that is literally just starting out. Ma-

rie Scott will bowl for Dana College next year. Scott is excited and nervous to be part of the program's first.

The Vikings bowling teams for both men and women will begin in the 2010-2011 season. Scott was a member of two state championship bowling teams while at O'Gorman and hopes that she and her new teammates can give the schools women's bowling team a strong start.

Other O'Gorman athletes that will play in college include softball stand out Kelsie Kallhoff, who will join the Black Hills State University Yellow Jackets and football players Tony Viger (Augustana College), Mike Hardie (North Dakota State University) and Miles McLaughlin (Southwest Minnesota State University), each of which were members of the Argus Leaders Elite 45.

Soccer players Kameron Keck (University of Sioux Falls), Preston Martin (Gustavus Adolphus), Liz Bunkers (Augustana College) and David Meisinger (Morningside College) will also play at the college level. These seniors were able to capture a soccer title while in high school.

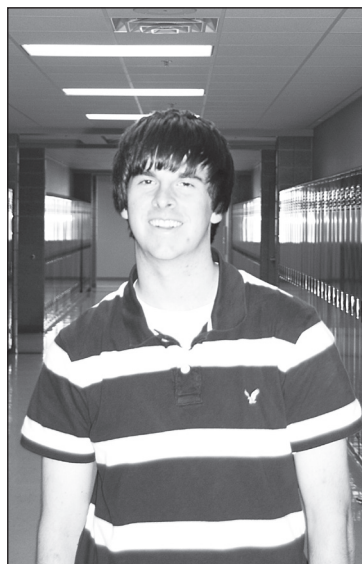

credits to continue to be eligible," said Carlson.

"I can't remember the particulars, but I believe I need to maintain a 3.5 GPA," said Gaspar.

Most colleges and universities want well-rounded students to attend their schools. They do not want just an incredibly smart student or an all star athlete.

"Although maintaining 3.5+ GPA is important; remember that colleges look for more than just a smart kid," said Gaspar.

"They want students that are involved, have other hobbies and interests, and who show leadership. And, of course, high standardized testing scores help a lot."

Academic scholarships are vital for students because they help them reach their goals of getting an education and going on into the workplace.

"As the cost of post-secondary education increases, scholarships play an important part of the financial aid picture and funding post secondary educa-

tion," said Carlson.

"Scholarships help students lower the cost of their post-secondary education, making it even more possible and affordable to attend. Anything a student can do to lower the sticker price of their education will pay off down the road in fewer loans they have to pay back."

Getting a college education today continues to be important because society needs people with high levels of intelligence to deal with the complex issues facing the nation and the world.

Students need to make the effort and take the time to look for and apply for academic scholarships that make it possible for them to attend schools they may have thought were not available to them.

"I can't wait to get to college and meet new people, discover new ideas, and learn new things," said Gaspar. "There is so much more freedom at college to decide how you spend your time and who you want to be."

Going to college is a great opportunity for anyone and receiving academic scholarships helps students with the burden of the high cost of a college education.

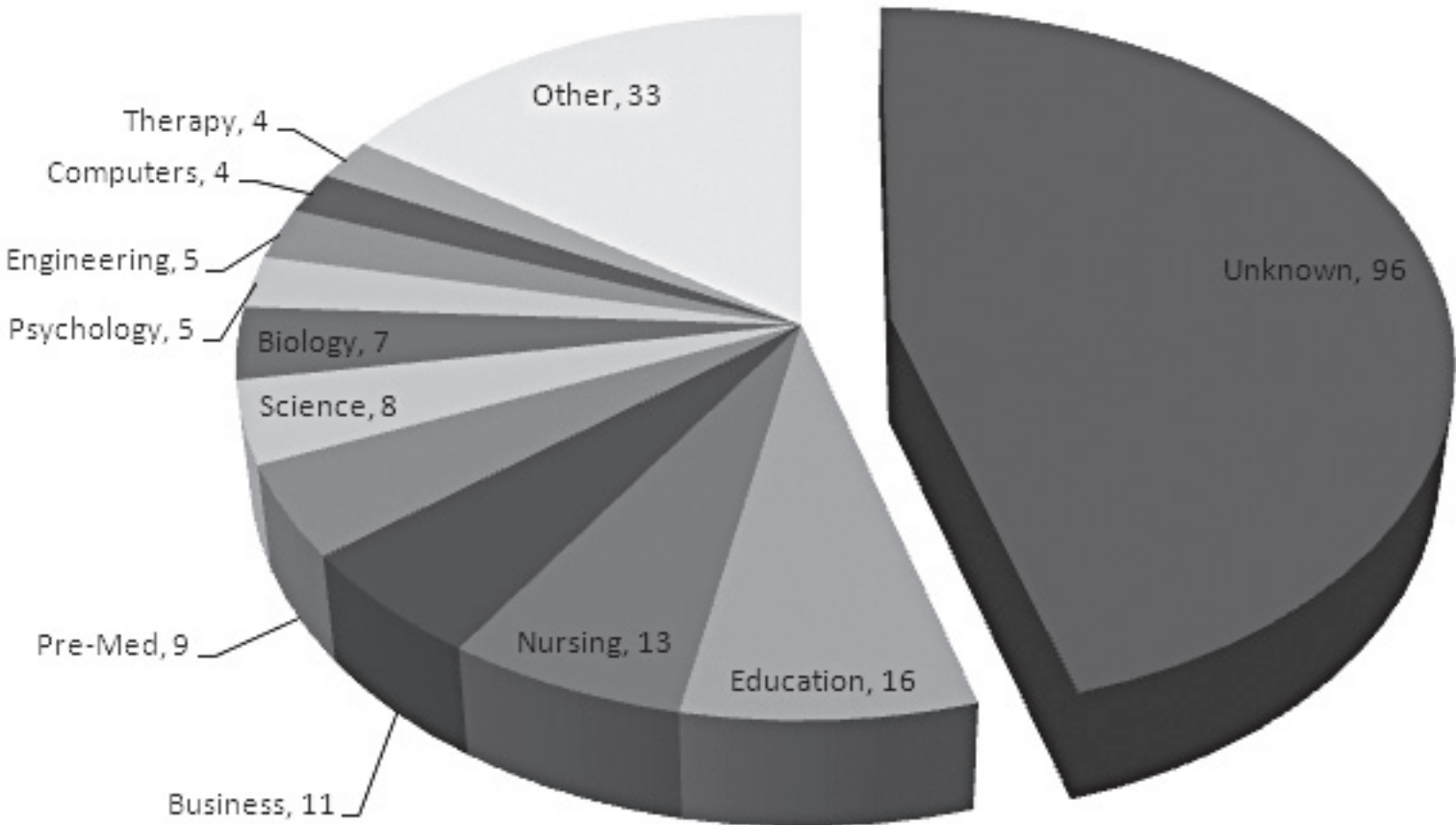
