

Farmer Bill Dies in House

Killer Cats take Control

Investigations are underway after several animals are suspected of being involved in the death of their owner, Bill Brasky. Brasky ran a yam farm about 7km out of the district of Chilliwack. He lived mainly by himself with the exception of 47 domestic house cats. The actual count on the cats remained unclear until the time of Brasky's tragic death.

He was found in the hallway of his home with his pants around his ankles and several abrasions all over his body. The bathroom door was open and feces were present in the toilet so it was believed that Brasky was relieving himself at the time of the attack. He was found clutching his toilet brush in his left hand and his plunger in his right, appearing that he used these items as weapons in an attempt to



defend himself against the ferocious felines.

Neighbour and friend of Brasky's, Gail Tweeger, stated that "(Brasky) always took good care of his cats. He had a large barn where most of the cats slept and even constructed this giant litter box where all the kitties went to do their business. There was lots to do around the place and he even had a bunch of little fun things for the cats to play on, it was rather nice. He liked to think that the cats would protect his farm so he would protect them." Tweeger will be speaking at Brasky's funeral next Saturday.

Since he lived alone and did not have many close friends or family to obtain his things. However, his cats will be taken away for testing.

After searching his property, investigators found lab equipment in

Brasky's basement that appeared like a testing centre for cats. It is believed that he may have been using unorthodox methods to enhance the DNA of the cats. He seemed to be using a formula similar to steroids to strengthen the cats. This must have been his plan in order to counter the rising theft that has been happening towards produce farms. The steroids may have been what caused the cats to become overly aggressive and caused them to attack their owner.

A memorial service will be held next Saturday at Chilliwack Memorial Home.
