## Kurt Warner retires

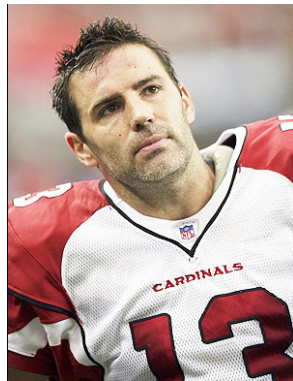
The 38-year-old quarterback announced his retirement after nearly 12 years in the league. He is walking away from the sport with a year left on a two-year, \$23 million contract. He is still able to play to his full ability, however, he is thinking about the future and wants to quit. The main reason for retiring is that he is getting older now, and he almost got a concussion while playing the New Orleans Saints in the 2010 playoffs. Triston Dacken says, "I hope that the Seattle Seahawks will be able to beat them now."

He is one of the most revered quarterbacks. It started when he came out of nowhere and led the St. Louis Rams to two Super Bowls. Ironically, the NFL had first rejected Warner, leading him to play in the Arena Football League. He, ironically, was one of the top playing quarterbacks after playing only three seasons in the arena league.

Warner grew up in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and played at the University of Northern Iowa. He is at

the top of the charts for a variety of passing statistics. No player in NFL history reached 10,000 passing yards in less games, and he tied Dan Marino as the fastest to reach 30,000. He has the top three passing performances in Super Bowl history. He passed for 1,156 yards in the 2008 playoffs, which broke his previous record of 1,063 which he set with St. Louis in 1999.

In 124 regular-season games, he completed 65.5% of his passes for 32,344 yards and 208 touchdowns. In a comparison with the 14 quarterbacks to make the Hall of Fame in the last 25 years, Warner has had a better completion percentage, yards per pass attempt, and yards per game.

## Senior pages due

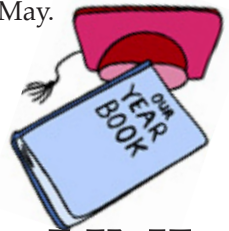

The real truth behind the great Saint Valentine is not real clear, but the stories do make him seem very romantic and sympathetic.

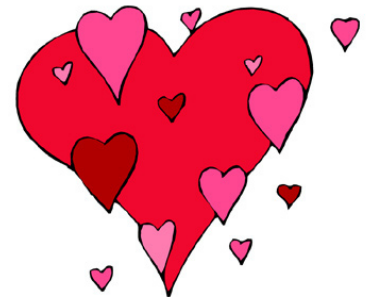
Some believe that the day is to celebrate the death or burial of Saint Valentine. Though others believe that the church made that day to celebrate Valentine's feast.

This year has been a record-breaking snow year. So far this year there is 61 inches of snow for the area and there is still more snow to come. The average amount of snow for our area is around 38 inches. KLGA reported having 50 inches of snow last year.

Some schools are trying to figure out how to make up these snow days. The usual decision of most schools is to add the days to the end of the year. However,

with so many snow days this year, some schools are trying to make the days up elsewhere. Some suggestions of schools are to have school on some days that were previously off, like the Monday after Easter, make the school days longer (by 30 or 45 minutes), start going to school on Saturdays, or have school instead of in-service. Schools can also ask the legislature for an exemption or waiver of the 180 days of classes requirement. However, in late January, Governor Culver said, “The better option is to extend the length of the day. I think the idea of not requiring the students to go to school is not a very good option.”
