

Who, Whom, Whose, and Who's

Review The pronouns *who*, *whom*, *whose*, and *who's* all have distinct uses. Learn the differences and use them correctly as follows.

- Use **who** as the subject of a sentence or clause, or as a predicate pronoun after the verb *is*, *are*, *was*, *were*, *will be*, or other forms of “to be.”
- Use **whom** as a direct object, as an indirect object, or as the object of a preposition
- Use **whose** to show possession, or something belonging to “who” or “whom”
- Use **who's** as a contraction of two words, a pronoun and a verb: *who is* or *who has*
