- (i) What do you notice about the **form** of the answers to (g) and (h)? Try to use the various answers you have in order to generalize.

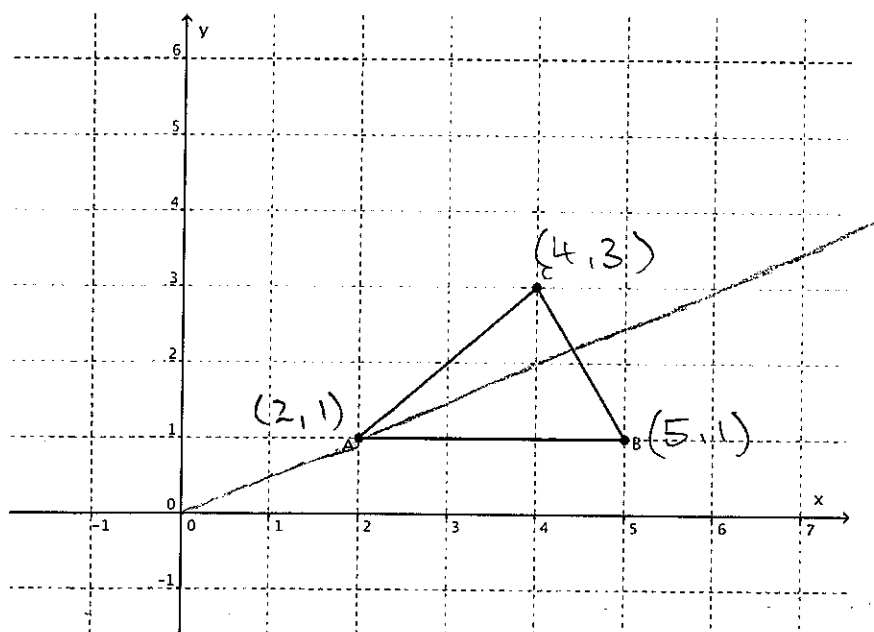
Part 2
