Use the MLA documentation style below in developing your:

1. *Working bibliography* – a record of all sources used in your research.
2. *Works cited* – a list of all sources that you cite in the text of your paper.

## Print Sources

**BOOK:** Author(s). *Title*. City of publication: Publisher, Date. Medium.

Parker, Derek and Julia Barker. *Atlas of the Supernatural*. New York: Prentice Hall, 2000. Print.

**CHART, MAP, POSTER, PHOTOGRAPH:** *Title*. City of publication: Publisher, Date. Medium.

*The Solar System*. Palo Alto: Dale Seymour Publications, 2007. Poster.

**ENCYCLOPEDIA AND REFERENCE BOOKS:** “Title of article.” *Title of book or publication*. Edition number. Year. Medium.

“Crocodile.” *Encyclopedia Americana*. 3rd edition. 2004. Print.

**MAGAZINE:** Author(s). “Title of article.” *Name of magazine* Date: Page numbers. Medium.

Satchell, Michael. “To Save the Sequoias.” *U.S. News and World Report* 7 Oct. 2006: 42-46. Print.

**NEWSPAPER:** Author. “Title of article.” *Name of Newspaper* [City if not part of name] Date, edition (if listed): Page(s). Medium.

Murphy, Sean. “It Floats.” *Rockingham News* [Exeter, NH] 21 May 2009, late ed.: A12. Print.

**PAMPHLET:** Same style as book without author

## Non-Print Sources

**FIELD TRIP:** Site. Location. Attending Group. Date.

Longfellow-Evangeline State Commemorative Area. St. Martinville, LA. Grade 6, Maplewood Middle School. 13 March 2007.

**INTERVIEW:** Person interviewed. Type of interview (personal, telephone. . .). Date.

Parsons, Mary. Telephone interview. 30 May 2008.

**SPEAKER:** Speaker. "Title." Sponsoring organization. Location. Date. Type of Presentation.

Landry, Bob. "Acadiens." Maplewood 6th Grade Team. Maplewood Middle School Auditorium, Sulphur, LA. 7 March 2009. Lecture.

**TELEVISION OR RADIO PROGRAM:** "Title of episode or segment." *Title of program*. Network. Call letters, City. Date(s). Medium.

"Secrets of Lost Empires." *Nova*. PBS. WGBH, Boston. 26 May 2007. Television.

**VIDEO:** *Title*. Director or producer. Distributor, Date. Medium.

*Jurassic Park, The Lost World*. Dir. Stephen Spielberg. Century Fox, 1995. DVD.

### Electronic Sources

**WEB PAGE:** Author. "Title." Site sponsor or Internet site, Date of posting or latest update. Medium. Date of access. <Electronic address or URL> (if required).

**ENTIRE WEB SITE:** Editor, author, or compiler name (if given). *Name of Site*. Date of posting or latest update. Name of sponsoring organization, Medium. Date of access. <Electronic address or URL> (if required).

House, Harold. *Building Green Homes*. 4 June 2008. Green Living, Web. 30 April 2009. <<http://greenliving.org>>.

NOTE 1: These samples are written as if you were doing your bibliography electronically. If you are handwriting the entries, underline the parts that are in italics.

NOTE 2: For more detailed directions and complete listings, see *MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers* (Gibaldi 2009).
