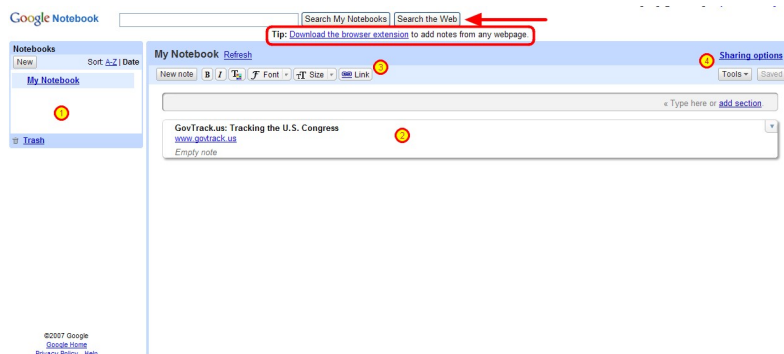
Parts of the Notebook Window

1. See a list of your notebooks, create a notebook in one click.

2. The list of the sites in the selected notebook. This notebook only has one site right now, but **more links can be added by typing or pasting the links in the entry slots.**

3. Typical editing tools for formatting text and for inputting the URL links to your favorite sites.

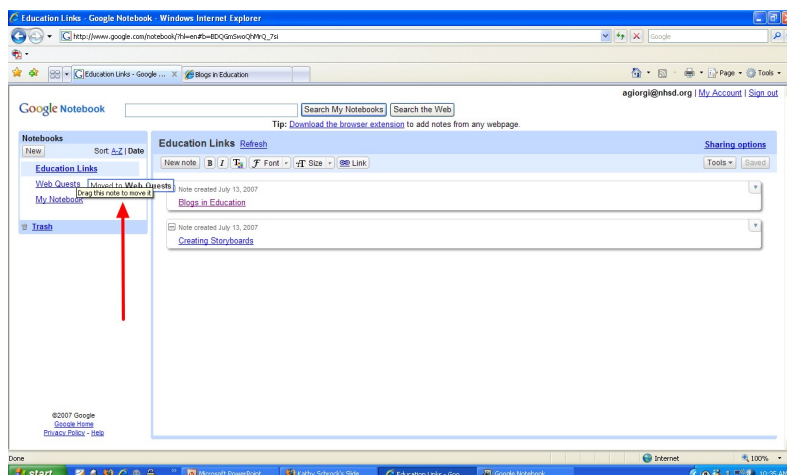
4. The sharing features allow you to keep notebooks public or private.



Reordering and Moving

Reordering and moving is quite easy. If you have multiple links, you can reorder them just by moving them around by clicking and dragging on them.

Similarly, if you decide to move a link from one notebook to another, you can drag right to that notebook's name as in the example here.

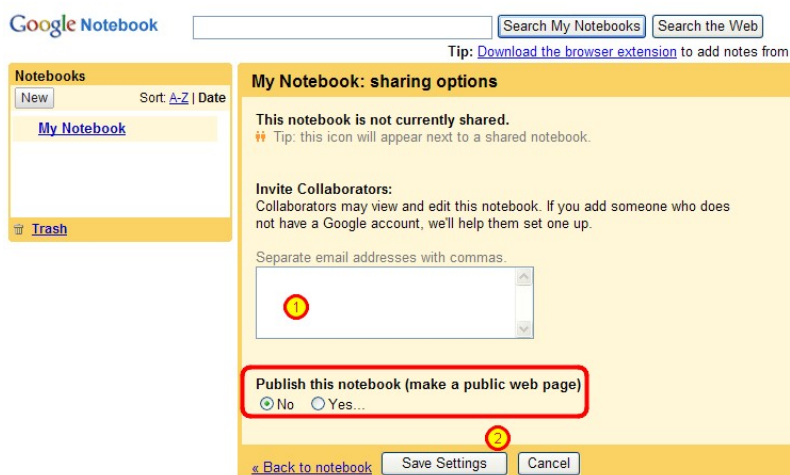


Sharing Features

1. You can share this just like Google Docs with certain people by providing an email address. This is particularly useful for example if a teacher or student group were to do research together. This would allow for real-time collaboration.

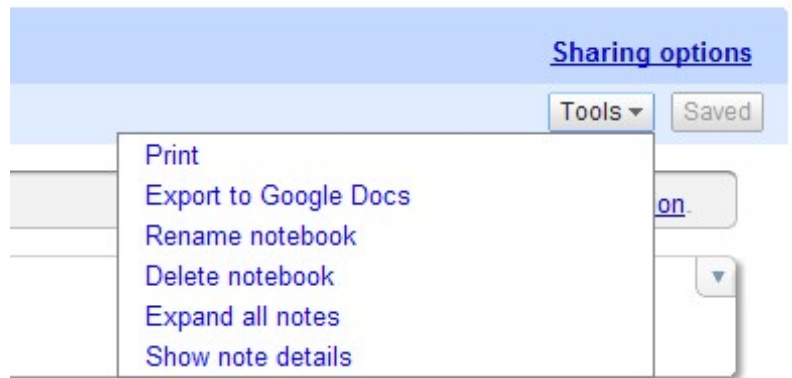
2. Alternately, you can publish the notebook and make it publicly searchable.

Just remember, whatever you do click on the SAVE SETTINGS button.



Tools

Various tools are available which allow you to control what you view as well as Export to Google Docs in one click



Notebook Exported to Google Docs

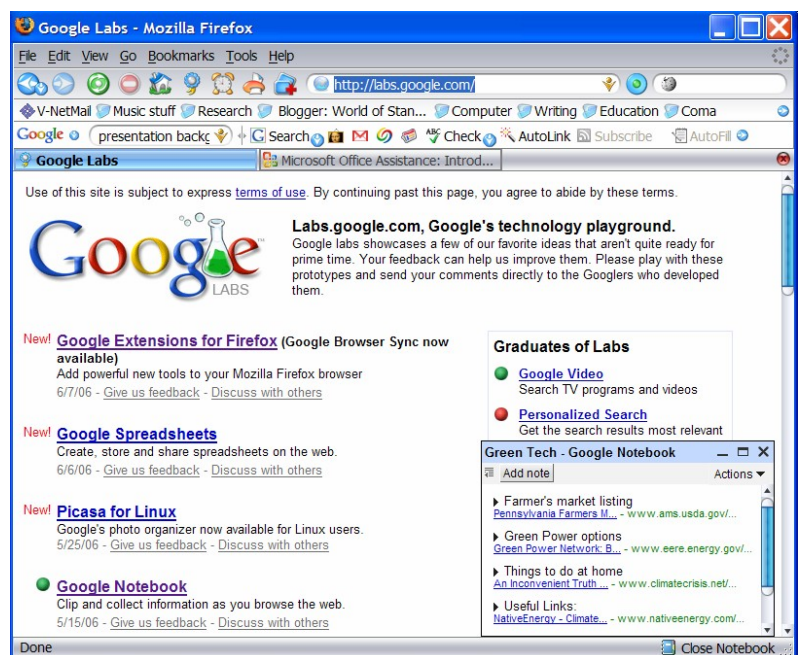
If you choose the one click export option, Google creates a GoogleDoc file with your notebooks links listed. They are clickable.



Plug-in Installation

If you download and install Notebook at home, you will have it comfortably accessible in the corner of your browser whenever you work.

It is important to note that once you have an account, Google Notebook is always available no matter where you are as long as you go to Google and sign in.



Plug-in Power

Once you have the plug-in installed on your home computer all you have to do is "Right-Click" on any page and click on "Note This (Google Notebook)" and your link will automatically be added to your current notebook.

2. Click them to visit those pages.
3. You can create a new note and you have access to all of the tools as in the full page view we started with.

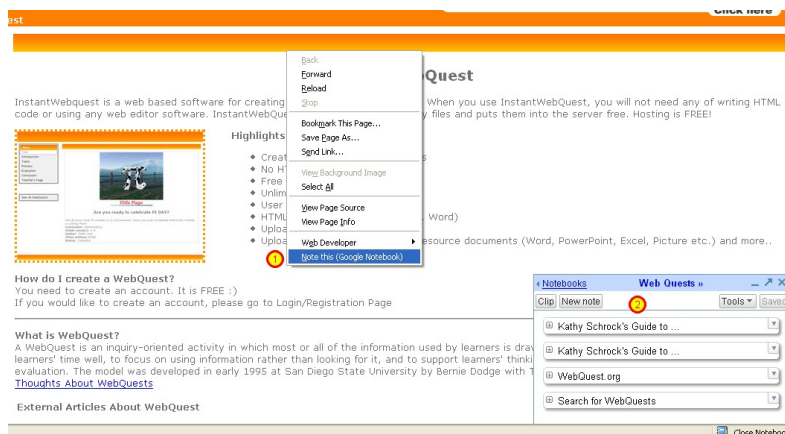
Tip: Select text and images from any web page and then hit Clip to add them to your notebook.

Full page view of how you add a site

1. Right click on the site and select "Note This."

2. It will be added along with the other link entries in the current notebook (in this case WebQuests).

Note: If you click on the notebooks link (right hand corner of the mini-Notebook window) it will expand to give you control over the notebooks themselves rather than just the links.



Expanded miniature view
