## Writeboard makes it easy to...

- ✓ Write without fear of losing or overwriting a good idea
- ✓ Compare different versions of a document
- ✓ Collaborate with colleagues on copy, proposals, memos, etc.
- ✓ Subscribe to documents via RSS and be notified of changes
- ✓ Keep your writings organised

## Writeboard use in the classroom...

- ✓ Brainstorming activity
- ✓ Storywriting -Children have they had 5 -10 mins to write and then they saved and logged on to another writeboard and added to what the previous group wrote.
- ✓ Communication tool- The children click on their name and use their username as the password. This can then be used at home and school. They use the "edit this text" space to write and then the comments space is for the teacher to leave tips and for parents to communicate also.
- ✓ Gathering data on a topic

Steps:

1. Go to <http://123.writeboard.com/>
2. Go to the Create a Writeboard box where you will name your Writeboard, assign a password and enter your email.

**Create a writeboard**  
It's fast and completely free. Just 3 fields and you're done. Here we go...

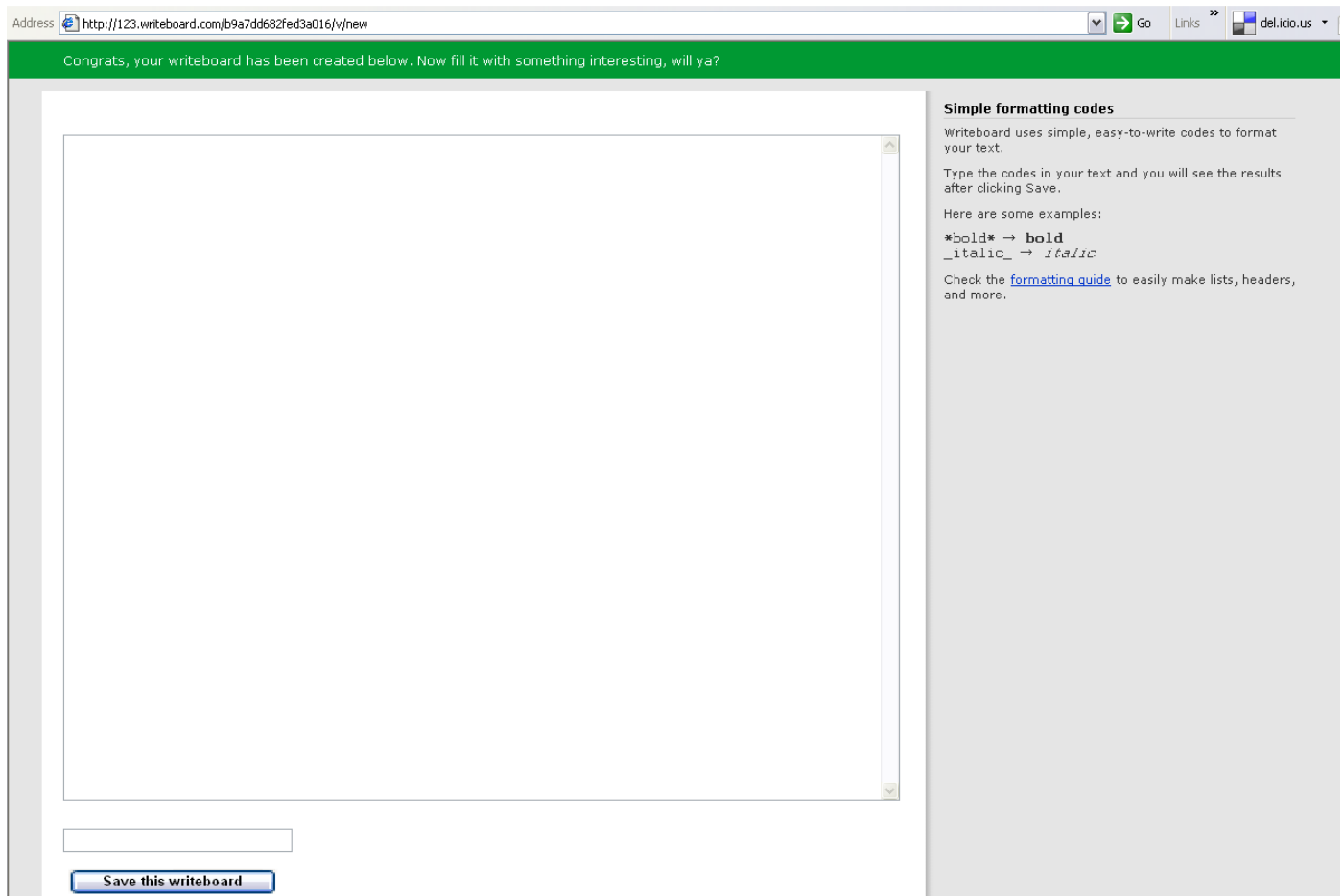
**1. Name the writeboard**
