Covers American wars from colonial times to the Gulf War in 1991, including the American Revolution, Civil War, Cold War, Vietnam War and both world wars, discussing its significance, background, causes, and battles, arranged chronologically.

Pays tribute to the generation of Americans who fought in World War II, telling the stories of individual men and women who, united by common purpose and values, served their country overseas and returned to create modern America.
