- 304.6 Gen                    Genocide. Detroit : Greenhaven Press, c2007.  
A collection of twenty-five articles that address issues related to twentieth-century genocide including examples from Armenia, the Nazi Holocaust, Cambodia, Rwanda, and Bosnia-Herzegovina.
- 304.6 Jan                    January, Brendan, 1972-. Genocide : modern crimes against humanity. Minneapolis, Minn. : Twenty-First Century Books, c2007.  
Explores the process of genocide by examining the genocides of six different groups of people, the Armenians of the Ottoman Empire, the Jews of Europe, the Cambodians, the Tutsis of Rwanda, the Muslims of Bosnia, and the Darfur tribes of Sudan, focusing on the human aspects of genocide that are often overlooked.
- 304.663 Gen                Genocide. San Diego, CA : Greenhaven, c2001.  
Twenty-one articles examine genocide from several perspectives, discussing twentieth-century examples in Armenia, Hitler's Germany, Cambodia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, and Rwanda; explanations for genocide; prevention of and punishment of genocide; and the struggles of endangered peoples around the world, including Amazonian tribes and Tibetans.
- 305.235 ELL                Ellis, Deborah, 1960-. Kids of Kabul : living bravely through a never-ending war. Toronto, Ont. ; : Groundwood Books/House of Anansi Press, 2012.  
Examines the lives of children living in Kabul, featuring boys and girls ages ten to seventeen discussing their lives in a country at war.
- 305.891 Kur                The Kurds. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Presents a historical background on the Kurds while looking at controversies surrounding the group's treatment by Iraq and Turkey and whether the Kurds should be granted an independent state, and features four personal narratives.
- 305.896 KID                Kidder, Tracy. Strength in what remains. Random House trade pbk. ed. New York : Random House Trade Paperbacks, 2010, c2009.  
Flights -- Gusimbura. The author relates his experiences speaking and traveling with an African refugee named Deo, who escaped genocide and earned his doctorate degree in medicine from Columbia University, to Burundi, where Deo built a hospital and reflected on the many deaths in the region.
- 364.151 Alt                Altman, Linda Jacobs, 1943-. Genocide : the systematic killing of a people. Springfield, N.J. : Enslow, c1995.  
Looks at examples of genocide throughout history, including mass killings of people in Nazi Germany, Turkey, the Ukraine, Cambodia, Somalia, Rwanda, and of Native Americans in the U.S.
- 364.151 GOU                Gourevitch, Philip, 1961-. We wish to inform you that tomorrow we will be killed with our families : stories from Rwanda. New York : Picador, c1998.  
A collection of true stories that help profile the genocide that took place in Rwanda in 1994 after the government demanded that all Tutsi people be killed.

- 364.151 MON Montgomery, Lane H. Never again, again, again... : genocide: Armenia, The Holocaust, Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Darfur. New York : Ruder Finn Press, c2007.  
A photographic essay with text on the six major genocides of the 20th and 21st centuries: Armenia, the Holocaust, Cambodia, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Rwanda and Darfur. More than a chronicle of dates and death tolls, it gives a personal history of victims, perpetrators and consequences. With texts by Terry George, Dr. Richard Hovannisian, James Rosenthal, Chuck Sudetic and Ruth Messinger.
- 941.5 Har Harris, Nathaniel. Heritage of Ireland : a history of Ireland & its people. New York : Checkmark Books, c1998.  
A photographic history of Ireland, describing many aspects of the Irish way of life; examining Irish art, literature, and musical traditions; and discussing the elements that have combined to create the distinctive Irish identity.
- 941.5081 Bar Bartoletti, Susan Campbell. Black potatoes : the story of the great Irish famine, 1845-1850. Boston : Houghton Mifflin, c2001.  
Presents an overview of the Irish potato famine of 1845-50, describing the blight on this vital food source, and including information on the political and personal impact it had on Ireland and its people.
- 941.5081 Fee Feed the children first : Irish memories of the Great Hunger. 1st ed. New York : Atheneum Books for Young Readers, c2002.  
Presents first-person accounts from people who remember the potato famine that swept Ireland in the mid-nineteenth-century causing widespread starvation, and includes related illustrations.
- 949 Kos Kosovo. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Provides background information on the ethnic groups of Kosovo, and describes the breakup of Yugoslavia, the events leading up to war, the international intervention, and its consequences.
- 949.7 Yan Yancey, Diane. Life in war-torn Bosnia. San Diego, CA : Lucent Books, c1996.  
Examines life in Bosnia before communism, under Tito's rule, and under present conditions of war.
- 949.702 Bla Black, Eric. Bosnia : fractured region. Minneapolis, Minn. : Lerner Publications, c1999.  
Describes the history of the ethnic conflict in Bosnia, including current issues.
- 949.703 HAR Harris, Nathaniel. The war in former Yugoslavia. Austin, Tex. : Raintree Steck-Vaughn, c1998.  
An overview of the war and tragedy in former Yugoslavia.
- 949.7103 ROS Ross, Stewart. The war in Kosovo. Austin, TX : Raintree Steck-Vaughn, c2000.  
Explains the history of the recent conflict in Kosovo and the NATO intervention against Serbia.
- 949.742 HON Honig, Jan Willem, 1958-. Srebrenica : record of a war crime. New York : Penguin, 1997.  
Examines the 1995 deportation and execution of Bosnian Muslims in Srebrenica and the Serbian force's actions that led to the incident. Provides eyewitness accounts of the event and analyzes its implications for American and European foreign policy.
- 949.742 Sch Schuman, Michael. Bosnia and Herzegovina. New York : Facts On File, c2004.  
Surveys the history of Bosnia and Herzegovina, and discusses the political and social changes that have occurred in the nation since the Dayton Peace Agreement was signed in 1995.
- 951 Cam The Cambridge encyclopedia of China. 2nd ed. Cambridge [England] ; : Cambridge University Press, 1991.  
Provides basic information on China's geography, natural resources, economy, political

structures and covers the history and culture of traditional Chinese civilization.

- 951 Gre Green, Robert, 1969-. China. San Diego, CA : Lucent Books, c1999.  
Discusses the history, geography, culture, and current conditions in the People's Republic of China.
- 951.04 CHA Chang, Iris. The rape of Nanking : the forgotten holocaust of World War II. New York : Penguin Books, 1998, c1997.  
Details the massacre that took place in December 1937 when the Japanese army overthrew the ancient city of Nanking, China, and raped, tortured, and murdered over 300,000 civilians; examining the atrocity from the perspective of the Japanese soldiers, the Chinese civilians, and the Europeans and Americans who created a safety zone for survivors.
- 954.92 Eas East Pakistan. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Explores genocide and persecution in East Pakistan, including the historical/cultural background of events leading up to and including the 1971 civil war which resulted in an independent Bangladesh, issues surrounding the civil war including, systematic rape, the status of freedom fighters, the issue of refugees and war crime trials.
- 956.6 BAL Balakian, Peter, 1951-. The burning Tigris : the Armenian genocide and America's response. 1st Perennial ed. New York : Perennial, 2004, c2003.  
Presents a study of the Armenian genocide which began in the 1890s when Sultan Abdul Hamid II ordered the massacre of Armenians, and which recurred in 1915 at the hands of the Ottoman Turks, and discusses the American response to the crisis and its implications for genocides in the twenty-first century.
- 956.620154 CET Çetin, Fethiye. My grandmother : a memoir. London ; : Verso, 2008.  
Fethiye Cetin recounts the story of her grandmother's early life, when she was sent on a death march from her small Armenian village after the men were slaughtered and eventually saved by a Turkish gendarme captain who adopted her.
- 956.7044 CAR Carlisle, Rodney P. Iraq War. Rev. ed. New York : Chelsea House, c2010.  
Provides an account of the Iraq War, a three-week war fought in 2003 to eliminate the threat posed by the regime of Saddam Hussein, discusses the objectives and strategies of the combatants, looks at key battles and leaders, and considers the significance of the conflict.
- 958.1 Otf Otfinoski, Steven. Afghanistan. New York : Facts On File, c2004.  
Chronicles the history of Afghanistan, and explores daily life, politics, and the many challenges facing the country since the decline of communism in Eastern Europe. Includes photographs, a chronology, and maps.
- 958.1 Par Parks, Peggy J., 1951-. Afghanistan. San Diego : Blackbirch Press ;, c2003.  
Describes the geography, history, people and culture, political situation, and future possibilities of Afghanistan.
- 958.1 WAH Wahab, Shaista. A brief history of Afghanistan. 2nd ed. New York : Facts on File, c2010.  
Traces the history of Afghanistan from ancient civilizations to the early twenty-first century; covering the rise of Islam, the government, coups and revolutions, Mujahideen rule, the Taliban era, civil war, and more. Includes chronology and basic facts about the country's political divisions, geography, demographics, and economy.
- 958.104 Afg Afghanistan. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Examines acts of genocide, crimes against humanity, and other instances of extreme persecution, with an emphasis on events taking place in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries in Afghanistan.
- 958.104 TAL The Taliban. Detroit : Greenhaven Press, c2011.  
A collection of essays that provide varying perspectives on issues related to the Taliban, a

fundamentalist Islamic militia, discussing who they are, how they are funded, how the United States should respond to the group, and the relationship between the Taliban and other nations.

- 959.604 Cam Cambodia. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Offers articles and first-person narratives with nuanced views covering different aspects of the Cambodian Genocide and its historical background.
- 959.604 SZY Szymusiak, Molyda. The stones cry out : a Cambodian childhood, 1975-1980. Bloomington : Indiana University Press, [1999], c1986.  
The author, born in Phnom Penh in 1962 to a high Cambodian official, discusses her experiences after the Khmer Rouge takeover in 1975 which resulted in the deaths of over two million people, and tells how she and her surviving family members survived until reaching a refugee camp in 1980.
- 959.604 UNG Ung, Loung. First they killed my father : a daughter of Cambodia remembers. 1st Harper Perennial ed. New York : Harper Perennial, 2006, c2000.  
Loung Ung, one of seven children of a high-ranking government official in Phnom Penh, tells of her experiences after her family was forced to flee from Pol Pot's Khmer Rouge army, discussing her training as a child soldier in a work camp for orphans, and telling of how her surviving siblings were eventually reunited.
- 959.604 VIT Vitandham, Oni. On the wings of a white horse : a Cambodian princess's story of surviving the Khmer Rouge genocide. Mustang, OK : Tate Pub., c2005.  
Oni Vitandham chronicles the experiences she had while hiding in the jungles of Cambodia during the Cambodian genocide and her eventual immigration to the United States, where she lived as a refugee in California.
- 962.404 CRI The crisis in Darfur. 1st ed. Detroit : Greenhaven Press, c2011.  
Collects seventeen essays that examine the history of the twenty-first-century Darfur conflict from varying perspectives, discussing the history of diversity and ethnic conflict in the region, and providing first-hand accounts, a long with a chronology, and other resources.
- 962.404 STE Steidle, Brian. The devil came on horseback : bearing witness to the genocide in Darfur. New York : BBS/Public Affairs, c2007.  
Former U.S. Marine, Brian Steidle, presents eye-witness accounts to the genocide in Darfur as "Janjaweed" and Sudanese troops attacked Darfurian rebel groups and African civilians, destroyed villages, and indiscriminately murdered men, women, and children.
- 962.404 XAV Xavier, John. Darfur : African genocide. 1st ed. New York : Rosen Pub., 2008.  
Presents an overview of the crisis in Darfur and the systematic slaughter of the people by the Sudanese army and militia bands called the janjaweed; and examines the causes of the conflicts and efforts by the international community to bring the violence to an end.
- 962.7 CHE Cheadle, Don. Not on our watch : the mission to end genocide in Darfur and beyond. 1st ed. New York : Hyperion, c2007.  
Actor Don Cheadle and activist John Prendergast share stories of their visits to Darfur and other war zones in Africa and examine the genocide that has been occurring in the region as well as efforts to stop the atrocities. Offers six strategies for readers to help bring about change.
- 962.704 FLI Flint, Julie. Darfur : a new history of a long war. Rev. and updated ed. London ; : Zed Books, 2008.  
Describes the history of Darfur, and traces the origins and ideology of rebel groups including the "Janjawiid," and analyses the responses of the Sudanese government, the African Union, and the international community.
- 967 Rwa The Rwandan genocide. 1st ed. Detroit : Greenhaven Press, c2010.  
Examines the events surrounding the Rwandan genocide, explores the reactions of

countries around the world, discusses its lasting impact on the region and its people, and addresses what could have been done to stop or prevent the violence.

- 967.571 Bod Bodnarchuk, Kari. Rwanda : country torn apart. Minneapolis : Lerner, c2000.  
Describes the history of Rwanda's ethnic conflict between the Hutu and Tutsi tribes, and its continuing effect on the people of that country.
- 967.571 Rwa The Rwanda genocide. San Diego : Greenhaven Press ;, c2004.  
Presents twelve essays that argue opposing points on the 1994 genocide in Rwanda, covering its causes, the world's reaction, and the country's rebuilding, and includes an introductory overview, a chronology, and a further reading list.
- 967.57104 BLE Blewitt, Mary K. You alone may live : one woman's journey through the aftermath of the Rwandan genocide. London : Dialogue, 2010.  
The author's personal account of the 1994 Rwandan civil war and genocide, her work with the survivors, and the founding of the Survivors Fund (SURF).
- 967.57104 HAT Hatzfeld, Jean. Machete season : the killers in Rwanda speak : a report. New York : Picador, c2005.  
Jean Hatzfeld offers an inside look at the motives behind the genocidal massacre of almost a million people in Rwanda more than a decade ago, interviewing ten of the killers and examining why they killed thousands of men, women, and children.
- 967.57104 KIN Kinzer, Stephen. A thousand hills : Rwanda's rebirth and the man who dreamed it. Hoboken, NJ : Wiley, c2008.  
Presents a detailed account of the 1994 genocide in Rwanda and how Paul Kagame, leader of the rebel army, was able to bring it to an end; and traces Kagame's efforts to build a secret revolutionary army that overthrew the Rwandan government.
- 967.61 Uga Uganda. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Explores genocide and persecution in Uganda, including the historical/cultural background of events from the early 1970s to the twenty-first century. Issues surrounding events such as the despotic rule of Idi Amin, Milton Obote, and Yoweri Museveni and genocidal acts committed by government and rebel forces.
- 972.84 El El Salvador and Guatemala. Detroit, MI : Greenhaven Press, c2013.  
Examines acts of genocide, crimes against humanity, and other instances of extreme persecution, with an emphasis on events taking place in the twentieth and twenty-first centuries in El Salvador and Guatemala.
- B BALAKIAN Balakian, Peter, 1951-. Black dog of fate : a memoir. 10th anniversary pbk. ed. New York : Basic Books, 2009.  
Bestselling author Peter Balakian chronicles his life, focusing on his childhood in the American suburbs and how he felt after learning the truth about his family's experiences during the Armenian Genocide in 1915.
- B BASHIR Bashir, Halima, 1979-. Tears of the desert : a memoir of survival in Darfur. One World Books trade pbk. ed. New York : One World Trade Paperbacks, 2009.  
Recounts the author's experiences and observations of the genocide in Darfur, and her role as a physician treating girls who had been raped and mutilated, after tensions between Sudan's Islamist dictatorship and communities such as the Zaghawa tribe exploded.
- B CLO Orr, Tamra. George Clooney and the crisis in Darfur. 1st ed. New York : Rosen Pub., 2009.  
Chronicles actor George Clooney's efforts to halt the genocide that is taking place in Darfur, explaining how he became involved in the cause, why the genocide has been allowed to continue, and its impact on the people of Darfur.
- B Dau Dau, John Bul. Lost boy, lost girl : escaping civil war in Sudan. Washington, D.C. : National Geographic, c2010.

John Bul Dau and his wife, Martha, describe the hardships they experienced, including violence, famine, and war, while growing up in the Sudan and explain how they escaped the region to start a new life.

B Karzai

Wagner, Viki, 1953-. Hamid Karzai. Detroit : Lucent Books, c2011.

Introduction: The Afghan partner in America's longest war -- The dutiful son -- Driving out a superpower -- Driving out the Taliban -- President Karzai -- Karzai's uncertain future -- Important dates -- Glossary. A concise biography of Hamid Karzai, Afghanistan's first democratically elected president, that discusses his life, personality, political challenges, and related topics; and includes a list of important dates.

B KEAT

Keat, Nawuth, 1964-. Alive in the killing fields : surviving the Khmer Rouge genocide. Washington, D.C. : National Geographic, c2009.

Nawuth Keat, a survivor of the Khmer Rouge invasion of Cambodia, describes his experiences, discussing the killings of his family members, his enslavement, the relationships that were formed between people from his community, and more.

B KHERDIAN

Kherdian, David. The road from home : the story of an Armenian girl. 1st Beech Tree ed. New York : Beech Tree Books, 1995.

A biography of the author's mother, concentrating on her childhood in Turkey before the Turkish government deported its Armenian population.

B Latifa

Latifa, 1980-. My forbidden face : growing up under the Taliban : a young woman's story. 1st ed. New York : Talk Miramax Books, c2001.

Latifa, a young woman who was sixteen in 1996 when the Taliban came to power in Afghanistan, tells about her family's experiences under the repressive regime, focusing on the lives of women and girls who were abruptly denied the freedom to work, go to school, or even leave their homes without a male escort.

B Pol

Koopmans, Andy. Pol Pot. Detroit, MI : Lucent Books :, c2005.

Describes the life of infamous Cambodian leader Pol Pot, discussing his privileged childhood, his political career, and his regime's torture and murder of millions of people.

RUSESABAGINA

Rusesabagina, Paul, 1955-. An ordinary man : an autobiography. New York : Penguin Books, 2007, c2006.

Paul Rusesabagina recounts the story of his life, describing what it was like to grow up on a small farm in Rwanda, how he became the first Rwandan general manager of a Belgian-owned hotel, and how he helped his fellow countrymen during the 1994 Rwandan genocide.

A graphic novel that describes the Tutsi genocide in Rwanda in 1994 through the eyes of a boy named Deogratias, a Hutu, who is in love with Benigne, a Tutsi.

A full-color graphic story about the struggles of Ervin Rustemagic and his family to survive during the eighteen-month siege of Sarajevo in 1992-93, constructed by the author from faxes he received from Rustemagic during the bombardment.
