

Breakfast/Lunch with Dead Psychologists

Presentations: Monday October 1st and Tuesday October 2nd
(50 points)



Project: This is an individual project in which you will need to impersonate a famous dead (or nearly dead) psychologist. You may select a psychologist from the attached list, or create a proposal for an alternate psychologist. Choices will be given on a first come, first serve basis.

1. Create a poster that represents your psychologist, the poster should include but is not limited to the following criteria.
 - a. Picture (3points)
 - b. Birth/Death dates (1 point)
 - c. Contribution to the field of psychology/ Historical Impact (5 points)
 - d. An interesting fact that most would not know (1 point)
 - e. How is this individual's research important to modern day psychology? If this person were alive today, how might they apply their theory or research? (5 points)
2. Develop a question from your psychologist's perspective for each of the other dead Psychologists. The questions should be content driven and demonstrate that you have some basic knowledge of what type of research that individual conducted. (25 points) (I will also need a copy of your questions):

3. Create a costume for your psychologist. His costume may be either literal, metaphorical. (10 points)

Presentation:

Day 1: Each Psychologist will present their costume and poster during the first day of presentations. They will explain the basic components of their theory and how it relates to modern research.

Day2: The dead psychologists will mingle as if at a dinner party and ask each other the questions, which they have created. (If you would like to bring something to eat to share with the class, feel free, it would be fun if you can connect it to your psychologist somehow).
