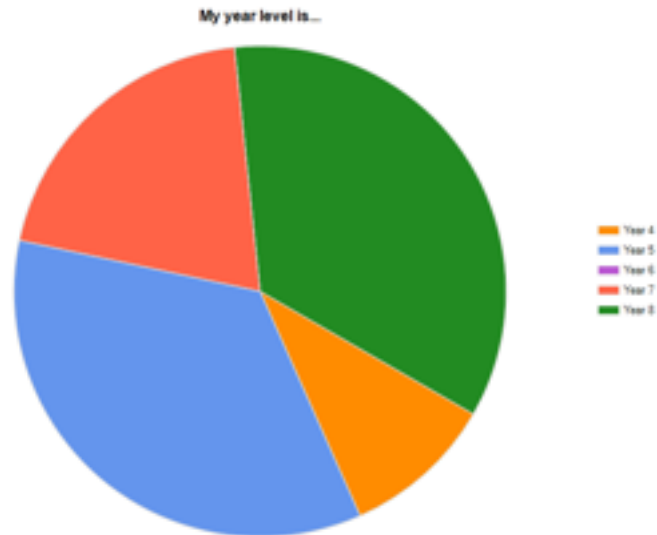


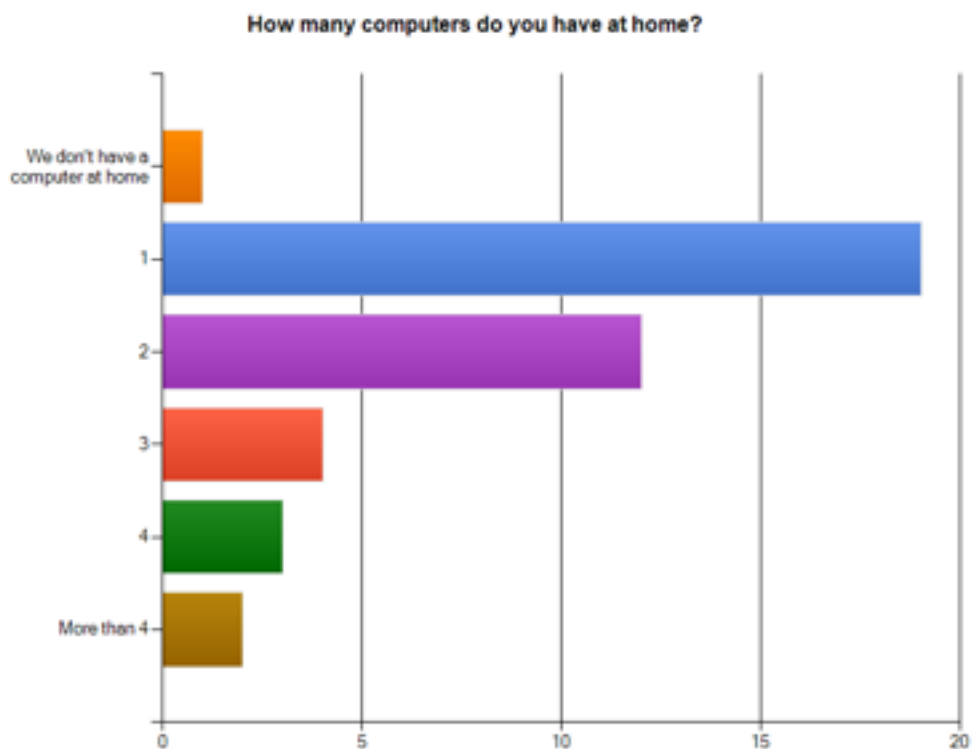
# Reremoana Cyber Safety Survey Results 2012

## Year level Range



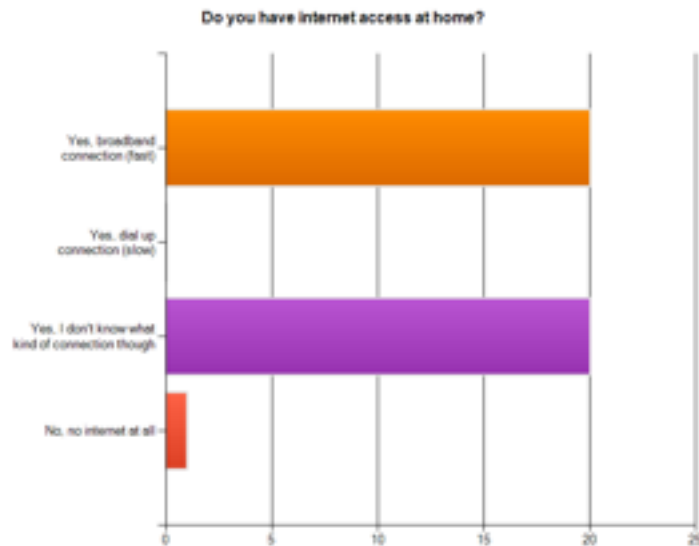
## How many computers do you have at home.

We could clearly see that a majority of our students have 1 computer at home. A very small amount (2.4%) do not have any computer access at home, at all.



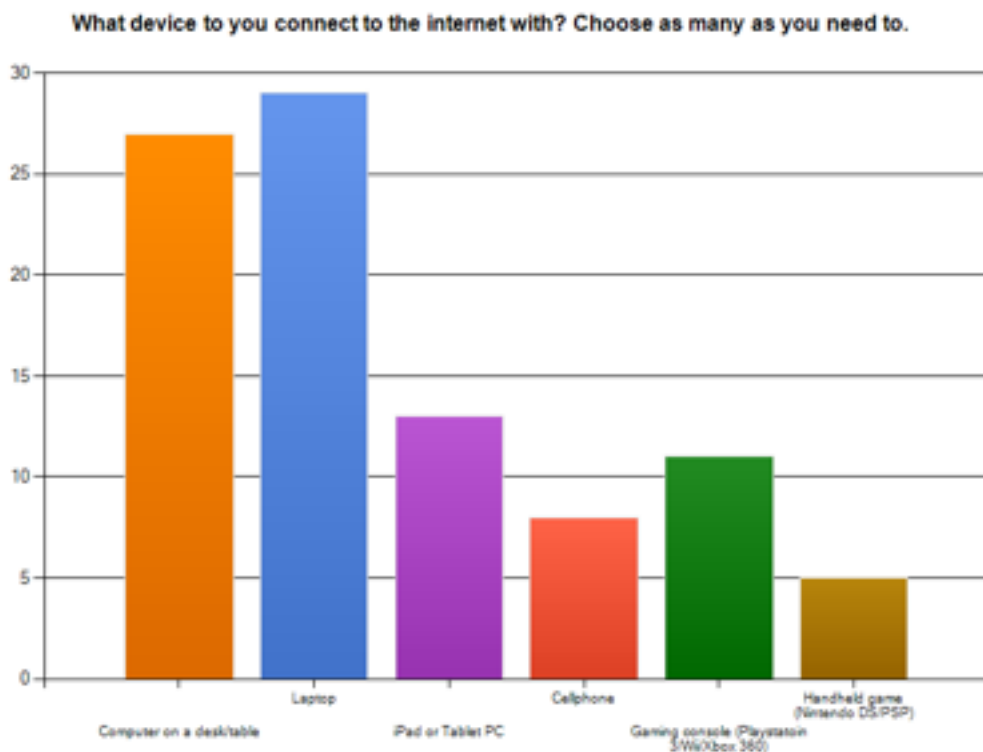
## Internet at home.

A vast majority of our students have access to the internet with only 2.4% (the same children with no computer) having none. No students had dial up but many of them did not know what type of connection they used.



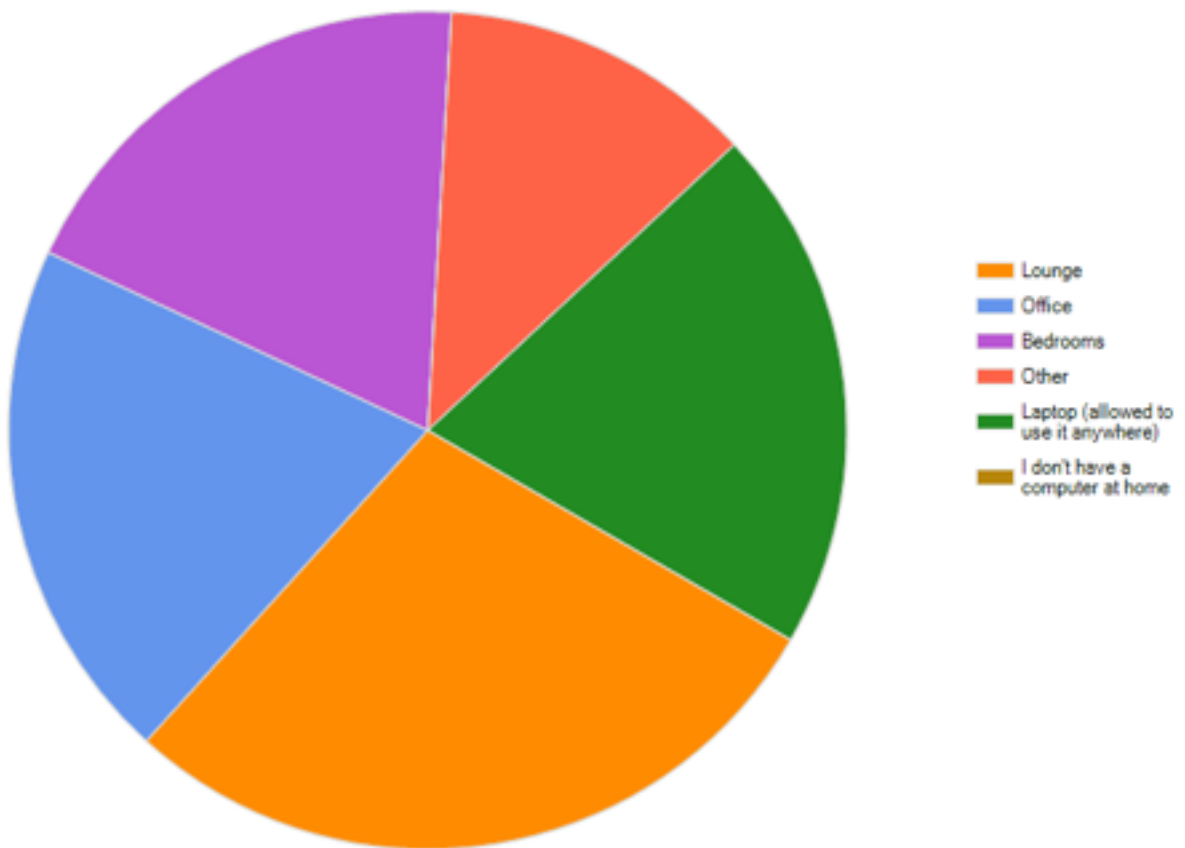
## Devices & Location.

Majority of students have desktop or laptop. There are also many students connecting with mobile devices.



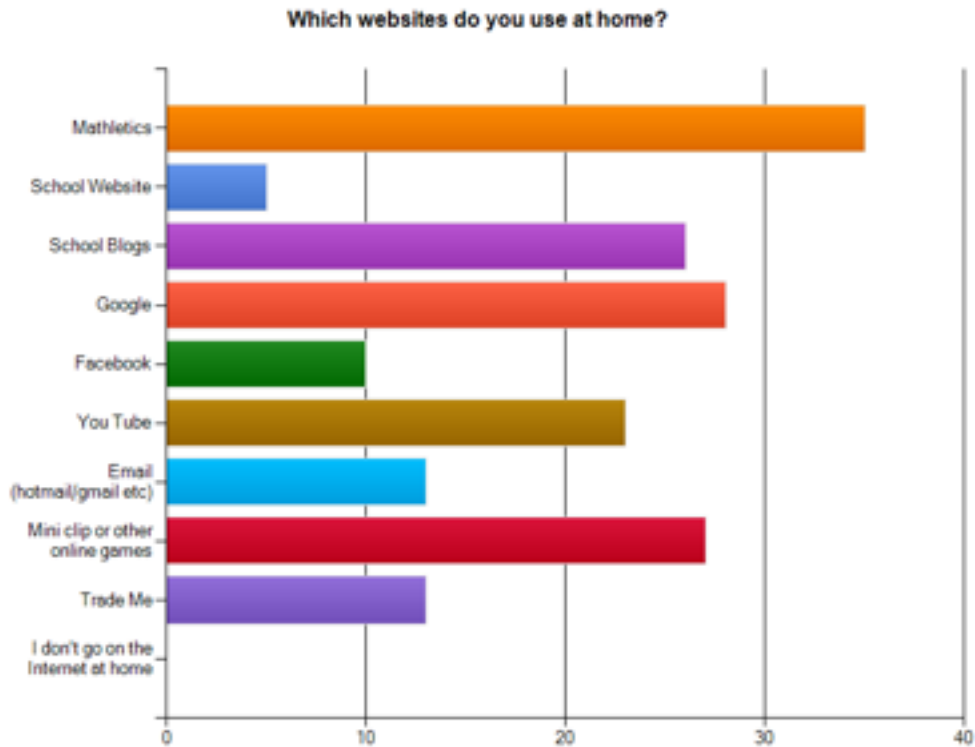
There was a wide spread of places where students used the internet at home. It was concerning for us that many students were allowed to use the internet in their bedroom or not in a common place.

## Websites.

The most common websites students used at home were mathematics, school blogs, google, you tube and online games (unspecified). In the specified (other) option children predominantly responded with Superclubs/Club penguin type sites.

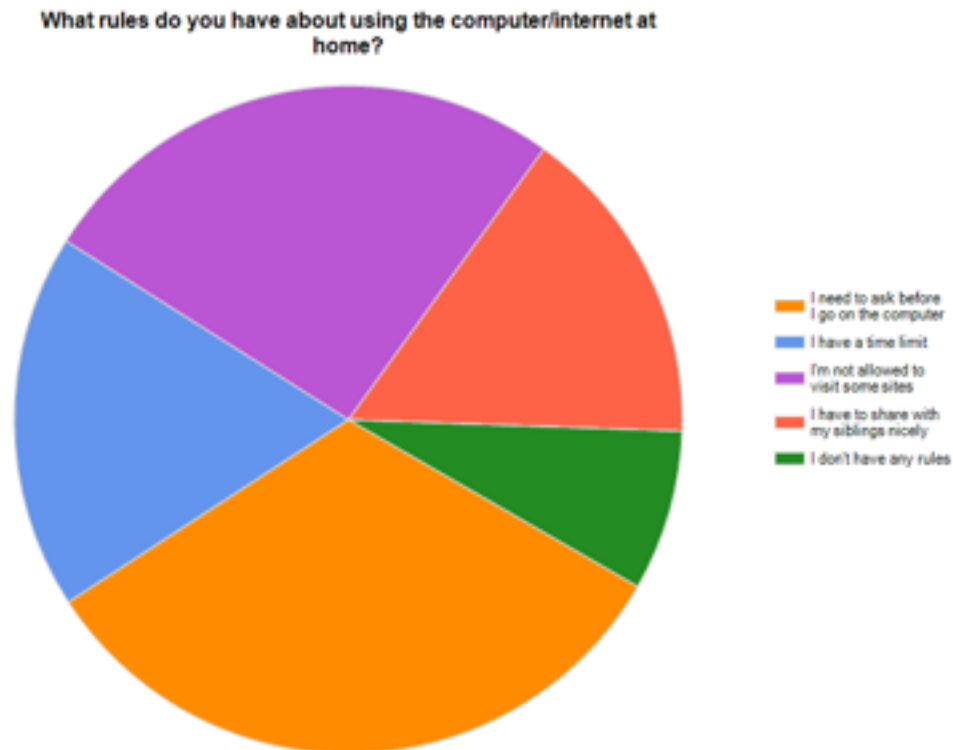


When asked their favourite things to do on the internet the common trends we found were;

## Rules and Safety.

We were happy to see that most students needed to ask before they went on the computer/internet and only a small percentage didn't have any rules (15%), although this would still be a point to address with students and their families.



When asked if their parents/caregivers had spoken to students about being safe online we had only 60% yes responses, 12.5% no responses and 27.5% said they were unsure if they had had a conversation or not.

This told us that there needs to be a cyber safety component in our teaching incase it is being missed off at home.

When asked about what advice they might give someone about being safe on the internet responses we were pleased with were;

- To check with parents about sites you haven't been to before.
- Go to mum and dad if you need help or feel unsafe.
- Be careful when interacting with people online as you don't know who they are.
- Don't click on ads or pop ups.
- Let someone know if you're being bullied or a pop up comes up.
- Don't give out personal information.
- Check for reputable websites.

- Conduct yourself appropriately and present yourself well online - no rude things on blogs or websites.
