

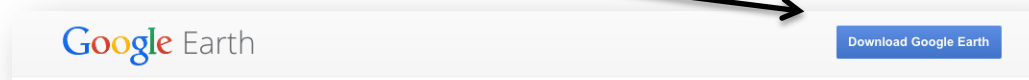
Tasks To Explore Some Of Google's Potential

Exploring Google Earth

If you don't have Google Earth on your computer or device **iPad users**. Go to the App Store and type in Google Earth. The icon will look like this. Download the icon to your desktop



Mac Users type into your search engine Google Earth and click download



Follow the instructions to **install** on your computer.

Once on your computer or device.

Open Google Earth and

1. Search for your current home address
2. Enter Street view by place the little yellow person at the address and check out your house
3. Search for the first house you lived in
4. See if you can find your way to the school your first went to
5. Visit either the Eiffel Tower Paris or t Uluru, Northern Territory
6. To show you have reached one of these destinations take a screen-capture.

For **Mac Users** go to File >save image> and save to your desktop

For iPad Users –place simultaneous your finger on the Home button and power button and press very quickly you will hear a camera click. The image will automatically save in to photos

Exploring Google News

1. In the search area type **Budget 2015**. You will see many items from many sources appear. The time the articles have been posted will also appear.
2. Open an article to read and close. On the iPad tap the x in the top right hand corner, on a Mac use the back button and return to Google News
3. Type in Aljazeera News and see the number of articles that appear or
4. Use a phrase such as ‘refugees and asylum seekers’ and see how many international papers make comment on the Australian position
5. Type in East Timor News and see if you can locate news articles from sources other than Australia
6. Discuss with those around you the positives and negatives of using Google News

Exploring Google Search

1. Try to explore the one topic/subject but use as many as the tools that Google offers eg type in Yowaka Goldfields and look at a range of offerings on under the web.
2. Switch to images and see what you can find that is relevant to the Yowaka Goldfields
3. Check out Books and see what books specifically refer to those specific goldfields
4. Select a topic you are interested in and see how many Google tools you can use to research the topic thoroughly

Exploring Google for Fun

1. Type in the Google web search “Friends Reunited”
