Keynote Presenter

Sharon Gregson is an elected Trustee on the Vancouver Board of Education and works with the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC. She was a CCAAC representative on the Child Care Human Resources Sector Council.



Currently, Sharon manages the Family Place at Collingwood Neighbourhood House comprised of 11 licensed child care and preschool programs, 2 aboriginal programs, 2 Strong Start Programs, CAPC, and a Success by 6 program.

She is an outspoken advocate municipally, provincially, and federally for quality child care services.

Sharon works for a stronger public education system that includes the early years.

The Plan for an Integrated System of Early Care and Learning in BC

Sharon will introduce the plan, developed by the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC and the Early Childhood Educators of BC – with input from thousands of British Columbians.

Change is upon us and it's time for the child care community to be proactive and lead the way with a Plan for how BC can and should integrate early care and learning.

Highlights of the Plan include:

- An Early Care and Learning Act to enshrine the rights of young children and the rights of families.
- A new home for all early care and learning programs in the Ministry of Education.
- Early Care and Learning Plans developed by Boards of Education.
- Early Years Centres – a more appropriate approach than pre-Kindergarten.
- A process to integrate existing group and family child care and preschool into Early Years Centres.
- An enhanced approach to Kindergarten and Grade 1.
- A workforce development plan.

Families need access to quality care. Quality child care IS early learning. Current policies do not meet the needs of BC's children and working families. Public spending on the early years is a wise social and economic investment. Quality matters.

We know the status quo in BC is not acceptable. National and International evidence gives us hope that this Plan is a way forward to integrate the best of child care with the advantages of our education system.

A1 Cultivating Organizational Change Part I

For Early Childhood Program Administrators only.

Barb Wells

This workshop addresses aspects of leadership including working as an effective team, understanding and acknowledging the many personalities of staff, conflict resolution – how to support resolving staff issues and conflicts, motivating the unmotivated staff.

Part 1: Barb will explore with centre administrators our unique internal worlds and lay the ground work for cultivating organizational change.

Part 2: The focus of the afternoon will be on the specifics of that groundwork such as workplace environments, individual leadership styles, personal mastery and intentional leadership, our relationship with others, emotional exhaustion or burnout, and successful responses.

You must register for both parts of this two-part workshop, morning and afternoon.

Barb Wells has a private counselling (psychotherapy) practice, working with individuals, couples, and families. She is an addiction specialist and clinical consultant; co-founder of Blueprints for Relationships—a collective of therapists working collaboratively with couples to cultivate the foundation for equitable separation and fair divorce that is children friendly. She is a workshop/Seminar facilitator, most recently facilitating a workshop for the Kootenay Boundary Community Services Co-operative. She has a Masters degree in Educational Counselling with an emphasis on Organizational Change.



A2 Supporting the Development of Emotional Maturity Part I

An Intermediate Level Workshop.

Myrna Martin

Myrna will detail how you can establish the groundwork for developing emotional maturity and self-regulation in the children you work with, using group tools for all children. There will be a hands on/hearts on demonstration of these tools.



Workshop Sessions A

Part 1: Myrna will map out a framework for understanding the underlying reasons for children's behavior from an attachment perspective, presenting cutting edge science that details the multigenerational patterns of behavior.

Part 2: Myrna will focus on difficult to manage behavior and effective responses. She will speak of creating safe spaces for children who are expressing anger, negativity, anxiety and early childhood depression. She will use an interactive format inviting you to practice and play with the skills she shares with you. Some video tape of these tools in action will be shown.

Myrna Martin has 40 years of experience working with children and families, as a public health nurse, family therapist, craniosacral therapist and an attachment specialist. She has a private practice in Nelson, and travels widely in the USA, Europe and Canada to give seminars, experiential workshops and trainings.

A3 The Needs of the Human Animal

An Advanced Level Workshop for "front line" workers like clinicians, educators, and "ground-level" administrators.

Steve Heynen

This presentation will explore the real basis of human needs. We take it for granted that an animal is happiest when it is allowed to be "as it was meant to be": in its natural environment, doing what evolution designed it to do. Somehow we have come to view our situation as human beings in a different light, and have traded what is natural to us for wealth, comfort, long lives and abundant choice; perhaps without even realizing that we were doing so.



Drawing on insights from Jean Leidloff's The Continuum Concept as well as contemporary neuroscience and developmental theory, this presentation will build the case that human development and happiness are best served by an environment that provides what evolution built us to expect. Clearly, we cannot return to the environment in which our current form evolved thousands of years ago, but in this presentation key features of that environment will be identified, along

with practical suggestions as to how those features can be replicated in our families, schools, child care programs, therapies and culture.

Steve Heynen is a graduate of the Kutenai Art Therapy Institute and has been working in the Slocan Valley for the last 3 years as a Child and Youth Mental Health Counselor. He also works as an instructor at the Kutenai Art Therapy Institute. His current course load includes Human Development, Art Therapy theory and thesis supervision. He has presented on his thesis topic (aggression in children) at a number of conferences (including the Early Years series).

This workshop will be a multi-disciplinary information session teaching ways to put preventative strategies in place to support all children's social emotional needs. Facilitators will focus on how the following concepts affect behaviour and offer practical ideas in each area:

- Awareness of sensory issues and self-regulation

- Impact of verbal and non-verbal communication, language and brain development on behavior

Taya was the Program Manager for the West Kootenay Boundary Supported Child Development Program for 7 years, and has spent the last 3 years instructing the Early Childhood Care and Education Program at Selkirk College.

In Aboriginal culture, children are viewed as the most precious and sacred gifts from the Creator. Our children and families have unique life experiences based on the urban environment to which we live and the West Kootenay has a large, diverse Aboriginal population. It is our responsibility to create nurturing and inclusive, culturally relevant learning environments for our children.



This hands-on workshop is designed to inspire participants to include and acknowledge Aboriginal culture in their work with children and families. Throughout the workshop participants will create their own Aboriginal rattle to connect with culture at its roots. The rattle can be used in teachings during circle time and can enhance the experience for all children involved. We will discuss and learn new ways to engage and excite children and families to learn about Aboriginal culture. Be prepared to get messy and have fun!

Danica Lee's ancestry is Cree and her family is from Peguis First Nation in Manitoba. She was born and raised in Nelson, BC as a visitor on this traditional territory. She works in the community alongside Aboriginal children and families with Kootenay Kids Society, with School District #8, and as the co-coordinator of the Talking Little Feet Council. Recently graduating from the University of Victoria with a Bachelors degree in social work (Indigenous Child Welfare specialization), she is very proud to be Aboriginal and to share her culture with others.

B4 Outdoor Adventuring and Curriculum Too!

An Introductory to Intermediate Level Workshop.

Not too long ago, terms like “nature deficit disorder” and “biophobia” were unheard of. Today, statistics tell us that children spend much less time outdoors. To address these issues and others, “Valhalla Trails” Outdoor Adventuring takes children out to the forest, neighbourhood ponds, and the backyard.

In this workshop, Natalie will take you, the educator, through these environments. Together you will discover some of the endless possibilities of learning in all curriculum areas that can take place outside the four-walled classroom. Using stories, displays and discussions, Natalie will focus on how educators can nurture “nature” connections and support learning moments in their own outdoor environments.

Natalie Lucas is director and ECE at Wee Ones and Valhalla Children's Center in the Slocan Valley. The process of separation and divorce is challenging for both parents and children. Family changes can bewilder and upset children but the good news is they can travel successfully through major life transitions with the right kinds of support. When hearing phrases like “Reggio-Inspired”, “Pedagogical Narrations”, “Emergent Curriculum”, “Early Learning Framework”, “children as active citizens”, do you feel unsure, curious, maybe even overwhelmed? Practically speaking, what could that look like in your classroom or centre? Cathy and Natalie will lead participants on an inspiring journey of learning and self-reflection as you consider your own image of the child and how that image affects your work with children. Using stories, displays and discussion we will focus on supporting learning moments and helping children be active citizens in their own learning.



Part 1 of this presentation will address these latest phrases as well as the view of the child as being an active citizen in their learning.

Part 2 Using pedagogical narrations, as examples of real learning moments, we will focus on how educators can support learning moments in their own environments and become comfortable with BC's Early Learning Framework.

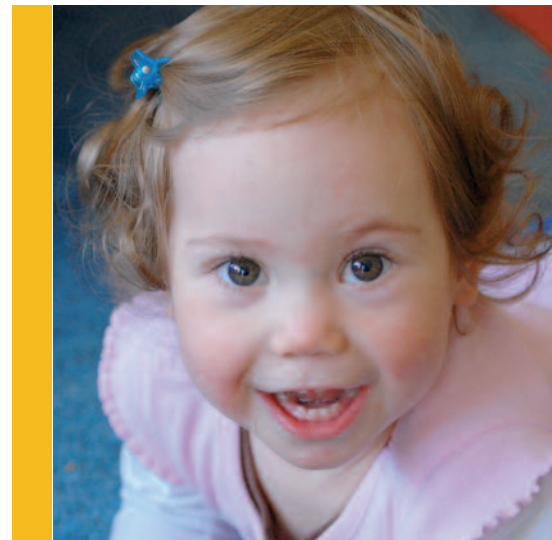
C2 Ouch! That hurts!! - Redirecting the Punch

As the Liaison to Thompson Rivers University ECE Program, she works directly with the Early Childhood Education students, as well as the instructors as a mentor, practicum supervisor and seminar facilitator. Previous to working at Cariboo, she worked in Supported Child Care as well as at a Montessori Program. Mary has been presenting for the past 8 years in Kamloops, at the ECEBC Conference, as well as in other regions.

Amy Ward has her ECE Diploma/Special Needs/IT and is heading to Capilano University this fall to complete her ECE Degree. She has worked in the field for 6 years at Cariboo Child Care in Kamloops; 4 years with the 3-5s program, 1 year as the office assistant and currently with the toddler program. C4 Anxiety as a Learning Barrier

Anxiety can shut down clear thinking in the best of us. This presentation will explore the work of Dr. Bruce Perry who describes how maltreated children often operate on a basic level of alarm interfering with their emotional maturity and ability to learn. Dr. Perry's Neurosequential Model of Therapeutics will be introduced with a specific focus on discussing how fear reduces learning in everyday situations, the role of regulation, and strategies to assist children in self-regulating.

Christine Lummis BA, DKATI, RCAT, is a Registered Art Therapist and International presenter with 14 years experience. Christine currently works in the Children Who Witness Abuse and the Sexual Abuse Intervention Program. She is a guest instructor at the Kootenai Art Therapy Institute and former Vice President of the Canadian Art Therapy Association.
