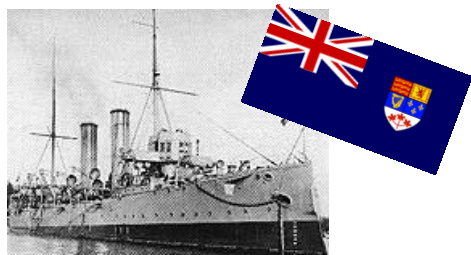


## Canadian Military Milestones for 2010!

# What is the Heritage Fair?

The Heritage Fair is a grand celebration of Canada's heritage in the form of student projects. Students from Kindergarten to Grade 12 research some aspect of Canadian culture, history, geography, or heritage—our heroes, legends, milestones, or achievements—and proudly present their stories at a public exhibition.



## Who can participate?

The Heritage Fair is open to District 71 students, including North Island Distance Education School (NIDES), from Kindergarten to Grade 12.

## Why get involved?

***The Heritage Fair both delivers and enriches the curriculum.***



Students create inquiry-based projects in cross-curricular areas and thereby develop a variety of essential skills. Depending on the project, learning outcomes from many subject areas (Social Studies, History, Art, Language Arts, English, Science, Math...) are met at all grade levels.

A classroom or school fair creates connections among staff, students, and families and provides an opportunity for home, school, and community interaction. The Canadian Heritage Fair is a public celebration of student learning!

## Where do I start?

In the classroom! The Fair begins with hands-on classroom projects. Students research an area of Canadian history or culture, perhaps of local or family interest, and present their discoveries in a creative way. Student presentations range from tabletop dioramas, in-character presentations, or technology-based projects. They can be individual, small group or whole-class projects. **\*\*Note:** Projects should not exceed the dimensions of 80 cm depth, 150 cm width and 100 cm height. One student per project may attend the fair.

School staffs may decide to host classroom or school-wide fairs. Teachers evaluate the projects and presentations using criteria, and those which fully meet expectations may go on to the District Heritage Fair. There will be prizes available and bursaries for Grades 10-12 students. Selected outstanding projects from students in Grades 4-9 will go on to the Regional Fair in Port Alberni in May, 2010, or even the Nationals in July.
