



Ancient Greek Mythology Project

Over the next few days you will read an assigned Greek Mythology story and create a presentation to share your myth showing the importance of mythology to the ancient Greeks and our world today. Once you have been assigned a myth from our classroom set of books, you will need to:

1. Read the myth and take notes about the story using the form on the back of this sheet.
2. Select and complete a project about your myth that you will share with the class.
 - a. Brochure
 - b. Poster
 - c. Performance
 - d. Game
 - e. Web-based project (Platinum Cardholders only)
 - f. Other idea? Ask your teacher for approval
3. No matter which project format you choose, each requires:
 - Title
 - Type of story (nature, lesson, or good vs. evil)
 - Characters (mortals and/or gods)
 - Summary of the myth
 - Map of the setting in Greece
 - Illustration of the mythical creature or god (not computer generated – you can scan your drawing if it fits your project format)
 - Connections to other gods (directly or comparisons)
 - Connections to modern world
4. Prepare to read your myth (or an important part of it if it is more than 3 pages) and share your work with the class



Ancient Greek Mythology Project Criteria

Literal Comprehension Criteria (Reading Grades)	Scores
Clearly summarize the key points of the myth based on your notes sheet (characters and conflicts)	
Text to text connections between gods (directly or comparisons)	
Recognizes Key Concepts (Social Studies Grade)	
Accurate map of Greece map based on details from the story	
Applies and Interprets Content (Social Studies Grades)	
Text to world connection – How did this myth “explain” the known world to ancient Grecians	
Text to modern world connection – How does this myth affect the world today?
