



Consider using information you need about Abraham Maslow, and about his Hierarchy of needs. Consider the needs below.

1. Where would they fit into his hierarchy and why?
 - a) Physiological: food, water, air, sunlight, heat. We cannot survive physically without these.
 - b) Safety: money, shelter, job, education. These elements, though not directly related to the survival of the body, affects the availability of food, water, and heat.
 - c) Social: acceptance, love, friendship, car, job, education, morality. To satisfy the human desire for social interaction, these elements are necessary. Car, job, education, and morality may not be directly related, but contribute to the success of fulfilling social needs.
 - d) Esteem: procreation, support, realizing potential, car, morality. Esteem is fulfilled by having a sense of self, which can be achieved through these elements. (Though car would be at the materialistic end of the spectrum)
 - e) Self-Actualization: self-respect. All of the bottom must be fulfilled to have self-respect.
2. Can any one of those fit in more than one area? If so, where else could they fit and why?

Car--while it is primarily social, it is not necessary to have "Esteem."
3. Generate **three** other needs that you believe are important. Those needs **must** fit in two or more categories of Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs. (Note: Your responses to the above should be short and concise. Make reference to an example to support your reason for placing the need where you did.)

Job: necessary to ensure financial "safety" but also comes with a social circle as well.
Education: better the chances of being financially stable and also acts as a place for social interaction
Morality: morality better the chances of creating a social circle (no one wants to be with someone that might inflict harm on them) and is one of the fundamental basis for self-esteem.
