

# Digital Storytelling with Keynote and GarageBand



A set of relevant images have been imported into iPhoto from a digital camera and put into an album. These images can be accessed from any part of the iLife suite or iWork.

We are going to use these images in Keynote.




When Keynote is launched you can choose from any of the themes provided. White works just fine.

When Keynote launches make sure you click the media button in the tool bar.




This will give you access to all your media on your computer including your photos. You can drag the album of images you have made onto the left hand side of the Keynote window to create a slide for each image. The slides can be rearranged to suit your needs. The original slide will still be there and you can enter a title on this slide.


Next we are going to add the narration. In the tool bar choose the Inspector button.



In the Inspector choose the left most icon and then Audio. Here you will be able to click on the record button to record a narration. When the button is pressed the presentation will begin and you simply speak as you use the arrow keys to run through your presentation. At the end of the presentation your narration can be played back from the Inspector.




You can now save your presentation and then using the Share menu send the presentation to GarageBand.




You will be asked to save a movie of your presentation and then GarageBand will launch with a video and narration track.



This audio track can be edited by dragging the end of the recorded region.



A jingle can be added by clicking on the loops icon and then choosing the podcast sounds.



You can click on a Jingle and to listen to it. If this suits your story you can drag it underneath your audio track.





When you are happy you can export the Podcast to Disk from the Share menu. You should then choose the size of file that suits your purpose.



The resulting file can then become part of a podcast feed. A great way is to use Apple's Snow Leopard Server Wikis and blogs.

If you have a blog set up go to it and click on the + sign. Enter a name for the entry. Click on the Podcast check box and choose your exported file. When you click create your episode is created.
