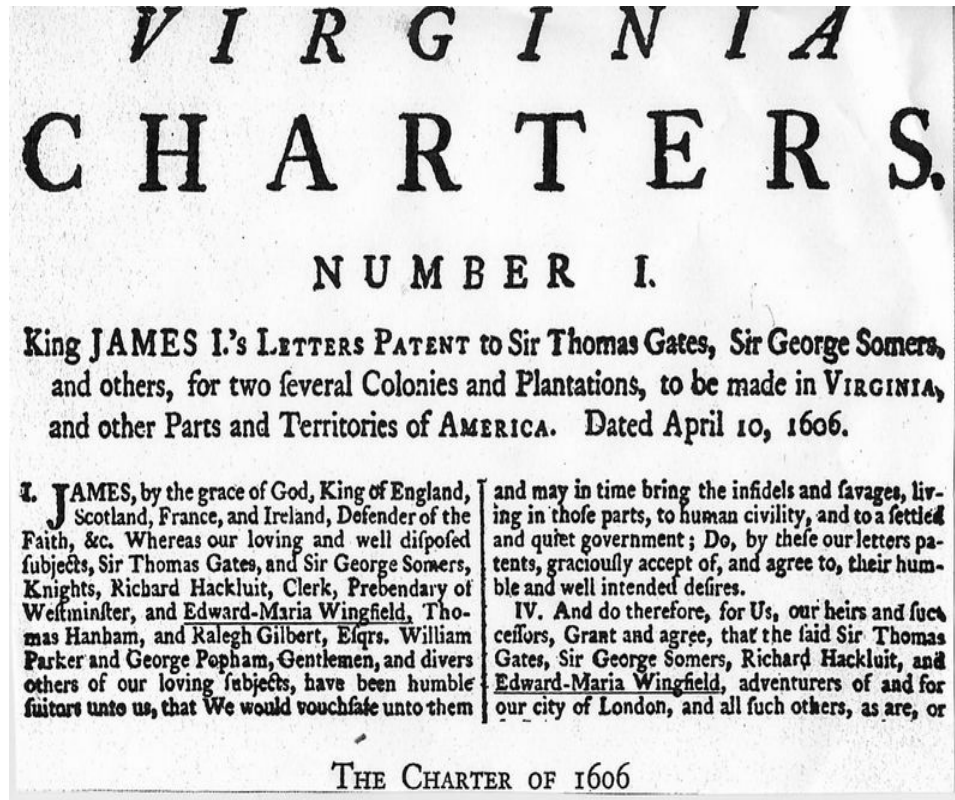

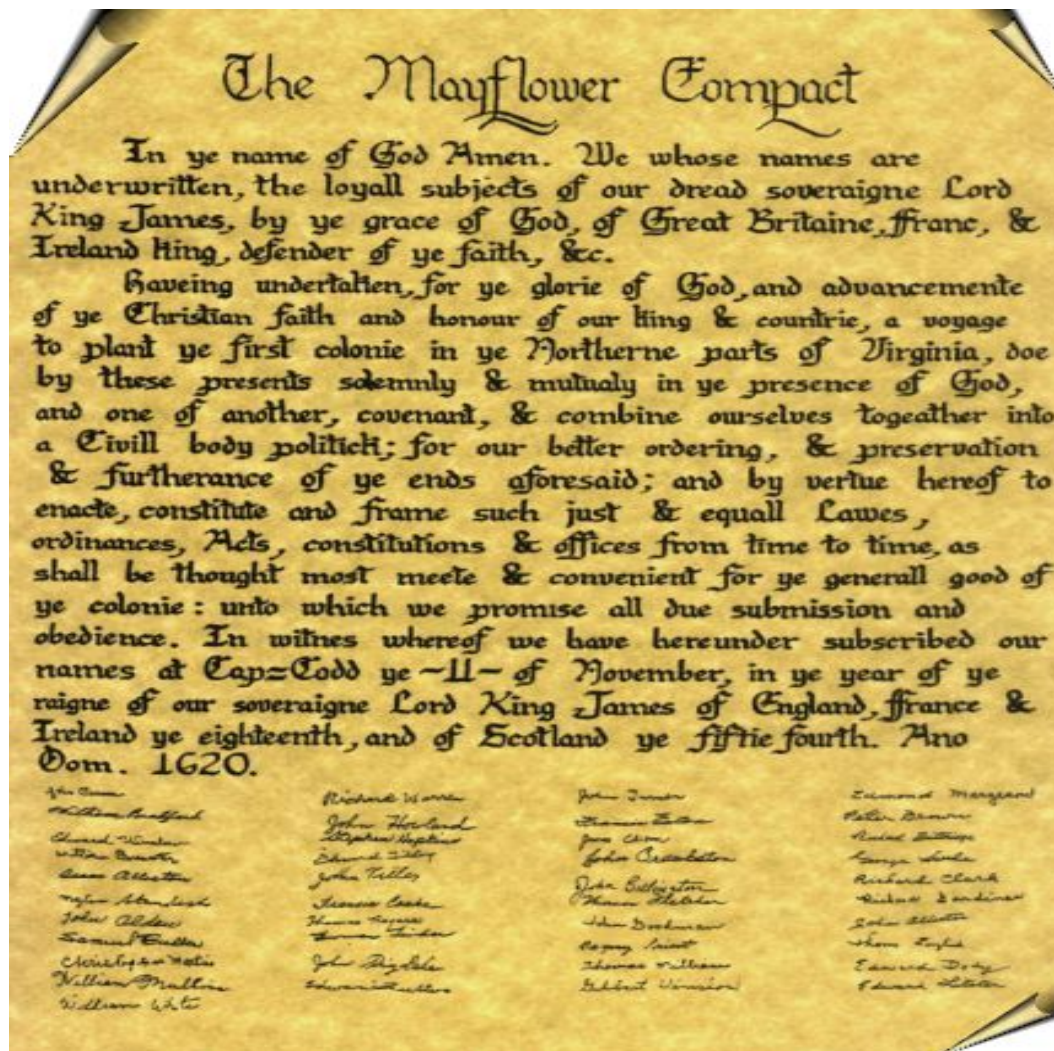

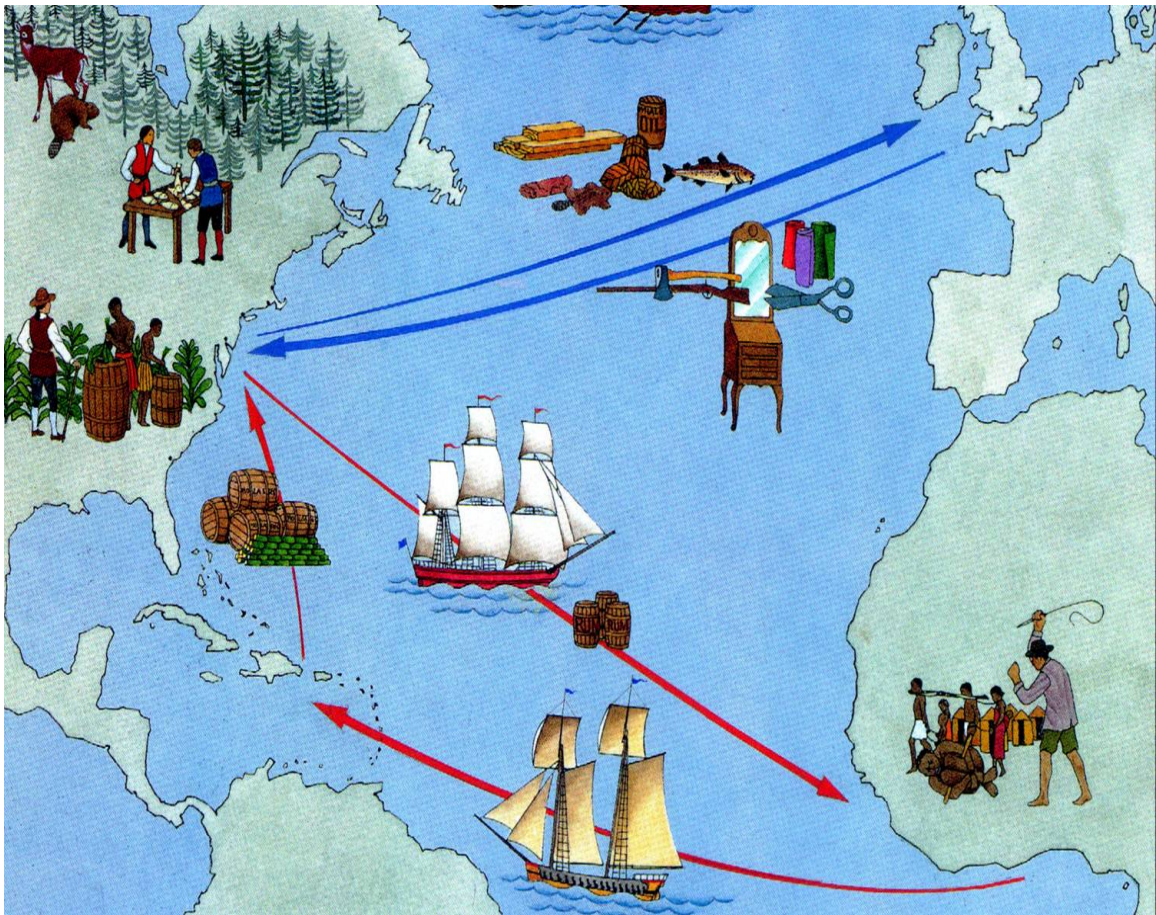

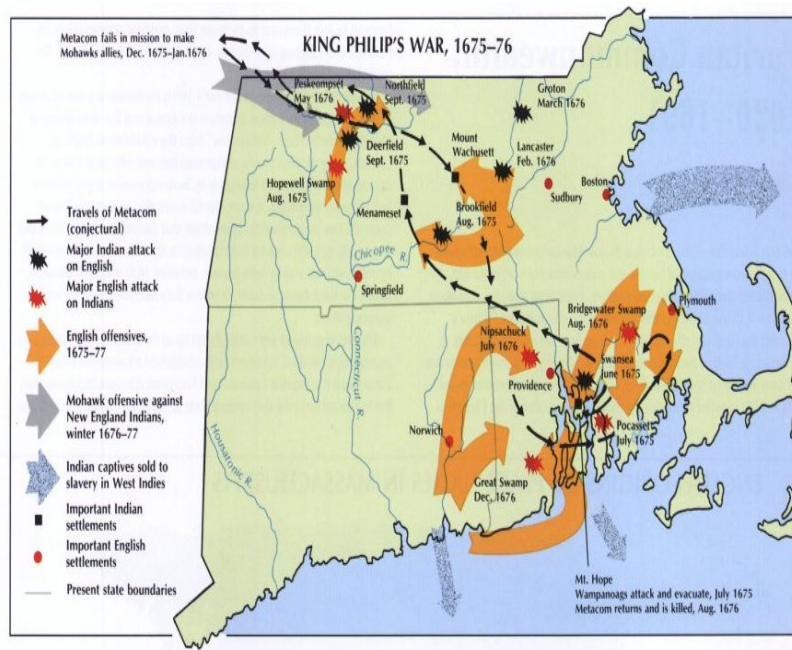
TRIANGULAR TRADE ROUTE IN PICTURES

WILLIAM PENN-QUAKERS and INDIANS

William Penn Invites Mennonites to a Peaceable Kingdom



In 1681, William Penn, an English Quaker, received land in North America from King Charles II in payment of a debt. Penn immediately launched a

noble experiment to create a peaceful society in Penn Sylvania (Penn's Woods). He invited Quakers and other groups oppressed by the established state churches to join him.

Penn promised complete toleration in civil and religious matters to those who settled on his tract. In the spirit of peace, he worked out a treaty with Indians already living in the area.

Word of Penn's offer quickly reached Mennonites along the German Rhine through several Quaker congregations recently established there.

In 1683, the first Mennonites set sail for William Penn's peaceable kingdom.
