





VUS 7 IMAGES-THE CIVIL WAR




CIVIL WAR MAP







ROAD TO GETTYSBURG





Address delivered at the dedication of the
Lincoln Memorial at Washington.

Four score and seven years ago our fathers
brought forth on this continent a new doc-
trine, conceived in liberty, and dedicated
to the proposition that all men are cre-
ated equal.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war,
testing whether that nation or any nation
so conceived and so dedicated can long
endure. We are met on a great battlefield
of that war. We have come to dedicate a
portion of that field as a final resting
place for those who here gave their lives
that that nation might live. It is all-
gathered fitting and proper that we should
do this.


But, in a larger sense, we can not dedi-
cate—we can not consecrate—we can not
hallow this ground. The brave men, liv-
ing and dead, who struggled here have con-
secrated it, far above our poor power to

or detract. The world will little note, nor
long remember what we say here, but it can
never forget what they did here. It is for
the living, rather, to be dedicated here to
the unfinished work which they who
have here thus far so nobly advanced.
It is rather for us to be here dedicated to
the great task remaining before us—that
from these honored dead we take increased
devotion to that cause for which they gave
the last full measure of devotion—that
we here highly resolve that these dead shall
not have died in vain—that this nation,
under God, shall have a new birth of free-
dom—and that the government of the people,
by the people, for the people, shall not per-
ish from the earth.



SHERMAN'S MARCH TO THE SEA











RECONSTRUCTION ACT of 1867




TRANSCONTINENTAL RAILROAD-1869





Reconstruction Amendments

Amendment	Terms
Thirteenth (Dec. 18, 1865)	Abolished slavery in the United States.
Fourteenth (July 28, 1868)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Granted citizenship to all persons born or naturalized in the United States. • Provided that no state could make laws to deprive citizens of life, liberty, property, or equal protection of the law. • Specified that any state that denied male citizens the right to vote would lose representation in Congress.
Fifteenth (March 30, 1870)	Prohibited the denial of voting rights based on race, color, or previous condition of servitude.
